As you are aware our Lemoore Elementary School District Board of Trustee's took action in July to move forward with a General Obligation Bond on the November 2018 ballot. Measure D information has been sent home via letters home and posted on our district website. Hopefully, you have seen the conceptual school designs posted at our sites as well as the rendering of our proposed new elementary school to be located on the corner of Cinnamon and 19th. Measure D will provide the funds needed to make critical facility improvements within our district as follows:

- Construct a new elementary school to reduce overcrowding
- Replace outdated heating, ventilation, air conditioning systems, and lighting systems to be more energy efficient
- Make health, safety and handicap accessibility improvements
- Renovate/repair the interior and/or exterior of existing outdated classrooms, restrooms, library/media centers and school facilities
- Replace temporary portables with permanent classrooms

Trimester one is coming to an end and we have much to be thankful for. We are thankful for the hard work and effort our students have put into their learning since the first day of school back in August. We are grateful for all the parent volunteers at our book fair, the Mustang Nation Foundation fundraiser, and field trips that have happened in Kindergarten and first grade. We are grateful for the hard work our staff has put in to clarifying what students are expected to learn, designing lessons that meet student needs, reviewing assessment results, and making instructional decisions that benefit and promote learning.

This all leads in perfectly into Thanksgiving and the third annual 16 Days of Gratitude at Meadow Lane. This program began two years ago and students were asked to write about those things that they were grateful for and why. They wrote about sights, smells, books, and people. The things students wrote were really impressive. We expect again to be amazed by our students, the good work they do, and the beautiful hearts they possess. And with that, one last bit of gratitude to all parents and guardians doing all you can to send students to school each day ready to learn.

School-wide attendance has also been a strong point this year at Meadow Lane. The number of students with chronic levels of absenteeism is smaller and the overall attendance has been up school-wide. As the cold and flu season approaches, remember that we have a school nurse on staff and if you are unsure whether to send a child to school, bring them and have the nurse give them a quick check-up. Once again, thank you for sending your children in record levels.

Upcoming events

Trimester one ended on November 2 and report cards will be going home the week of November 13. There will be parent teacher conferences for students who are at risk of not meeting grade level proficiency on guaranteed standards. If you have questions about your child's progress you may always call the office and make arrangements to conference with your child's teacher. The first trimester awards assemblies will be on November 14, 15 and 16.

Since August...

In the 60 days since school began, we have recognized over 60 students as Students of the Month. We are happy to have this event back on the Meadow Lane calendar. Many students have also received class and school recognition for perfect attendance and demonstrating their learning. The Meadow Lane staff is also working and learning to provide students with specific feedback and praise for demonstrating the kind of learning behaviors that promote academic achievement.

Our football and volleyball teams have surpassed the halfway point in their season and while the football team is looking for the elusive first win, the volleyball team is unbeaten.

The GATE students have been having regular meetings and two of our paraprofessionals have started up the Art Club again, providing students with an outlet for their creative abilities.

We've had a family literacy night, a mobile dairy, and emergency vehicles on campus. Our district maintenance department has installed a new electronic marquee in front of our school.

EACH ONE of our students is important, valuable, and worth all our effort. The Meadow Lane staff is doing the right work to move our students FORWARD. We are proud of the progress our students have made so far this year and we look forward to seeing what progress they can make as the year continues to unfold.









UNIVERSITY CHARTER

We are well into the year now and your child should be well versed in using their iPad both at school and home. Students were given instruction in the classroom on the expected handling of iPads and the rules which apply to their use. Parents are asked to take an active role in monitoring the use of iPads at home. We have found that this technology is a helpful tool when used appropriately. A copy of the rules is available in our office and website. Here are some helpful guidelines for parents to know:

- Charge iPad nightly and keep in a public place other than the child's bedroom if possible.
- Check student screens often to ensure students are using iPads for educational or research directly related to assignments.
- As much as possible have students complete work on iPads in a public place like the living room or kitchen table.
- Student should only be using iPads for education or research related assignments.

