Resolution Calling for Full and Fair Funding of California's Public Schools

- WHEREAS, California has the sixth largest economy in the world, and the largest Gross Domestic Product (GDP) of any state in the nation; and
- WHEREAS, despite California's leadership in the global economy, the state falls in the nation's bottom quintile on nearly every measure of public K-12 school funding and school staffing; and
- **WHEREAS**, California ranks 45th nationally in the percentage of taxable income spent on education, 41st in per-pupil funding, 45th in pupil—teacher ratios and 48th in pupil—staff ratios; and
- WHEREAS, K-12 school funding has not substantially increased, on an inflation-adjusted basis, for more than a decade; and
- WHEREAS, under the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), state funding for K-12 schools has only this year recently returned to levels predating the Great Recession of 2007; and
- WHEREAS, the modest revenue increases since the implementation of LCFF have been eroded by rapidly increasing costs for health care, pensions, transportation and utilities; and
- WHEREAS, 58 percent of California's public school students are eligible for free and reduced-price lunch 13 percent above the national average and 23 percent of California students are English learners, more than twice the national average; and
- WHEREAS, California's investment in public schools is out of alignment with its wealth, its ambitions, its demographics and the demands of a 21st-century education; and
- WHEREAS, in 2007, a bipartisan group of California leaders commissioned a report titled *Getting Down to Facts*, which stated it would take an additional \$17 billion annually to meet the State Board of Education achievement targets for K-12 schools; and
- WHEREAS, in 2016, a California School Boards Association (CSBA) report, California's Challenge: Adequately Funding Education in the 21st Century, updated the Getting Down to Facts data and determined that, adjusting for inflation, an additional \$22 billion to \$40 billion annually would be required to provide all public school students with access to a high-quality education; and
- WHEREAS, California funds schools at roughly \$1,961 per student less than the national average, which translates to approximately \$3,462 per student when adjusted for California being a high-cost state; and

WHEREAS, California trails the average of the top 10 states by almost \$7,000 in perpupil funding; and

WHEREAS, in Robles-Wong v. State of California, a group of plaintiffs led by CSBA argued that California's school funding system violated Article IX of the State Constitution by denying all students access to an education that prepares them for economic security and full participation in our democratic institutions; and

WHEREAS, the California Supreme Court declined to hear the case by a 4-3 margin, prompting Justice Goodwin H. Liu to write: "It is regrettable that this court, having recognized education as a fundamental right in a landmark decision 45 years ago [Serrano v. Priest (1971) 5 Cal.3d 584], should now decline to address the substantive meaning of that right."; and

WHEREAS, in order to prepare our students for participation in a democratic society and an increasingly competitive, technology-driven global economy, California must fund schools at a level sufficient to support student success; and

WHEREAS, despite its vast wealth, California has consistently underfunded public education while widening its scope, adding new requirements and raising standards without providing appropriate resources to prepare all students for college, career and civic life; and

WHEREAS, if California is to close opportunity and achievement gaps and create a public school system that offers consistently high levels of education, the State must provide schools with the resources to meet the needs of their specific populations;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the members of the governing board of the Los Banos Unified School District of Merced County, State of California urges the State Legislature to fund California public schools at the national average or higher by the year 2020, and at a level that is equal to or above the average of the top 10 states nationally by 2025 and to maintain, at a minimum, this level of funding until otherwise decreed.

RESOLUTION DESIGNATING PERSONS PERFORMING VOLUNTEER SERVICES WITHOUT PAY FOR THE SCHOOL DISTRICT OR COUNTY SUPERINTENDENT AS EMPLOYEES FOR THE LIMITED PURPOSE OF QUALIFYING FOR WORKERS' COMPENSATION INSURANCE COVERAGE UNDER CALIFORNIA LABOR CODE SECTIONS 3200, ET SEQ.

