IS THE PSAT RIGHT FOR MY STUDENT?

WHAT ARE THE DIFFERENT TYPES OF PSAT'S?





The PSAT 8/9 is an assessment given to 8th and 9th graders that is closely aligned to the SAT, PSAT/NMSQT, and the PSAT 10. The test helps establish a baseline for students as they enter high school and begin preparing for college and career readiness. It consists of questions in Evidence-Based Reading and Writing and in Math. By taking the PSAT8/9, students will learn which skills he or she needs to work on for continued success when preparing for high school and ultimately college. In addition, the PSAT 8/9 will identify areas where the student excels, as well as areas he or she should focus to improve academically.

The PSAT-10 is a practice standardized test administered specifically for high school sophomores. Your Score Reports are intended to serve as a prediction of scores on the SAT and to aid you in preparing for the SAT. It identifies student academic strengths and weaknesses early in high school, when there's plenty of time to improve before college. Additionally, the SAT, PSAT/NMSQT, and PSAT 10 connect students to another \$300 million in college scholarships for students across major demographics.





The PSAT/NMSQT can qualify you for the National Merit Scholarship Program and other scholarships. The PSAT/NMSQT is a standardized test that 11th graders (and some 10th graders) take. Like the SAT, it measures the knowledge and skills in reading, writing, and math students learn in the classroom—the same knowledge and skills your child needs to succeed in college and career. By taking the PSAT/NMSQT as a junior, students may meet the requirements to enter the National Merit® Scholarship Program, an academic competition for recognition and scholarships. Additionally, the SAT, PSAT/NMSQT, and PSAT 10 connect students to another \$300 million in college scholarships for students across major demographics.