Parking Patrol - Pick-up and parking at UCS can sometimes be very congested. As we prepare for wet weather some areas currently used for parking will become too muddy for vehicles. We are looking to form a committee of volunteers to help patrol the parking area and help keep it safe. Literacy Matters

Over the upcoming school holiday breaks, students will have opportunities to participate in exciting family experiences that include reading! Reading with our children can be a fun, rich experience for every member of the family and will also help set our students up for success. Whether older children read books of interest to others or younger children interact with books through adults, the next several weeks can be a great time for students to build on their love of reading with their family.

Reading, for most children, is already a pleasant and exciting experience. As students practice reading, they become interested in and motivated to learn more. The more that adults and older siblings can read aloud to children, the more their vocabulary develops and background knowledge will grow which leads to a greater understanding of the world around them. Reading aloud provides opportunities for parents and other family members to become role models for reading and share their excitement about stories, poetry or articles children might not discover on their own.

Please set aside some quiet time every day for a read-aloud with the family. During your read-aloud, consider the following:

- Talk about the story before, during and after a read-aloud session. Making connections between the story and the child's life helps to cement their understanding of ideas.
- Use information within the text to answer children's questions.
- Talk about illustrations and invite children to describe what they see and how the information connects with the story.
- Pause to ask questions: "Why did that happen? What do you think will happen next? Why did she do that?"
- Bring the story to life! Encourage your child to draw, paint or pretend to be one of the characters.

Your family's encouragement of reading will not only stress the importance of this lifelong skill but will create wonderful lasting memories with the family and possibly, a new family tradition!



All New and Returning Volunteers and Chaperones Required to Complete Online Application Using Raptor in 2018/2019

Beginning July 1, 2018, anyone interested in serving as a volunteer or chaperone for the 2018/2019 school year **must apply** through the Raptor system, even if you have already applied through the Raptor system from the previous year. In order to complete the entire application process, you must visit the school site where you wish to volunteer or chaperone to have your government-issued identification scanned. You will receive an email notification once you have been approved.

- The LUESD Volunteer/Chaperone Application takes approximately five minutes to complete. Volunteer and Chaperone applicants are required to have a personal email address in order to submit the application, which includes automated notification when the application is approved.
- Volunteers and Chaperones who do not have an email address may use the district's email address, or ask for assistance at the school office to complete the application.

What is a Volunteer vs a Chaperone?

- **Volunteers** are under the direct supervision of a certificated employee (e.g. volunteering in the classroom, helping with special programs). Volunteers **DO NOT require fingerprinting**.
- *Chaperones* are <u>not</u> supervised by a certificated employee (e.g. field trips). **Chaperones require fingerprinting.**

Clearance criteria for each is listed below:

 Complete Online Volunteer/Chaperone Application and Registered Sex Offender Check through the Raptor System TB Risk Assessment/Clearance VOLUNTEERS DO NOT REQUIRE FINGERPRINTING 	 Complete Online Volunteer/Chaperone Application and Registered Sex Offender Check through the Raptor System TB Risk Assessment/Clearance Criminal Background Check/Fingerprint Clearance

LiveScan Fingerprinting Process: Once Chaperones have completed the online application and been cleared including TB clearance they must contact the school site to receive the LiveScan Fingerprint Request Form. Upon receiving the LiveScan Request form the Chaperone will need to call and schedule an appointment with the Kings County Office of Education at (559) 584-1441. Cost for fingerprinting is at the expense of the chaperone, and is currently \$61.00. Acceptable forms of payment include cash, Money Order or Cashier's Check made payable to Kings County Office of Education. Returning Chaperones who have a fingerprint clearance on file with the district are not required to be fingerprinted again. A fingerprint clearance shall remain valid as long as the parent/guardian has children who remain continuously enrolled in the district. Any break in enrollment may cause the fingerprint clearance to be nullified.