WHEREAS, persons who perform volunteer services without pay for a school district or county superintendent are not currently covered by Workers' Compensation insurance since they do not fall within the definition of "employee" as defined by California Labor Code, section 3351 and 3351.5, which governs eligibility for Workers' Compensation Insurance coverage, and are in fact specifically excluded from such designation by Labor Code section 3352, subdivision (i); and

WHEREAS, the state legislature has seen fit, by passing Labor Code section 3364.5, to provide that in certain circumstances where persons perform volunteer services for a school district or county superintendent, such persons may be deemed employees of the school district or county superintendent while performing such service in order to qualify for Workers' Compensation Insurance coverage, provided the governing body of the school district or county superintendent has adopted a resolution so declaring; and

WHEREAS, this school district or county superintendent desires to provide, as authorized by the Labor Code, Workers' Compensation Insurance coverage to persons who perform volunteer services without pay on its behalf;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the governing board of the Los Banos Unified School District, under the Authority of California labor Code 3364.5 adopts and declares the following:

All persons who perform volunteer services without pay for the Los Banos Unified School District, while performing such volunteer services, hereby designated "employees" for the limited purpose of qualifying for Workers' Compensation Insurance coverage under California Labor Code sections 3200, et seq.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that "volunteer services without pay" is defined for purposes of this resolution as services performed by any person who receives no remuneration other than remuneration for meals, transportation, lodging, or reimbursement of any other incidental expenses associated with such volunteer services.

Students

Bus Rider Rules

The following rules apply at all times when students are riding a school bus, including when on school activity trips:

1. Riders shall follow the instructions and directions of the bus driver at all times.

(cf. 3542 - School Bus Drivers)

2. Riders should arrive at their designated bus stop on time and stand in a safe place at the stop to wait quietly for the bus.

(cf. 3541 - Transportation Routes and Services)

- 3. Riders shall enter the bus in an orderly manner and go directly to their seats.
- 4. Riders shall sit down and fasten any passenger restraint systems. Riders shall remain seated while the bus is in motion.
- 5. Riders shall not block the aisle or emergency exit with their body or personal belongings. Riders may bring large or bulky items, such as class projects or musical instruments, on the bus only if the item does not displace any other rider or obstruct the driver's vision.
- 6. Riders should be courteous to the driver and to fellow passengers. Vulgarity, rude, or abusive behavior is prohibited.
- 7. Any noise or behavior that could distract the driver, such as loud talking, scuffling or fighting, throwing objects, or standing or changing seats, is prohibited and may lead to suspension of riding privileges.

(cf. 5144 - Discipline)

8. Riders shall not use tobacco products, eat, or drink while riding the bus.

(cf. 5131.62 - Tobacco)

9. Riders may bring electronic devices onto the bus only if such devices are permitted at

school. If the use of cellular telephones or similar devices disrupts the safe operation of the school bus, the bus driver may direct the student to no longer use the device on the bus.

(cf. 5131 - Conduct)

- 10. Riders shall not put any part of the body out of the window nor throw any item from the bus.
- 11. Riders shall help keep the bus and the area around the bus stop clean. Riders shall not damage or deface the bus or tamper with bus equipment. Any students found tampering or defacing bus equipment will be responsible for the cost of any necessary repairs or replacements.
- 12. Service animals are permitted on school transportation services; all other animals are prohibited. (Education Code 39839; 13 CCR 1216)

(cf. 6163.2 - Animals at School)

- 13. Upon reaching their destination, riders shall remain seated until the bus comes to a complete stop and upon the signal from the driver, unfasten any restraint system, enter the aisle, and go directly to the exit.
- 14. Riders should be alert for traffic when leaving the bus and shall follow the district's transportation safety plan when crossing the road and exiting the bus.

(cf. 3543 - Transportation Safety and Emergencies)

The driver or any passenger shall report any violation of the district's bus rules to the principal or designee. The principal or designee shall notify the student's parent/guardian of the misbehavior, determine the severity of the misconduct, and take action accordingly. In instances of a severe violation or repeated offenses, the rider may be denied transportation for a period of time determined appropriate by the principal or designee. (replace see paragraph below)

Any individual shall report any violation of the district's bus rules to the driver. The driver shall notify the student's parent/guardian and principal of the misbehavior, determine the severity of the misconduct, and take action accordingly. In instances of a severe violation or repeated offenses, the rider may be denied transportation for a period of time determined appropriate by the driver and transportation supervisor.

