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Principal's Message Out of the Darkness

The passing of Dennis Cullenberg sent shock waves through the WHES staff and student body as well as through the entire Whitefield community. Through these very tough days since his death, however, many positive supports and behaviors have been noted. First, so many colleagues from around RSU #12 have offered condolences and assistance. Clearly, Dennis's influence and connections to people move well beyond the borders of Whitefield and it is helpful for all WHES staff members to feel connected to a greater community of educators and colleagues. WHES parents and Whitefield community members have offered immeasurable support and a willingness to come forward in so many ways to assist the school in moving through this sad event. Most significant is the resiliency of the students and staff of WHES. They have pulled together, demonstrated countless acts of support and empathy for one another and have acted as a true community. On Friday, the day of Mr. Cullenberg's death, students across the grade spans began creating paper chains (one of Mr. Cullenberg's favorite holiday activities with his students) with a goal to have the chains connect all areas of the school and all classes. Watching students working through their grief and sadness by participating in this mutual project was both endearing and awe-inspiring. Messages from students related to Mr. Cullenberg filled his whiteboards and many older students, having had Mr. Cullenberg as their teacher in previous school years, made pilgrimages to his classroom to support his current students and to reminisce. Many stories related to Mr. Cullenberg were shared by both staff members and students and all members of the community were allowed to demonstrate their emotions without fear of embarrassment or reprisal. Some of our population chose to call parents and go home but most stayed within the school to share the sad moment together.

As we move into the new week, the school continues to offer supportive services and be sensitive to the needs of students and staff. Howie Tuttle, RSU #12 Superintendent of Schools, in recognition of the large number of the WHES staff who wanted to attend Dennis's funeral services and the resultant issues that presented to trying to run a typical school day, decided to close school on Thursday. His action removed all obstacles for students and staff, allowing them to pay their respects and support Dennis's family as well.

Out of the darkness of a horrible loss to our community, the goodness, generosity and resiliency of our community is demonstrated. Not a way that we would certainly choose, but noteworthy and heartwarming nevertheless.
