School Dashboard:

The School Dashboard results were made public by the state last week. 2018 is the first year results for the College and Career state indicator were provided and a color assigned (for the Class of 2018). Below I have provided some info from an earlier report that provides a summary of this important indicator.

I have inserted some information below from the CDE website at https://goo.gl/HVoqxa and https://www.cde.ca.gov/ta/ac/cm/ regarding the California's School Dashboard accountability system. Below is a table that communicates the focus areas for the School Dashboard which is divided into two areas: state and local indicators. Following the table, I inserted information from CDE found in the links above regarding the College/career readiness indicators.

The purpose of this information is for you to get a snapshot of one of the six measures assessed (College/career readiness) and what performance a school must to reach the "Prepared" performance level on this indicator. In light of recent and ongoing reductions in CTE funding, it is important to keep in mind the importance of this indicator and its components .

Note that below both the "Prepared" and "Approaching Prepared" performance levels can be met by receiving a high school diploma and completing a CTE pathway (with one additional measure to meet "Prepared"). On the 2017 CAASPP, 58% (out of 134) students scored Level 3 or higher on the ELA test and 63% of our students scored a Level 2 or higher on the math portion. Forty-nine percent of our seniors met the UC/CSU "a-g" requirement (class of 2018) and no student met earned dual-enrollment credit. All of our freshmen are getting college credit for the required "Success 101" class which I believe should count towards the dual enrollment measure but we have to get the state to approve this.

The importance of having CTE pathway completers, dual enrollment options, a-g completers, and strong performance on the AP and CASSPP is illuminated by the measures the state has determined indicate college preparedness below.

There are three levels that measure postsecondary preparedness in the College/Career Indicator (CCI):

- Prepared
- Approaching Prepared
- Not Prepared

Prepared Level - Does the graduate meet at least 1 measure below?

High School Diploma and any one of the following:

- Career Technical Education (CTE) Pathway Completion plus one of the following criteria:
 - o Smarter Balanced Summative Assessments: At least a Level 3 "Standard Met" on ELA or Mathematics and at least a Level 2 "Standard Nearly Met" in the other subject area
 - o One semester/two quarters of Dual Enrollment with passing grade (Academic/CTE subjects)
- At least a Level 3 "Standard Met" on both ELA and Mathematics on Smarter Balanced Summative Assessments
- Completion of two semesters/three quarters of Dual Enrollment with a passing grade (Academic and/or CTE subjects)
- Passing Score on two Advanced Placement (AP) Exams or two International Baccalaureate (IB) Exams
- Completion of courses that meet the University of California (UC) a-g criteria plus one of the following criteria:
 - o CTE Pathway completion
 - Smarter Balanced Summative Assessments: At least a Level 3 "Standard Met" on ELA or Mathematics and at least a Level 2 "Standard Nearly Met" in the other subject area
 - o One semester/two quarters of Dual Enrollment with passing grade (Academic/CTE subjects)
 - o Passing score on one AP Exam OR on one IB Exam

Approaching Prepared Level - Does the graduate meet at least 1 measure below?

High School Diploma and any one of the following:

- CTE Pathway completion
- Scored at least Level 2 "Standard Nearly Met" on one or both ELA and Mathematics Smarter Balanced Summative Assessments
- Completion of one semester/two quarters of Dual Enrollment with passing grade (Academic/CTE subjects)
- Completion of courses that meet the UC a-g criteria

December 2018 Guidance & Counseling Report: Lara Andersen

Link Crew: The Link Crew field trip to the Leader conference was a success, 14 students attended. We took an official tour at Whittier College on the way to the program at La Habra High. Last week, Link Crew held its freshman 1:1 academic check in conferences (:5 min) with every freshman during homeroom. This week and next Link Crew is holding it's "Cocoa and Cram" for final exam studying. There were over 70 students there last night.

Freshman & sophomore Guidance:

Trotter and Stout held 2nd quarter progress conferences with all the 9th/10th graders who received D or F on quarter report card. Referrals to homeroom intervention and after school Math tutoring were generated, and SSTs held.