Bus drivers shall not deny transportation services except as directed by the principal or designee.(delete)

Bus Surveillance Systems

The Superintendent or designee shall monitor the use and maintenance of the district's bus surveillance system. Students are prohibited from tampering with the bus surveillance system. Any student found tampering with the system shall be subject to discipline and shall be

responsible for the costs of any necessary repairs or replacement.

(cf. 3515.4 - Recovery for Property Loss or Damage) (cf. 5131.5 - Vandalism, Theft and Graffiti)

Camera supports may be installed in all buses. Cameras may be rotated among the buses and activated at the discretion of the Superintendent or designee.

The content of any recording is a student record and may only be accessed in accordance with the district's policy and administrative regulation concerning student records.




K-6 Enrollment (including SDC) by Month

Basically, if a District permits any non-curriculum-related student groups to meet on school premises during non-instructional time, then, regardless of any policy to the contrary, it has created a "limited open forum".

This indirectly supports Board goals. Student organizations reinforce the instructional program giving students practice in democratic self-government.

Juvenile Court School

The district shall accept for credit any coursework satisfactorily completed by students while detained in a juvenile court school or county or state-operated institution. District students who successfully complete district graduation requirements while so detained shall receive a diploma from the school they last attended. (Education Code 48645.5)

College Courses

The district shall give credit toward high school graduation for course work successfully completed at a junior college or state college, provided that:

- 1. The student applies in writing for the credit. (Code of Regulations, Title 5, Section 1630)
- 2. The course subject is included in the high school course of study. (Title 5, Section 1630)
- 3. At the student's request, the course is not being applied for credit toward college graduation. (Title 5, Section 1630)
- 4. Three and one-third semester periods' of high school credit is given for the same number of units earned in college. (Title 5, Section 1630)
- 5. The student receives the same letter grade for the high school credit as is granted by the college.

Athletics:

- 1. Students exempted from regular physical education class when participating in a regular school-sponsored interscholastic athletic program carried on wholly or partially after regular school hours shall be granted P.E. credit for the time spent in the athletic program.
- 2. Students will only be allowed to use athletic participation for P.E. credit after successfully completing both the fall and spring semesters of 9th grade P.E. in their 9th grade year with a grade of "C" or better.

Marching Band:

- 1. Marching Band may be taken during the fall semester and used toward meeting 1 (one) semester of the physical education requirement for each semester completed (with a maximum of 2 semesters for 1 year credit).
- 2. Students will only be allowed to use marching band for P.E. credit after successfully completing both the fall and spring semesters of 9th grade P.E. in their 9th grade year with a grade of "C" or better.

Co-Sponsor Agreement

IMPACT INTERN PROGRAM

2018 - 2020 Academic Years

Enclosed is a co-sponsor agreement for your educational agency official to sign and return. When hiring an intern, a co-sponsor agreement between an employing agency and a CA Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CCTC) approved Program Sponsor must be in place in order to comply with CCTC requirements. The Teachers College of San Joaquin (TCSJ) IMPACT Intern Credential Program is housed within the San Joaquin County Office of Education.

GENERAL PARTNERSHIP AGREEMENTS:

Intern programs are the result of a partnership between the institution that prepares teachers (Program Sponsor) and the employer. The district or employing agency agrees that there is a need for teachers and that certificated employees will not be displaced when hiring interns.

