

**Budget and propositions approved** 

#Schenectedy Rising

As you know, this was a big week for us with the school budget vote and an unprecedented long list of propositions, including the the Schenectady Revitalization Plan 2030, and the purchase of two buildings. Thank you to all of you and all Schenectady residents who went out to vote and supported our proposals. I'm pleased to share that everything passed by an overwhelming margin.

The final vote tallies on the budget and propositions were:

- Budget Proposition #1 (Budget) Yes 1040 | No 245
- Budget Proposition #2 (Revitalization Plan) Yes 1026 | No 267
- Budget Proposition #3 (Liberty Purchase) Yes 851 | No 437
- Budget Proposition #4 (Keane Purchase) Yes 1053 | No 238
- Budget Proposition #5 (Student BOE) Yes 1051 | No 237

Additionally, voters selected Amanda Sponable-Pantalone (908), Nohelani Etienne (792), and Bernice Rivera (972) to fill the three open seats on the board of education.

Now the work begins. Since we now have community approval, we will begin the planning process for the Capital Project work that will be slated for the next seven years. Our plans need to be developed and then submitted to the NYS Education Department for approval. I will keep you updated as we move along.
