Laredo ISD is one of six districts chosen to partner with The Holdsworth Center. The five-year, \$6 million strategic partnership helps districts such as LISD develop skilled leaders who create conditions in which educators thrive and all students recieve what they need to succeed.

Attending the Holdsworth Training were LISD Superintendent Dr. Sylvia G. Rios, Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum and Instruction Dr. Gerardo Cruz, Assistant Superintendent for Human Resources Dr. Bobbi Ramirez, Director for Elementary Schools Myrtala Ramirez, Director for Secondary Education Jose Cerda, and Federal Programs Administrator Oralia H. Cortez.

"Over 40 districts from throughout Texas were considered for this coveted program," said LISD Board of Trustees President Hector "Tito" Garcia. "The selection process was rigorous and we are delighted that our district was chosen. LISD is committed to the development of our district's future leaders. Without a doubt, this program will directly benefit LISD students."

LISD Board Parliamentarian Dr. Minita Ramirez agrees that the Holdsworth Partnership is a huge opportunity for LISD. "The Holdsworth program provides LISD with the potential to develops its own leaders while supporting professional development goals and expectations. We intend to cultivate the most prepared principals and assistant principals for every LISD campus to positively impact all LISD students."

"Participating in this partnership will result in the enrichment, development and support of highly skilled, knowledgeable principals and administrators who will facilitate the success of every student and staff member in our classrooms," Dr. Rios said. "LISD wholeheartedly appreciates the confidence and resources that Holdsworth is investing in our district. We are ready to experience Holdsworth's leadership programs, coaching and hands-on support to develop LISD's future leaders."

LISD will be joining representatives from five other Texas public school districts that were chosen for the Holdsworth Center following a rigorous selection process. These include Victoria ISD, East Central ISD in San Antonio and Cedar Hill, Garland and Dallas ISDs in North Texas.

The Holdsworth Partnership is now serving 19 school districts in Texas. By 2028, the partnership is expected to reach more than 4,500 educators, including teacher leaders, assistant principals, principals and central office administrators.

The training was held at the newly constructed Holdsworth Campus located on Lake Austin which will serve as a permanent home for its staff and programs.

All programming and support is provided at no cost through the generosity of Charles Butt, Chairman of H-E-B, and other philanthropic supporters.

Drivers education classes to be offered at Laredo ISD high schools

he Laredo ISD Board of Trustees unanimously approved the addition of drivers education courses to the high school curriculum beginning with the 2021-2022 school year.

Drivers ed will be offered as an elective at no cost to LISD's eligible high school students.

Martin High School will be the first LISD campus to offer the class this fall. LISD plans to expand its drivers ed classes to Nixon, Cigarroa and Garcia Early College High School during the Spring Semester next year.

LISD will begin by hiring staff to teach the course and purchase vehicles equipped for drivers education classes. Only four other public school districts in Texas are currently offering drivers education for its students.

"LISD is ready to help our students become safe, responsible, defensive drivers," said LISD Board of Trustees President Hector "Tito" Garcia. "Providing an elective that teaches drivers ed will help our students earn their driver's license with confidence so they can get a job and transport themselves to work or activities. It will also make our community a safer place to drive."

"The District has always looked for ways to expand our curriculum and be at the forefront of positive changes to benefit our students and our LISD community," Garcia added. "We want to provide the very best opportunities and we believe that LISD's

dual credit courses, early college campuses, magnet schools, and the drivers ed class provide a rich educational experience for our students."

The idea to add drivers education picked up speed after it was introduced by LISD's newest board member, Guadalupe Gomez. "Drivers education can be costly and not all teenagers have the money to pay for the course," Gomez said. "Students who take drivers education courses learn the rules of the road which impacts a drivers' responsibility. No doubt this class will prepare our students for the real world and life after high school. I am excited and look forward to the start of this program."

LISD Superintendent Dr. Sylvia G. Rios believes taking driver's ed classes in high school is valuable for many reasons. "Students will be able to learn with their peers in a familiar environment," Dr. Rios noted. "They will observe and learn with fellow classmates from certified teachers on their own campus. The lessons learned during drivers education are sure to follow them after they graduate from high school and continue with higher education, the military or a career."

Rios noted that LISD is already identifying teachers who have expressed an interest in teaching the drivers education course. Along with their Texas driver's license, a bachelors degree, and a Texas teaching certificate, teachers must complete required hours of drivers education classroom, in-car simulation, and traffic instruction. They must not have accumulated six or more penalty points on a driving record during the preceding 36-month period.


mainly wanted to understand why certain medications and treatments were given and how I could help during their time of need."





he Laredo Independent School District was named a recipient of the Texas Workforce Solutions Jobs and Education for Texans (JET) Grant during the Texas Workforce Commission Grant Presentation Ceremony in McAllen, Texas.

The \$280,953 grant was awarded to the district's Business, Industry, and Public Services Early College Academy (BIPS) located at Nixon High School.

The JET Program provides funding for equipment to eligible educational institutions for the purpose of developing career and technical educational courses and may include courses offering dual-credit and technical educational programs. The equipment must be used to train students offering dual credit career and technical educational opportunities that include welding.

"The partnership between LISD and TWC has been crucial towards creating a strong career-ready workforce that ensures the success of our community," said Roger Garcia LISD Director of College, Career and Military Readiness. "Thanks to TWC we have been able to create valuable career-ready opportunities for our students."

lege, students will earn a Level One Welding Certification.