- 1. The employing agency shall ensure that site administrators with employed interns are aware of the shared responsibilities set forth in this agreement.
- 2. The employing agency shall assign a representative (e.g. Assistant Superintendent or site Principal) to act as a contact person to the TCSJ IMPACT Intern Program.
- 3. The employing agency shall provide representation at Consortium meetings.
- 4. The employing agency ensures the intern candidate is a teacher of record in a minimum .5 FTE capacity fully aligned to credential being sought.
- 5. Intern assignments must enable the candidate to attend classes on time and complete the requirements of the TCSJ IMPACT Intern Program.
 - a. To the extent possible, and in accordance with the educational agency bargaining unit guidelines, the educational agency agrees to assign minimal extra/co-curricular activities and/or provide early release to the intern.
- 6. The employing agency shall respond to requests for evaluation data as requested by the CCTC and TCSJ IMPACT Intern Program, including survey completion, demographic and/or retention information.
- 7. Interns who are admitted into the Teachers College of San Joaquin IMPACT Intern Credential Program must:
 - a. Be employed as the teacher of record in an assignment that aligns with the credential being pursued (Mild/Moderate, Moderate/Severe, Early Childhood Special Education, Multiple Subject or Single Subject classroom);
 - b. Complete TB testing and fingerprinting with the employing agency;
 - c. Be employed in a setting where video capture is permitted for candidate reflection and Teaching Performance Assessments (TPAs);
 - d. Be employed at a site with a fully qualified site administrator;
 - e. Be employed as the teacher of record in a minimum .5 FTE capacity fully aligned to credential being sought;

- f. Be employed in a face-to-face instructional setting with the same group of students on a daily or weekly basis as determined by the master schedule;
- g. Provide all documents required by the CCTC and TCSJ IMPACT Intern Program;
- h. Be enrolled in the TCSJ IMPACT Intern Program.

PEER SUPPORT/COACHING & MENTORING:

Pursuant to California Education Code 44321, the supervision, mentoring and support of interns is the responsibility of both the Commission-approved teacher preparation program and the employer. Per CCTC, employers are responsible for ensuring that the intern they have hired is supported. **Prior to an intern assuming daily teaching responsibilities**, the employer must identify a peer coach/mentor. The peer coach/mentor may not be the intern's supervisor/evaluator.

The combination of **employer-provided** support and mentoring, and program support and supervision (provided by TCSJ) to the intern must include the following:

- 1. A minimum of 144 hours of annual support/mentoring and supervision:
 - a. Support may include, but is not limited to weekly course planning of curriculum and assessments, coaching within the classroom, and problem-solving regarding student issues.
 - b. A minimum of five hours per week of support/mentoring and guidance must be provided to an intern teacher by the employing agency.
 - c. The program sponsor will provide opportunities to fulfill a portion of the 144 hours of general support needed each year.
 - d. The program sponsor will provide the intern with procedures to document and monitor the CCTC required hours of mentoring and support from the employer and TCSJ IMPACT Intern Program.
 - e. The intern will be responsible for documenting hours of support received.
 - 2. An additional 45 hours of support/mentoring and supervision specific to meeting the needs of English learners shall be provided to an intern teacher unless the intern holds a CLAD, EL Authorization or has passed all sections of the CTEL Examination.
 - a. The employing agency must identify an employee who will be immediately available to assist the intern with planning lessons that are appropriately designed and differentiated for English learners, for assessing language needs and progress, and for support of language accessible instruction through in-classroom modeling and coaching as needed.
 - b. The identified coach/mentor *may* be the same peer coach/mentor that is providing general support and supervision provided that the individual possesses an English learner authorization and will be immediately available to assist the intern teacher in working with English learners.
 - c. The program sponsor will provide opportunities to fulfill a portion of the 45 hours of support/mentoring and supervision specific to meeting the needs of English learners.

- d. The program sponsor will provide the intern with procedures to document and monitor the CCTC required hours of mentoring and support from the employer and TCSJ IMPACT Intern Program.
- 3. The peer coach/mentor must meet the following minimum qualifications:
 - a. Hold a valid corresponding Clear or Life credential in the content area he/she is supporting;
 - b. Possess EL Authorization if responsible for providing specified EL support;
 - c. Have three years of successful teaching experience;
 - d. Agree to complete 10 hours of initial orientation, provided by the program.
- 4. Sufficient resources are to be provided, including the identification of protected time for employer-provided peer coach/mentor to work with the intern **within** the school day.
- 5. The employer determines the terms of employment for the peer coach/mentor and additional personnel. It is at the discretion of the employer to determine if the peer coach/mentor and/or additional personnel receive compensation and if so, compensation is the responsibility of the employer. The employer agrees to provide any substitute release time necessary to train the peer coach/mentor and for the peer coach to conduct observations if needed.
- 6. The employing agency shall honor the confidentiality between the intern and peer coach/mentor while monitoring the contact and effectiveness of the peer coach/mentor.
- 7. Issues regarding a peer coach/mentor will be addressed in a timely way, with a plan for intervention or reassignment, if necessary.
- 8. The employing agency agrees to allow, after parent permission is granted, the Support Supervisor to observe Education Specialist candidates during an IEP meeting, or failing that, to debrief with a participating educational agency administrator who was present at a recent IEP meeting conducted by the candidate.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF EMPLOYING AGENCIES/DISTRICTS

