# Elementary News & Highlights

## 4K NEWS

**MRS. BAEHR & MRS. DORWALDT**

The 4-Year-Old Kindergarteners are continuing to learn and grow. Mrs. Baehr's class was very lucky to have a student teacher during second quarter. Ms. Taylor Hand made learning fun by singing and doing creative projects. We continue to work on upper and lower case letters, numbers, colors, shapes, counting, and writing our names. Music time in our classroom is always so much fun because we get to move our bodies and pretend to be different animals and learn our letter sounds in a fun way. In January we have been learning about penguins and other arctic animals. In February we will be learning about love, friendship, dental health, and dinosaurs.

## KINDERGARTEN NEWS

**MRS. COOPER**

Kindergarten is going great! We have learned so much. Our reading skills have improved so significantly that we are more confident in reading leveled books. Practice helps us learn, so we make sure to read the same book a couple of times to improve our reading skills and to help remember the text. We have learned 43 sight words! Those words are also helping us to read and write.

In math we have looked at ways to make numbers through 20. We are found that seeing 5 and some more in numbers can make it easier to count and recognize. As well as seeing 10 and some more in teen numbers. We have practiced adding and subtracting within 5. We know we can draw pictures, count objects, to solve equations and after lots of practice we will just know the answers.

We have been writing stories. We use events that have happened in our life to write about, because we have so many stories to tell. We are making sure we use a capital at the beginning, spaces between words, and punctuation at the end. We reread our stories a lot to make sure it makes sense and that we wrote all the sounds in our words. And then we add more sentences to add more

details. Our writing has grown so much since the beginning of the year.

## 2ND GRADE NEWS

**MRS. ECKDAHL & MS. JACOBY**

In second grade, we are continuing to focus on our study of Bugs in Their Ecosystems! We focused specifically on bug's social behavior, how they depend on plants and animals, and the human needs for bugs. We are preparing for the upcoming Literacy Night by writing an informational text on our individual research topics! We look forward to sharing our books and projects with you!

During math the second graders have been learning about measurement and geometry! They learned how to measure line segments and other objects using both centimeters and inches. Then students learned about two dimensional shapes (triangles, squares, rectangles, quadrilaterals, pentagons, hexagons, and more). They learned how many sides and angles each shape had. After that they used their knowledge of measurement to draw and find the distance (perimeter) around shapes (triangles, squares, rectangles). Second graders also challenged themselves to build three dimensional shapes like rectangular prisms and cubes!

## 3RD GRADE NEWS

It is hard to believe we are almost through the school year! In math, the 3rd graders have worked through their multiplication and division units and will continue to work on mastering these facts throughout the year. They are currently working on their unit on multi-digit addition and subtraction. In reading and writing, the 3rd graders have finished up their Research Unit on weather, where they read through informational texts to research a question related to their weather phenomenon, completed notes on a graphic organizer, and wrote informational paragraphs using their research, including an illustration, diagram, or photo to support it. They are compiling this research into their own informational book. Ask these weather experts anything you want to know about their topic!

## 4TH GRADE NEWS

What a cold start to this January! We are keeping warm in class by working hard in writing our own information book. Students each researched a topic within our Animal Adaptations unit and now we are working on the final product. Some students are even done and have illustrated their book. Along the way, we learned about the different tiers of vocabulary, main ideas, and details, and how to cite our sources. In math, we are currently studying how to solve different kinds of word problems and learning the properties of math. Our social studies unit has covered the native people that lived in Wisconsin for thousands of years, the French explorers, and the Fur Trade. We are currently learning how Wisconsin has become a state from a territory. Our science unit is talking about how animals survive in their ecosystem. Students have become quite the experts on animals, especially since they have researched an animal for their information book.

## 5TH GRADE NEWS

**MRS. JOHNSON & MS. THOMPSON**

It's hard to believe we are almost through our school year. The Fifth Graders have been working hard learning some rigorous material this quarter! In reading (which is combined with science), the students have been working to become experts on an ecosystem through researching informational text. Each student has chosen an ecosystem and are collecting research to learn everything they can about their ecosystem. Through this unit, they are learning about the features of informational text, how to find main ideas and supporting details, and especially how to prove their opinions with text evidence. They are working hard at learning to write good constructed response essays that prove their thinking. By the end of this unit, each student will have written their own informational book about their ecosystem.

Another big goal of ours is independently reading in multiple genres. Being widely read is essential to success in school and



in the career world. Reading books from many genres helps us build the academic and technical vocabulary needed in high school and beyond. We continue to strive to read independently for at least 30 minutes in class and 30 minutes at home. It has been proven that the more time children spend engrossed in books, the higher their academic achievement. Many of our classmates have read more than 300 steps (75 hours) of reading this year! What an amazing accomplishment!

