Principal's Message

COMMUNICATION

As I close out the final newsletter for October (Bullying Prevention Month), I want to highlight the need for parents to always work to maintain positive communications with your child. A child that feels his / her parents have created solid modes of communication between parent and child, is much more likely to report any kind of incident that might be reflective of bullying. Please remember that a clear negative impact of a child being targeted is that he / she can become overwhelmed by a feeling of isolation and powerlessness. If that child has no place to share thoughts, impressions or fears, the sense of isolation can grow in dangerous ways. For parents, setting a tone that shows you are always interested in everything that is going on in your child's life; the good, the bad and even the ugly, will increase the odds of your child reporting a situation in which he / she might be targeted, bullied or cyberbullied. Don't be shy about asking questions of your child and trust your instincts if the report you receive doesn't ring true to you. Ultimately, never assume everything is fine. If you suspect something is wrong keep questioning, keep digging. Demonstrating your interest and your caring, through careful communication, will send the appropriate message and may very well assist you in having a clear understanding of what your child's experience actually holds. This can provide immeasurable benefits for your child.

Office: Please remember to send your child to school with a note if they are going to a different destination on the bus after school. It helps to avoid last minute phone calls to the school, which can make dismissal very chaotic. We appreciate the advance notice and thank you for not calling with these changes after 2:00 p.m.

*As evidenced by our weather on Wednesday morning, we are definitely heading into the winter season. Please help in making sure your child comes to school with clothes appropriate for going outside for recess. Our recess periods only range between 15 and 20 minutes, but that time frame can be challenging this time of year if not properly clothed. Staff here will make individual decisions to send children back into the building if the clothing they are wearing is not warm enough for the conditions outside. We are of the belief that all children can benefit from the fresh air and activity of a recess period but only if their clothing stands up to the temperature outside. Your assistance with this expectation is greatly appreciated.

Make sure to wear orange when you go outside tomorrow and for the rest of November!

Grades Pre K-1

Pre K: The PreK are finishing up our unit on Families. We have learned how to care for babies, talked about extended family members and the importance of treating other with kindness and respect. We have been learning about different shapes and their attributes and exploring different media for painting and writing. Have a great weekend!

Beck: The K Krew is busy this week finishing our spider unit. We have learned about the TrapDoor Spider, the Orb Weaver and the Brown Recluse. We learned that spiders have 8 legs and two body parts. Ask your child what the CEPHALOTHORAX is! Please continue to review classroom rules with your child. (Be in your spot. Quiet voices/Kind Words. Follow Directions. Keep your body to yourself.) In Math we are using dice to count and add numbers. In Handwriting we have practiced E,F,P,B,N,M.Have a great weekend!

Lamothe: The first graders did a study of spiders this week. They learned they have 8 legs and they are not an insect but an arachnid! The children made spider webs to hang in our classroom. We continue to do small group instruction of reading and writing through Literacy Block. We are finding most students are making great gains! We will not be having a Halloween Party next week. I will however, be picking up cider and donuts for snack that morning. Students will not be wearing costumes to school.

Grades 2-4

Brewer: In Mystery Science this week, we continued our unit about animals and how they use their structures to help themselves survive. Our lesson was called, "Why are polar bears white?" We learned how animal camouflage helps prey and predators hide from one another. In math we continue practicing basic math facts. These kids are getting fast at recall. They are becoming quite proficient in counting coins as well. In Literacy Block writing we have been "dressing up" our sentences just by adding adjectives and adverbs. Give your second grader a simple sentence and listen to how he/ she can "dress it up." We are becoming experts at contractions. Thank you to the Morrow family for the baby wipes.

Northrup: Third graders were very busy this week learning about food chains of different habitats, writing the beginning of their narratives, working on comprehension in reading, and practicing multi-step number stories in math. Lincoln Academy to Host 8th Grade Family Night on November

All prospective students are invited to Lincoln Academy's 2018 8th Grade Family Night, which will be held on Wednesday, November 7 at 6:30 pm. The event will begin in the Alumni Dining Commons in the center of the Lincoln Academy campus at 81 Academy Hill in Newcastle.



This open house is an annual event at Lincoln Academy; a chance for families of prospective students to visit the LA campus, meet teachers and staff, and tour the school. Often this event is the first time students see their soon-to-be high school and meet many of their teachers. Although most families who attend represent incoming 9th graders, families of students interested in transferring to LA from another high school are also encouraged to attend.

Any student living in a town with secondary school choice can attend LA with their tuition paid by the sending town. LA also accepts tuition-paying students who come from towns without school choice. This year, Lincoln Academy's 8th Grade Family Night will begin in the Dining Commons with an orientation by current students and members of the Administration and Guidance Department. After this orientation, families can take a campus tour with student tour guides, and visit an Open House in the LA gym, where academic departments and extracurricular clubs will have tables where faculty and students are available to talk about their specialties. School representatives will speak directly to students and parents about their specific interests in and out of the classroom.

"The table format of the Open House gives prospective families a chance to meet teachers and students, and get any question answered, whether that is about a particular academic track, performing or visual arts, athletics, or a club interest, such as Debate Team or Climate Action Club," said Sarah Wills-Viega, Lincoln Academy's Director of Counseling and Studies. "We hope that families will leave the event with helpful information about Lincoln Academy, both in general and specific terms, and that students will be excited about coming here next year!"

Families considering Lincoln Academy should plan to attend the Open House, even if they are considering several options for high school. This event is helpful in understanding the wide variety of resources at LA, including 145 total courses, 17 Advanced Placement classes, 30 classes in visual and performing arts, a broad range of hands-on courses in the Cable-Burns Applied Technology and Engineering Center (ATEC), as well as over 40 clubs and athletic teams.