Home Room/Lunch Intervention: Kathleen and Lara identified 21 freshmen who had 2 or more Ds/Fs and pulled them into a Home Room – Lunch intervention from 12:13 – 1:10 from 11/27 – 12/15 to help them get missing assignments done, prepare for test re-takes, basically anything to get their grades up to passing. They were identified based on Quarter 2 progress reports. Once students got their grades up to a stable D, they were released back to their regular homeroom. Keith Lovelace from the Ed Center joined us most days to tutor math, and David Fulkerson joined us most days at lunch to help his own students. There were some successes, but some of them remained unmotivated.

STRONG WORKFORCE GRANT: Randy, Barry and Lara met with Cerro Coso Dean Deanna Campbell, Kern County director of College & Career Pathways Bonita Steele, and Cerro Coso Dean of CTE Maura Murabito to discuss a Strong Workforce Grant for our district and partnering with Cerro Coso. Then Randy and Lara went to the grant explanation meeting in Bakersfield on Tuesday 12/11 to hear directly from CDE on how to think about our Letters of Intent applications. These funds are to improve our CTE program.

Junior & senior Guidance:

Andersen and Kane also held quarter report card conferences with all the 11th/12th graders who received D or F on quarter report card. Referrals to homeroom intervention and after school Math tutoring were generated. SST meetings were held for seniors at risk for failing

Success Program: The last group of Success 104 seniors will finish 12/14 and we also ran 2 groups of 102 and 1 group of 103 this quarter. Third quarter will see 2 groups of 103 and 2 more groups of 102. Seniors seem to be lagging in their "Senior Portfolio" preparations which include: a cover letter, resume, brag sheet responses, letter of recommendation, junior year interview comments, graphic of strengths/values/passions/future goals, definition of success paragraph and students are able to discuss What do I want and How do I get it. This is in preparation for the Senior Exit Interview that are being planned for some time in February. The UC/CSU application deadline passed on 11/30, although CSU extended this deadline to 12/15. Lara is

working with 20 seniors on their Common Applications to private colleges and there are also many students applying to out of state public universities as well.

College Entrance Testing:

PSAT: scores are available to students this week.

44 Juniors took the PSAT with a mean ERW score of 520 and a mean Math score of 520. There were 10 who did not meet college ready benchmarks for both ERW and Math, an additional 9 who did not meet the Math benchmark and an additional 1 who did not meet the ERW benchmark.

42 sophomores took the PSAT with a mean ERW score of 497 and Math of 471, neither of which meet the college ready benchmark.

SAT: December 1

November SAT results: just 4 students tested at MHS or LPHS. Mean score 1092, with a range of 800-1440.

ASVAB: results arrived 11/8, in Success 103; Lara is having students complete the Find Your Interest: FYI to learn down career clusters that match with personal preferences and skill levels.

Prevention:

Our local CHP has received the \$6,000 grant to execute an Every 15 Minutes program for the spring. For us to do this prior to prom, we're planning April 3 & 4th

Athletics:

December Athletics Report

All winter sports began league competition early this year <u>before</u> winter break, December 11th! This is due to the state moving dates forward for state playoff games and due to Boron being added to our league. We do not have any other choice, but to have league competitions during final exams week. However, we are hoping for as little impact as possible to the student's regular schedules. For example, soccer is away the Tuesday before final exams, but both girls and boys are playing at the same time to get them home earlier. Also basketball will be traveling on Friday December 21st, but they will only miss one final exam and teachers have been notified and the Athletic Director is willing to proctor exams Thursday afternoon if teachers so choose. Boys basketball is managing to host the 41st Christmas Classic December 28th and 29th. This tournament has shrunk over the years, but some dedicated teams still ask to come to Bishop for the memorable team experiences. Academic eligibility will be determined January 11th. Random drug testing continues and we are fortunate to only have one positive test thus far this school year. Spring sports start practicing January 14. All spring head coaches will be returning! This makes for a hopeful smooth transition into spring sports.