In math, we have been working hard on everything Fractions: adding, subtracting, comparing, multiplying and now dividing! It was a challenging ride but we are learning that with proper practice and careful work, anything can become easier! We are now working on understanding the multiplication of whole numbers and decimals.

In this next semester, we will continue to raise our expectations in all areas to get us ready for the Forward Exam at the end of March and into April. Thank you for your continued help at home teaching patience, responsibility, and perseverance.

## 6TH GRADE NEWS

MR. MOSELEY & MRS. THEISEN

The sixth-grade students celebrated Christmas in the nature center. They enjoyed delicious treats, a white elephant gift exchange, and receiving a book to read from a fellow classmate. They also had the opportunity to cook hotdogs over a campfire. This party created nice memories for the students when they went into Christmas Break.

In math class, the students have been learning about ratios and understanding how they relate to fractions and percents. They also applied their knowledge to figure out how to calculate gratuity for different amounts on a dining bill. The students also learned how to figure out how much an item costs after different percentages off the initial cost before a discount.

In science class, the sixth graders have been learning about ecosystems and how all of the factors both living and non-living impact the organisms that live there. The students have done several activities to understand how biologists that work for the DNR do animal surveys

The Heartsaver courses are designed to target a broad audience and are designed to prepare the general public to provide cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and use an automated external defibrillator (AED) in a safe, timely, and effective manner. The course goals include cognitive and psychomotor objectives.

Heartsaver instructor-led courses are video-based courses that include group interaction and hands-on coaching and feedback from the AHA instructor. These courses prepare individuals for the most

common types of first aid emergencies and equip them with CPR skills for adults, children, and infants.

The AHA has designed courses to address specific needs for your agencies. Please state the requirements you need for your personal situation. **Courses can be mixed and matched to meet your needs.**

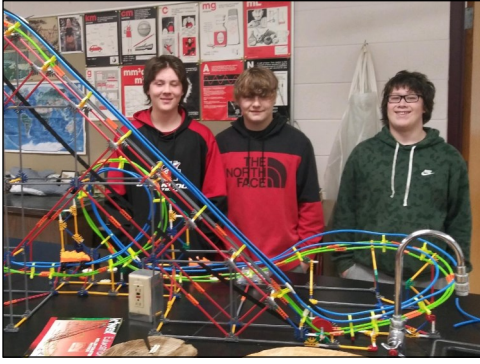

## THE 8<sup>TH</sup> GRADE CAREERS CLASS EXPERIENCES A TASTE OF "REALITY"

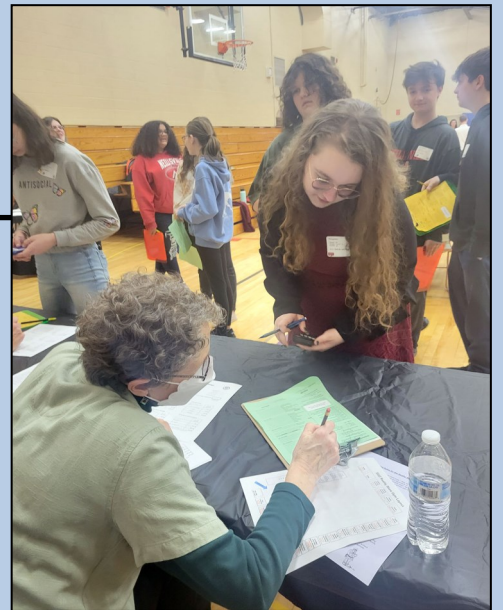


Shown above and at right are 8th grade students arranging for their housing, furnishings, utilities, transportation, childcare, groceries, insurance, etc. at the various store stations.

On April 19<sup>th</sup> the 8th Grade Careers Class participated in the 2022 Reality Store at UW- Stevens Point-Marshfield center along with several other eighth-grade students from the area. This event is sponsored by the Marshfield Area Chamber of Commerce.

Before the day of the store, students were assigned an occupation with annual income, benefits, a marital status, combined income and children. The first lesson completed in class prior to the event was to calculate their net monthly income. They deduct state and federal taxes, social security and Medicare and realize the difference between gross and net income.

As they enter the store, students arrange for their housing, furnishings, utilities, transportation, childcare, groceries, insurance, and will be required to donate to charity and contribute to their savings account. If income allows, they are allowed to make optional purchases such as computers, motorcycles, pets and vacations.



Several students found life lessons that occur as adults when they needed to downsize their homes, purchase the vehicles they wanted or gave up other luxuries to make their money balance.

Most of the students left the reality store with an increased awareness of budgeting money and making wise financial choices. Others admitted they will give more thought to their career and education choices.