The employing agency acknowledges that:

- Candidates will pay tuition/fees during their enrollment in the program and, if appropriate, the employer will assist the TCSJ IMPACT Intern Program Student Account's office to establish monthly payroll deduction of tuition for the intern. Credential recommendations cannot be made if the candidate is not in "good financial standing".
- 2. The credential recommendation is jointly made between the educational agency and the TCSJ IMPACT Intern Program. Employment decisions, such as continuing employment and tenure decisions, are separate from credentialing decisions. In the instance when the employing agency, for whatever reason, no longer employs an intern candidate, the program sponsor will make the recommendation for the appropriate credential if the candidate has successfully completed the intern program.

- 3. Should a candidate not fulfill the completion requirements of the TCSJ IMPACT Intern Program, including timely payment of tuition, the program may drop the candidate, which we acknowledge may create employment issues for the educational agency. Program personnel will consult with appropriate educational agency staff and the candidate prior to this decision.
- 4. Candidates will be compensated for units earned in the program in the manner normally provided to all educational agency teachers.
- 5. Candidates will be evaluated annually.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF PROGRAM SPONSOR (TCSI):

The responsibilities of the Program Sponsor, Teachers College of San Joaquin IMPACT Intern Program (San Joaquin County Office of Education), shall include the following:

- 1. Identification and assignment of a Support Supervisor and allocation of additional personnel if needed to provide on-site support for the intern;
- 2. Providing appropriate orientation and training for the Support Supervisor and peer coach/mentor;
 - a. The content of this orientation includes but is not limited to characteristics of coaching, expectations for time and frequency of visitations, developing an understanding of the Teaching Performance Expectations, and process for documenting observations and evaluations of intern.
- 3. Establishing effective and on-going communication with employing agency and TCSJ IMPACT Intern personnel (e.g. Support Supervisor, Program Evaluator, Program Coordinators, Program Director and President) as appropriate to ensure a successful teaching experience for the intern;
- 4. Providing all CCTC required coursework for the Preliminary Credential and assistance with questions or issues in regard to credentialing;
- 5. Processing appropriate documents with the CCTC for intern, preliminary, and clear (if appropriate) credentials for candidates.

TO BE COMPLETED BY THE EMPLOYING AGENCY:

The Kremen School of Education and Human Development at Fresno State would like to thank you and your district for the continued support and partnership in the preparation of teachers for your district and the Central Valley region. For the last decade we have focused on local pipelines and in growing partnerships and residencies.

We have placed a teacher candidate within your school district this semester and are contacting you at this time due to changes made by the State of California related to selection of Master Teacher/ Mentors, the Teacher Performance Assessment, and clinical site selection. There are also additional requirements in the manner in which programs document the progress of our teacher candidates (including interns). Attached is our updated MOU which documents the CCTC requirements. (Included you will find the pertinent items from the CTC Preliminary Multiple and Single Subject Credential Program Standards).

One significant change is the requirement for districts/school sites to "permit video capture for candidate reflection." The video capture of the candidate's teaching will be stored on a secured server that is password protected and not publicly accessible. University faculty and teacher candidates will be the only people accessing the videos and will be used for the sole purpose of reflection and evaluation of the teacher candidate.

We understand that district technology release agreements may vary. Our candidates will be trained to seek guidance/approval from the master teacher/mentor or appropriate site administrator prior to setting up the video capture. In addition to video capturing for reflection, another change is related to the training and support of master teachers/mentors. We will work with your district to honor appropriate district PD hours, provide on-site support, and have convenient online modules available.