"In the 2021-2022 school year, Nixon HS will be opening the doors to our new Career and Technical Education building. This building will house many hands-on programs including our welding program," said Cassandra Mendoza Nixon High School Principal. "The JET Grant monies were used to purchase the state- of-the-art welding equipment and supplies for students to utilize and prepare them for the workforce. We are extremely grateful to have received this grant."

The grant monies were spent on purchasing equipment such as a Plasma Cutter, Hydraulic Pipe Bender, Bevel Machine, Drill Press, Welding Cutting Kits, and Ventilation Systems.

The Business, Industry, and Public Services Early College Academy located at Nixon High School offers students the opportunity to earn up to 60 college hours and/or an associate degree with a concentration in law enforcement, education, cosmetology, welding, accounting, transportation and logistics, and auto collision repair from Laredo College.

Construction continues throughout the district

ISD is proceeding with the construction renovations of several schools and support facilities including the former Civic Center, Dovalina Elementary School, Kawas School, Nixon Elementary High School's Vocational/ Agriculture and ROTC Building, and Martin High School's Multi-Purpose Building.

The Civic Center complex is divided into three main buildings: Performing Arts Center, Administrative Building, and Conference Center. The buildings are set to open in 2022.

The construction for Dovalina Elementary School's new campus located along the riverbanks of the Rio Grande River at 1700 W. Anna Ave. is underway. The facility will feature 21 instructional classrooms, two computer labs, a science lab, Library Media Center, a fine arts classroom, music classroom, and two self-contained classrooms.

A new Multi-Purpose Building is under construction at Martin High School. The new two-story Science and Culi-



nary Arts Building will have a multi-use student gathering atrium and a culinary arts lab with a full commercial kitchen and classrooms, spacious dance studio as well as science classrooms and a robotics and technology lab.

The new Kawas Elementary campus will feature 31 instructional classrooms from Pre-K-fifth grade, three computer labs, two science labs, a music room, cafeteria and full kitchen prep, administrative offices, library media center, gymnasium, nurses' station, drop off/pick up

lanes for students, parking lot improvements, security fencing and facility access control, covered canopies, and playground.

Nixon High School's new Vocational and Agricultural Building will include a new Auto Technology Shop, Auto Collision Shop, Carpentry Shop, Cosmetology Lab, Meat Processing Lab, and Agriculture and Welding Shop. Each shop will have its own instructional classroom adjacent to it. In addition, a new stand-alone JROTC Building will be constructed.

LISD also has plans to reconstruct Cigarroa Middle School and renovate Ligarde Elementary School. Cigarroa High School will be completed in two phases. Phase one will include a new two-story facility that will replace the existing academic wings, vocational classrooms, and administration offices

At Heights Elementary, the district will add four new class-rooms, a new library, a new playground and will expand the teachers' parking lot.





LISD Educators Publish Work in the International Electronic Journal of Elementary Education

hat started as a research project for a pair of Laredo Independent School District teachers, resulted in a published article for the International Electronic Journal of Elementary Education.

While working on achieving their Master's Degree in Education Curriculum and Instruction, Stephanie Solis, a choir and theater instructor at Lamar Middle School, and Diana Monsivais Wico, a Pre-Kindergarten teacher at Ryan Elementary School, decided to combine their love of fine arts into a study and research project.

Throughout their combined years in the field of education as teachers, both educators have seen how students react positively to theater arts, whether they are performing or participate as audience members.

During one of their master's courses, they were asked to select a topic that sparked an interest for them in education and how it related to the benefit of students. They were easily inspired from an activity they planned for their students during the Spring Semester of 2019. Wico prepared an activity and invited Lamar Middle School Theater students to perform a short play for the early childhood students. The pair of teachers were amazed at the direct impact the activity had for both group of participants.

It was after this activity that both Solis and Wico selected the topic of theater as a beneficial tool for early childhood development. "During our literature review we discovered that although some research has been made on how theater benefits students overcome

early childhood adversities, there is not enough research done on the benefits of theater to provide coping skills and help the development of children," said Solis. This literature review took months of research and constant editing to make sure that our findings were clear. We hope that this article review raises awareness of the benefits that theater arts can provide for students. With that said, we would like to see more studies develop on the focus of theater arts not just nationally, but internationally. We believe that every child can benefit from this art form and should be extensively used as part of our foundation in education."

They were notified about their work being published by their Texas A&M International University Professor Dr. Tonya Huber. Huber was instrumental in assisting with editing and formatting their findings.

The article highlights the utility of identifying early childhood adversities through dramatic play and theater arts. Understanding the impact of early childhood education, their focus included beneficial, qualitative observations of the positive therapeutic outcomes when participating in theater arts activities. Further in-depth research included how to identify adversities in early childhood and to learn about the therapeutic effects that theater arts and dramatic play have on children.

Their findings for their research and article show similar beliefs that theater arts can have a positive effect on a child's social and emotional development, and theater arts can be utilized as a venue for children to express themselves.

"This experience propelled us to continue to incorporate new techniques in our classroom," said Wico. "My mindset is if I

can do it then so can my kids, I am so proud of their effort and how well they were able to understand the concept and process of putting words and drawings into a book."

The published article, Theater Arts as a Beneficial and Educational Venue in Identifying and Providing Therapeutic Coping Skills for Early Childhood Adversities: A Systematic Review of Literature can be found in the International Electronic Journal of Elementary Education, March 2021, Volume 13, Issue 4, pages 457-467.
