Principal's Message Enhanced Security at WHES

Beginning this week a new security feature has been added to the main entrance of WHES. We now have a doorbell and a camera attachment that will allow the office staff to view and communicate, if necessary, with all individuals seeking to enter the building during the time that school is in session. Simply put, this is just another barrier to having anyone enter the building without us first observing who the individual is and, if we are not familiar with the individual, having them identify their business at the school. The call bell is to the right of the main entrance doors. It is simple to use but assists us in maintaining the safety of all students and staff. I'm sure there will be some adjustment period as we're all getting accustomed to this new security system. As is always the case, we make changes in our protocols and our mechanisms in the best interest of our students.

Office: Please remember to send your child to school with a note if they are going to a different destination on the bus after school. It helps to avoid last minute phone calls to the school, which can make dismissal very chaotic. We appreciate the advance notice and thank you for not calling with these changes after 2:00 p.m.

Grades Pre K-1

PBIS News: Megan Soule - Student Support Specialist

This week in the news for PBIS we have focused on playground expectations, rules, and respecting property. We circled with the 8th grade class to determine what should be the expected behaviors on the playground outside at recess and what are the unexpected behaviors staff are observing. Circling with the 8th graders allowed them to take ownership and play a role in the development of rules for recess. Some takeaways from the circle were: respecting school campus, preparation for expected behaviors when we enter high school, modeling for younger students outside, being safe, and taking responsibility for one's actions. Using restorative circles to problem solve within a group affords each participant the ability to have a voice and choice. Restorative circles can be used for a variety of purposes and have shown to be an effective tool to building positive school climate. The circle process provides balance by integrating the following of processes: Developing Action Plans, Getting Acquainted, Addressing Issues, and Building Relationships.