Please review the MOU and utilize the process required in your district to secure support. We are requesting that we receive the approved MOU by **Friday**, **April 20**, **2018**. - C. Assure that staff is adequate in number and quality to insure safe and continuous management of the candidate program in cooperation with the Institution's instructors.
- D. Provide instructors and candidates taking part in the field experience, whenever possible, other incidentals that may be mutually agreeable.
- E. Provide emergency first aid for any candidate who becomes sick or injured by conditions arising out of or in the course of said candidate's participation in the clinical experience at the Agency. Provide medical examinations or other protective measures that may be required by the Agency.
- F. Have the right, after consultation with the Institution, to refuse to accept for further clinical/educational experience any of the Institution's candidates who in the Agency's judgment, are not participating satisfactorily.
- G. Permit video capture for candidate reflection and State requirements. Video will only be used for educational purposes and will not be made public.

II. INSTITUTION SHALL:

- A. Designate the candidates who are enrolled in the program of the Institution to be assigned for clinical/educational experience at the Agency, in such numbers as are mutually agreed to by both parties.
- B. Establish a rotational plan for the clinical/educational experience by mutual agreement between appropriate representatives.
- C. Provide external coaching/supervision to the Agency, which will provide the necessary oversight for the clinical/Educational experience program provided for under this agreement. Keep all attendance and academic records of candidates' participation in said program.
- D. Advise every candidate to conform to all applicable Agency policies, procedures, regulations, and all requirements and restrictions specified jointly by representatives of the Institution and Agency.
- E. In consultation and coordination with the Agency's representatives, plan for the clinical/educational experience to be provided to candidates under this agreement.
- F. In consultation and coordination with the Agency's staff, periodic conferences between appropriate representatives of the Institution and Agency will be scheduled to provide evaluation and mentoring of the candidate's clinical/educational experience in the program.

PARTIAL FUNDING AGREEMENT FOR STUDENT PEDESTRIAN SAFETY CROSSING AT THE 11TH STREET AND PACHECO BLVD (SR 152) INTERSECTION

THIS AGREEMENT (this "Agreement") is effective the date it is fully executed (the "Effective Date") by and between the City of Los Banos, a California municipal corporation (the "City"), and the Los Banos Unified School District, a California Unified School District ("LBUSD"). The City and LBUSD are collectively referred to herein as the "Parties" and individually a "Party."

RECITALS

WHEREAS, one of the main student pedestrian walkways to the Los Banos High School requires student pedestrian crossing at the uncontrolled intersection of 11th Street and Pacheco Blvd (SR 152);

WHEREAS, pending the future installation of a signal by Caltrans at the intersection, the LBUSD intends to employ a temporary crossing guard at the intersection which is anticipated to improve student safety (the "Project");

WHEREAS, the City desires to contribute \$2,000 in funding for the Project, subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Parties agree as follows:

AGREEMENT

- I. <u>City Funding Contribution</u>. City agrees to contribute the \$2,000.00 as partial funding for the Project. City shall pay LBUSD no later than 10 days after receiving notice from LBUSD that all necessary approvals for the Project have been obtained by LBUSD.
- 2. <u>Project Responsibility</u>. If LBUSD goes forward with the Project, it shall be solely responsible for all aspects of the Project. The City shall not have any responsibility for the management or supervision of the Project.
- 3. <u>Indemnification</u>. LBUSD shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless City, its City Council, boards and commissions, officers, agents and employees (collectively, the "Indemnified Parties") from and against any and all claims (including, claims for bodily injury, death or damage to property), demands, obligations, damages, actions, causes of action, suits, losses, judgments, fines, penalties, liabilities, costs and expenses (including, reasonable attorney's fees, disbursements and court costs) of every kind and nature that arise out of, pertain to, or relate to

the negligence, recklessness, or willful misconduct of LBUSD, its principals, officers, agents, employees, vendors, suppliers, consultants, subcontractors, anyone employed directly or indirectly by any of them or for whose acts they may be liable for any or all of them arising from or in any way connected with this Agreement or the Project.

The barn would be constructed in the northern portion of the Pacheco High School property, east of Ward Road.

Our proposed scope of services would be as follows:


