The 2018-2019 school year is off to a great start! The start of a new school year is always an exciting time, not only for students, but for families and staff as well. The start of a new school year is always filled with hopes, dreams, and excitement. Our staff is committed to engaging our learners so that those feelings are as strong in May as they were in September.

CELL PHONES

On June 11, 2018, the Greenwood School Board changed the policy regarding student cellphone useage during the school day. Middle School students may use their phones before and after school. Students are not allowed to use their cell phones at any time during the school day, this includes study hall. High School students may use their phones before and after school and during lunch, Phones, head phones and ear buds will be kept in student lockers during scheduled class time, this includes study hall.

Research continues to identify the negative impact of increased cell phone usage on student learning and student well-being. As we work to best prepare our students for college and career it is clear from the research, that cell phones work counter to this goal.

I know this change will be challenging for some students, but if we are truly committed to improving student achievement than we need to remove a major barrier to student learning.

SCHOOL SAFETY AND SECURITY

The School District of Greenwood strives to provide a safe and secure schools for our students and staff. The district has received a round one school safety grant in the amount of \$41,564 from the Wisconsin Department of Justice. Among the projects that will be addressed with these funds include: Installation of window security film on qualifying doors in both schools, installation of magnetic locks on external doors at the high school, Safe-

Latch devices on high school classroom doors, installation of window security film on classroom door windows at the high school, and additional internal and external surveillance cameras at both schools.

The district has also received \$21,355 in grant funds from Round 2 of the school safety and security grant. The district will install window security film on the playground doors at the elementary school, install panic buttons in the school offices, contract for a district-wide safety and security assessment, and send district staff to grant-mandated training sessions.

In addition, the district is working with SDS an architectural firm from Eau Claire to look for ways to provide more secure main entrances at both schools.

SUMMER PROJECTS

It was another busy summer of maintenance and repairs in the District. Hopefully you have had an opportunity to see some of the results of these projects.

- East Gym floor was refurbished.
- New Fire Alarm System installed at Elementary School
- Installation of 2 bottle-filling water fountains in Elementary School and 1 at the High School
- Completed north side walkway at Elementary School
- Replaced A/C in Fitness Center
- Completed parking lots patching at both schools

COLLEGE APPLICATIONS



Seniors at Greenwood High School have been working hard on college applications; many students have already received letters of acceptance. Here is the link for the UW application; <https://apply.wisconsin.edu/> The UW application should be completed if you plan to apply to any of the 4 year UW campuses. As you may have heard the University of Wisconsin is restructuring some of their campuses to eliminate the 2 year college campuses making them all part of a 4 year university. For example, UW Marathon and Marshfield/Wood County campuses are now known as UW Stevens Point – Marathon and UW Stevens Point – Marshfield. Here is a link to the UW restructuring that contains information on application, FAFSA, and other important information for incoming freshman; <https://www.wisconsin.edu/uw-restructure/> If your plan includes applying to CVTC; see Ms. Vinci for the free application code and apply soon! If you have not yet applied to college, I encourage you to do so soon. Stop down

to Ms. Vinci's office if you would like a college view book, FAFSA information or any other assistance with college applications or information. I am in the high school office most every Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

FAFSA (FREE APPLICATION FOR FEDERAL STUDENT AID)

is available on-line October 1 at www.FAFSA.gov FAFSA is a free application for federal student aid that helps students pay for college. This free application must be completed each year you attend college to be considered for grants and loans. Previously students and parents would submit the FAFSA once they had income taxes filed for the year. This meant most students and parents filed the FAFSA after the first of the year; not anymore - from now on the FAFSA is available October 1 and previous year taxes will be used to complete the FAFSA. To receive free and professional on-site



assistance completing the FAFSA attend College Goal Wisconsin. On Monday, October 22, 2018 volunteers at College Goal Wisconsin will be available to students and parents at Northcentral Technical College in Wausau at 6pm and on Wednesday, November 7, 2018 volunteers at College Goal Wisconsin were available to students and parents at Chippewa Valley Technical College in Eau Claire at 6pm. Visit www.collegegoalwi.org for specific dates, locations, and information on what to bring or call 866-578-4625. Please note the only way to apply for and receive federal financial aid is to fill out the FAFSA. The first step is to get a FSA ID; visit www.studentaid.gov/fsaid to learn more. Make sure you are on the right website; the government website

ends with gov. If the website you are on ends in com or org you are on the wrong website! Each college you list on the FAFSA will send a financial aid offer to you once you are accepted or admitted; review and compare your offers... Did you know some colleges won't consider you for scholarships until you've submitted a FAFSA, so submit it even if you think you won't qualify for federal financial aid.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Scholarship season is upon us! There have already been several scholarships posted for seniors. These scholarships are posted on the Greenwood High School website under "Guidance" and "Scholarships." Applications are available to download right from this site. The scholarship list is updated regularly check the website often to view available scholarship opportunities, criteria, deadlines, and amounts. Any questions see Ms. Vinci.

PSAT

Some sophomores and juniors had the opportunity to take the PSAT on October 10 this year. The PSAT/NMSQT is a pre-test for the SAT. Taking the PSAT provides you the opportunity and experience of taking a standardized lengthy test and is the only way, as a junior, to compete for recognition and scholarship through the National Merit Scholarship Program. PSAT results will be available the second week of December.

ACT

All juniors will take the ACT (American College Test) at Greenwood High School in February 2019. Juniors took an ACT practice test last week. This is the second

year we are offering the ACT practice test for our students. Mr. Felhofer distributes score reports to students that will provide information and feedback on strengths and weaknesses that can be used to prepare for the ACT in spring. Also in February before our students take the ACT they will participate in an ACT Bootcamp with Jim Giovannini from ACT Success. Jim is one of the nation's leading authorities on ACT and SAT preparation. ACT Success, Inc. is a national leader in ACT test preparation, providing high-quality test prep materials and strategies built on nearly thirty years of research and experience. We will continue to communicate any other ACT test prep options and opportunities for students when they become available. We realize the importance of an ACT score for college admission and scholarship dollars.

ASVAB

The ASVAB test is coming to Greenwood on Tuesday, November 20, 2018. The ASVAB is at no cost to the student and is available to any sophomore, junior or senior who has interest in the military. A student may take the ASVAB more than once. There will be a sign-up sheet in the office or see Ms. Vinci if you would like to take this test or have any questions. I believe we will be able to take the on-line test this year rather than paper and pencil! Students remember you can take the ASVAB every year to improve your score and your knowledge of the test. Your score at MEPS I believe is the one that counts for recruitment purposes however we believe in practice tests here at Greenwood High School so you can show your personal best.

STATEBOUND SUCCESS: *Let's Talk*

Rehearsals began the second week of September for Greenwood Drama Club's entry in the One-Act Theatre Festival hosted by the Wisconsin High School Forensic Association. But the group began working together early over the summer, with a workshop series at the end of August designed to start developing the performance skills and build an ensemble with a clear sense of group identity that would later carry the production to the state level. Led by 2013 alumna director Olivia Gregorich who graduated from Lawrence University last year with a degree in Theatre Arts, the group read through several possible scripts before settling on *I Don't Want to Talk About It* by Bradley Hayward as the best fit for the club. The students were vocal about the need for a story with a strong message that would also give individual opportunities to shine. The play covers issues teens often confront, including rumors, bullying, complicated family relationships, and suicide. Through a collage of scenes and monologues, a common problem is identified: what happens when we are overwhelmed with the things we can't, won't, and don't want to talk about? How can we be better listeners? Where does the courage to reach out come from?

What a great start to the 2018-19 school year! We are all glad to be back reading and learning about our world. We started with a brand new writing curriculum this year and it is exciting to see the progress we are already making in our writing stronger and more enjoyable. Our math so far has been learning place value for really big numbers and multiplying larger numbers. Our Journeys reading program is helping us learn new strategies to improve our comprehension skills. Some that we have already studied are story structure, author's purpose, and theme. In science, we have studied cell structure (the building block of life!) and how scientists classify living organisms into groups. Our social studies curriculum for 4th grade is all about Wisconsin, and we began by looking at our geography and how the last Ice Age shaped our state.

grant from the WI DPI that centers around the idea of students as community members. This is being accomplished in Greenwood by students and community members taking part in joint book reads and hosting two author visits. The first of these was hosting New York Times bestselling author Aisha Saeed on October 22. Aisha Saeed is the author of *Amal Unbound* (Nancy Paulsen Books, 2018). All students in grades 3-12 heard *Amal Unbound* read aloud to them in preparation for the visit. Ms. Saeed spoke with elementary students in grades 3-6 and with all middle/high school students at school assemblies. We then held an evening event, with over 70 people in attendance for culturally rich experiences and a talk from Ms. Saeed. Thank you to all who were able to make it throughout the day. It was wonderful to have students and community members engaged in shared reading and discussion of the book and Pakistani culture.

