





Dino, played by Joe Longardner, is shown in a scene from the play, fighting with a boy from the settlement house.








Co-operation was one of the main words the "Tusitala" staff used this year. By working busily after school to create a different and bigger year-book, the finished product was completed.




MEMBERS SLAVING AWAY


What would the world do without farmers? Well, as long as there are boys and F.F.A., this will not become a major problem. In F.F.A. boys learn how to get along with other people.


F. T. A. HELPS TO CREATE INTEREST


STUDENT COUNCIL









ENGLISH AS A BASIS



By the way, did you know the answer?










JUNIORS ANALYZE FINANCES


