#### **MAY 2023**

Focus Area: PK-5 Presenter:

#### **LER**

<u>Noteworthy:</u> Chewonki visited Grade 1 students throughout the day on April 12th. Students enjoyed listening to and participating in an interactive presentation on the "Owls of Maine". Chewonki's school presentations have always been well done. The presenters are patient with our students who are eager to ask many questions. The slideshow and exhibits, including live animals, captivate our young learners! Many thanks to Mr. Cullen McGough who sponsored the visit!

<u>Challenge:</u> As with all the schools across our district at this time of year, testing season is upon us! While scheduling and encouraging students to focus and do their best can be challenging, we do look forward to seeing the growth our students made this year. We will then use the data to set new goals for the 2023-24 school year.

#### RV

Noteworthy: We continue to focus on our 4 Bs - Be Safe, Be Respectful, Be Responsible, and Be Kind. These 4 Bs are the pillars of our school where teachers specifically teach lessons around the 4 Bs. In addition to this, Mrs. Munzing, our social worker, and I have taught a bullying prevention unit to give students the tools and knowledge to recognize the difference between bullying and conflict and what to do when they recognize bullying or they themselves are being bullied. This totaled 40 lessons that Mrs. Munzing and I team taught to each grade and classroom. Our full time nurse has started at RV - welcome Monica Jimenez and thank you to the Board for approving this!

<u>Challenge:</u> This is the first full year students have experienced what we consider a normal school year without full class quarantines and shut downs in over 3 years. After much thought when reflecting on students' needs, both academically and socially, students are still building up their stamina to make it through a full day/week/year. In 3rd grade, this is their first regular school year in their school career, 4th grade had one year before the disruption, and 5th grade had two. This lack of stamina has resulted in an increase in behaviors, and an increase in student to student conflict, as students are still learning how to collaborate and talk with each other.

#### HT

<u>Noteworthy</u>: Before April break, the West Gardiner Fire Department sponsored a spring egg hunt for all PreK-5 students and our PTA held a spring Scholastic Book Fair. Local author, Joshua Marsella, is sponsoring a 5th grade writing challenge and will publish a collection of student stories without any charge to students or the school. We are so appreciative to be surrounded by the support of our community!

<u>Challenge:</u> Though not unique to HT, we have launched spring testing season which will last nearly all month long. This important spring testing requires students to tap into their stamina to show their best thinking even when fatigue can begin to set in for our PreK-5 learners. We are trying to be creative about ways to encourage and inspire students to work hard on each of the spring tests they'll take this month.

## **PRCS**

<u>Noteworthy:</u> Our fourth school nurse has officially joined MSAD 11! During the first two weeks in April PRCS had 266 visits to the nurse's office so we are thrilled to have a full time nurse in each of our elementary schools!

Challenge: This year's spring testing season we are adding the NWEA Through Year to the schedule.



Focus Area: 6+ Presenter: Sims

#### **GRMS**

Noteworthy: Rick Sieberg with our local Fire Department did a drive by of the school several times throughout the day right before break with sirens going for 8th grade students to witness a Doppler effect (a tonal drop due to decaying sound waves/decreased sound wave frequency). Students were very excited to get to see science in action and apply what they were learning to real life scenarios. Additionally, all of the ELA classes at each grade level are currently doing units on poetry where they are reading, analyzing, and writing their own poems. The hallways are full of beautiful, deep, insightful, and creative writings!

<u>Challenge</u>: Testing season is upon us and with the need to do two sets of testing this year, the end of year schedule is quite full. The challenge is getting students to take both sets of assessments without fatigue setting in as they are taking 5 to 6 assessments at each grade level. We want students to do their very best so our data is reflective of the growth they have actually made this year and can be used with fidelity in setting goals for the upcoming school year. We are working on some creative incentive ideas to keep them going and to keep them engaged in the assessments.

#### **GAHS**

## Noteworthy:

We are six weeks away from graduation for the class of 2023. Seniors are busy applying to colleges, universities, and training programs, and applying for scholarships.

We have had a speaker (Dan Kipp) in for class meetings to talk about the importance of healthy relationships and will be finishing class meetings with providing all grade levels with important end of the year information.

Students in grades 9-11, along with current 8th grade students have registered for their 2023/24 courses, and we are working through the process of building the 2023/24 master schedule. Testing season is also upon us with NWEA assessments for students in grades 9 and 10, and Advanced Placement testing for students in grades 10-12.

## Challenge:

Social media and substance use (primarily nicotine and marjuana products) continue to be the biggest challenge for our students.

#### **Adult Education**

<u>Noteworthy</u>: Community enrichment registrations have been 522 since the start of the calendar year, as compared to 294 from the same time frame last year. The most popular course offered was "Who gets what when? Serving as a personal representative of an estate in Maine."

We anticipate four more likely HiSETgraduates for graduation on Tuesday June 20th, 2023. We have three that have completed HiSET that are not participating.

<u>Challenge:</u> There is a significant amount of planning happening for next year with the new information system, renewal of a large grant application, and discussions about shared adult education services. This is exciting and exhausting, it's busy now and summer is going to be just as busy!

#### **Athletics**

<u>Noteworthy:</u> Spring sports are off to a good start. The turf field has certainly assisted in getting teams playing outside before their grass fields are ready to be played on.



Challenge: No Challenges to report at this time.

Focus Area: System Directors Presenter:

#### **Business Office**

<u>Noteworthy:</u> The District has received its MSMA Workers Compensation mod rate for FY 2024. And the news is fabulous ...the District's mod rate has been reduced from 1.2 to .88 for the 2023 - 2024 school year.

<u>Challenge:</u> Struggling to find time to write a job description and hire for the new business office position. Once the budget has been set, hiring will become the priority.

## **Technology**

<u>Noteworthy:</u> The technology department is focused on work that needs to be completed to make the upcoming testing successful. This includes everything from configuring testing browsers, making sure student laptops are working correctly, uploading student and class rosters, and troubleshooting issues.. <u>Challenge:</u> Some students who are no longer enrolled in schools leave without returning equipment. Getting equipment back is time consuming.

## **Special Services**

<u>Noteworthy:</u> The Guided Reading Library that was purchased with funds from the American Rescue Plan has been getting alot of use. We have several teachers, K-8, who regularly borrow books to use with students.

<u>Challenge:</u> Using projected caseload numbers to reconfigure staffing for next year to ensure that we're meeting the needs of the students across the district, staying within regulations, being equitable, retaining good staff, and not increasing our budget.

#### Curriculum

Noteworthy: The United Way of Kennebec Valley has awarded our district \$20,000 to help our staff learn how to support students and families in managing anxiety. We will be contracting with Lynn Lyons, a psychotherapist that specializes in reducing anxiety through proactive strategies. Our data suggests that levels of anxiety have increased substantially since Covid and we need guidance and support to enable students to effectively access education. This continuous professional learning experience will start in the fall. Coupling that with our ongoing partnership with Healthy Communities of the Capital Area will provide our staff and students much needed opportunities for learning and improved wellness.

<u>Challenge:</u> We have just launched the spring assessment window. Students in grades K-11 will be engaged in online assessments in ELA, math, and science. It is always a challenge in schools to balance instruction, the need for ongoing learning data, and the end of year events.