The second portion of the event is happening now! Community members and high school students are encourage to read *What We Were Promised* by Lucy Tan. This book is set in China and author Lucy Tan will be in Greenwood the evening of December 5. Participants will have the opportunity to explore teen trends in China and have further discussion about seeing ourselves and others in the books that we read. We hope to see you there!

Greenwood Participates In the NOW Program

The Nutrition On Weekends program is a collaborative, community effort to target childhood hunger. The program provides healthy, ready-to-eat nutritional foods for children during the weekend.

The program was created in response to data collected from Marshfield students as part of the Youth Risk Behavior Survey. In 2012, 20% of students surveyed indicated he/she had gone to bed hungry at least once in the past thirty days because there was not enough food in the home. In 2015, this percentage increased to 23%.

A pilot of the program began serving twenty-nine children in the Marshfield School District in October 2013. Since then, the program has grown to serve 250-300 students weekly on an annual basis in the Marshfield, Auburndale, Granton and Spencer School Districts. This 2016-17 school year the Loyal and Greenwood School Districts have also been added to the program. With the addition of these two school districts and our early enrollment numbers we anticipate this being our biggest year yet.

*Numbers fluctuate throughout the school year.

At the end of each week during the school year, each child will receive a food pack containing:

- 2 peanut butter & jelly sandwiches
- 2 cups low-sugar cereal
- 2 pieces of fruit
- baby carrots and celery sticks
- 2 snack items
- Cheese

To help guarantee the NOW program to be a success, donations are needed throughout the year to meet the needs of our children.

Soon we will be setting up donation sites at Forward Financial Bank and Centuries on Main for food donations. Please see the wish list of items for donations below.

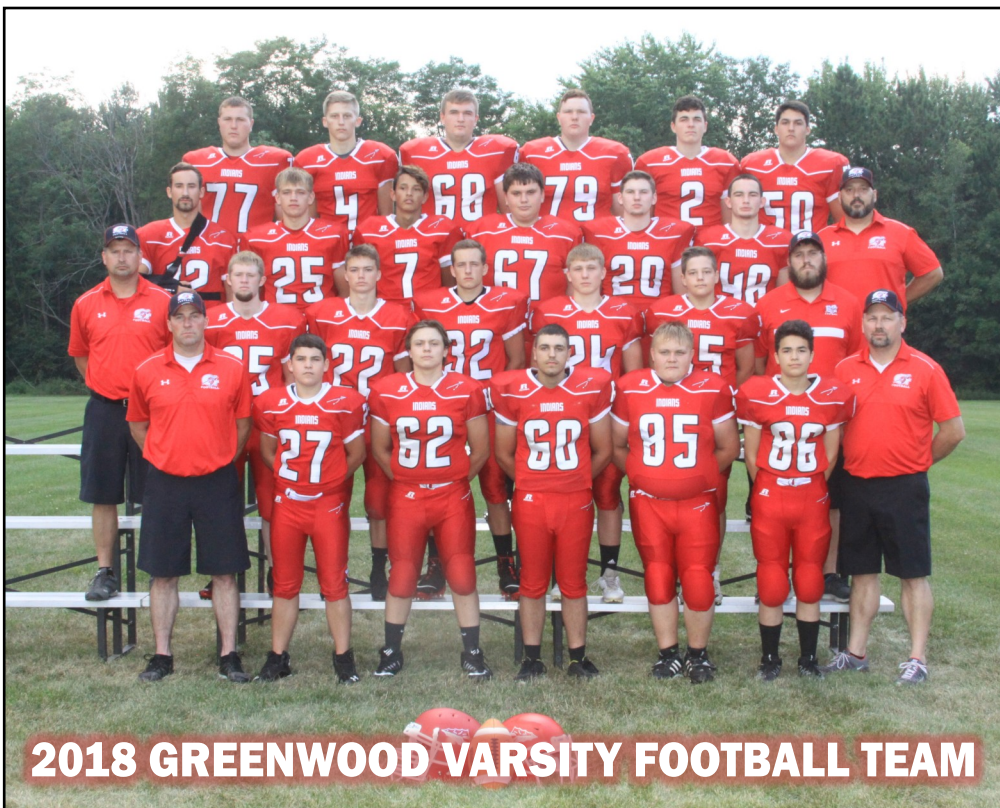
