SECTION 2: AGENCIES TEXAS MEDICAID WAIVERS

Get on the Waiting Lists!!!

We urge everyone with children with developmental disabilities to contact these agencies to get on their waiting list. Even if you feel you are not in financial need, your child may have a different situation in 7-10 years when their name will come up.

CLASS (Community Living Assistance and Support Services)

- For individuals whose primary disability is intellectual disability or related conditions (ICS/IID) -a related condition is a disability, other than an intellectual disability, that originated before age 22 that affects their ability to function in daily life.
- All you do is call and ask to be put on their interest list-have student's social security number handy.
- Call 1-877-438-5658

HCS (Home and Community-Based Services Program) is administered through your county MHMR.

- For individuals whose primary disability is intellectual and developmental disability, autism, or pervasive developmental disorders.
- No documentation is needed until your name comes up and then it's based on the child's income, not the parents.
- The child qualifies for Medicaid by disability and then qualifies for the waiver plan as part of that program.
- The program looks first to private insurance for coverage, then to Medicaid and last to the waiver.
- In BRAZOS COUNTY: call MHMR of Brazos Valley at **979-822-6467** and ask for an intake appointment. Waiting list is typically long...... possibly more than 10 years.

What are "waivers"?

- Waivers let states use Medicaid funds for long-term home and community-based services for people with disabilities or special health-care needs and the elderly in order to help them live in the community.
- They are named "waivers" because certain Medicaid requirements are waived (meaning they don't apply). For example, family income. All but 1 waiver is based on just the child's income and certain licensing requirements for service providers. Your child's income means any money that they personally have in assets, earn, or are paid not your whole family's income.
- Besides getting these additional services, people who receive waiver long-term services and supports also get full Medicaid health-care benefits.
- Texas has 7 waivers, and each one has its own interest list. Consider adding your child to all the interest lists based on their identified diagnosis and current needs. You don't know what future needs your child might have, so you might want to place them on as many of the lists as possible.
- When there is room for your child on one of the waiver programs, they will come off of the interest list. This is when DSHS, HHSC, or DADS (as applicable) will review diagnostic and other information to decide if your child meets the waiver requirements. Depending on the waiver, you might be asked for information about their medical, psychological, and developmental history, as

well as financial and income eligibility.

What lists are appropriate for my child?

 Community Living Assistance and Support Services (CLASS): gives home and community-based supports to people with related conditions. The CLASS program includes: behavioral support, adaptive aids, medical supplies, respite care, occupational therapy, physical therapy, speech therapy, minor home modifications, nursing, specialized therapies, pre-vocational training, supported employment, transition assistance, and others.

Requirements for CLASS

- No age limit to receive services.
- Must have a diagnosis of a related condition under federal and state law.
- Must be eligible for Medicaid in the community.
- Must live in your own or your family's home.
- Income and assets may not be more than these limits: a monthly income of up to 300% of the monthly income limit for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and no more than \$2,000 in assets. This refers to your child's income, not the family income. Learn more about how to figure out this amount.
- Cannot be enrolled in another waiver program. Your child can remain on other waiver interest lists while enrolled in the CLASS waiver program.
- 2. <u>Home and Community-based Services (HCS)</u>: gives services and supports to people with an intellectual disability (ID) or a related condition who live with their families, in their own homes, or in small group homes with no more than 4 beds.
 - The HCS program provides services and supports to people with an intellectual disability (ID) or a related condition who live with their families, in their own homes, or in small group homes with no more than 4 beds.
 - A related condition is a disability, other than an ID or mental illness, that begins before age 22 and will not likely end. This condition must also cause major functional limitations, similar to an individual with an ID. Autism and other developmental disabilities such as cerebral palsy, seizure disorders, and spina bifida are examples of related conditions.
 - The HCS program includes: residential services, adaptive aids, day habilitation (help with development of basic life skills), minor home modifications, nursing, respite, professional therapies, supported employment, and other services.

Requirements to receive HCS:

- No age limit to receive services.
- Must be able to get Medicaid services before enrolling in the program.
- Must have an ID under state law or a diagnosis of a related condition with an IQ of 75 or below.
- Income and assets may not be more than specified limits: a monthly income of up to 300% of the monthly income limit for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and no more than \$2,000 in assets. This refers to your child's income, not the family income.
- Cannot be enrolled in another waiver program. Your child can remain on other waiver interest lists while enrolled in the HCS waiver program.
- **3.** <u>Medically Dependent Children Program (MDCP)</u>: gives services to families caring for children and young adults as an alternative to receiving services in a nursing facility.
- **4.** STAR+PLUS Home and Community-based Services (HCBS): a managed care model so that people who qualify for nursing facility care can get acute care and long-term services and supports (LTSS) in order to live in the community.
- **5.** <u>Texas Home Living (TxHmL)</u>: gives services to people with an intellectual disability (ID) or a related condition who live in their own home or their family's home.
- **6.** Youth Empowerment Services (YES): gives home and community-based services to children who otherwise would need psychiatric inpatient care or whose parents would turn to state custody for care.
- 7. **Deaf Blind with Multiple Disabilities (DBMD):** gives services for people who are deaf-blind or have a

related condition that leads to deaf-blindness, and who have another disability.

8. How to Add Your Child to Interest Lists

You do not have to prove your child is eligible before adding them to the waiver interest lists. Your child will go through this process and review once they move to the top of the list. Only then is the eligibility information reviewed and used to decide if your child can enroll.

<u>Call 1-855-937-2372</u> for information about long-term services. A trained professional will guide you to the right option, including the waivers, if appropriate.

Three Top Tips for Waiver Lists

- Don't Delay, Add Your Child Right Away: Consider adding your child to as many waiver interest lists as possible when your child is first diagnosed with a disability or special health-care needs. You should also think about adding your child to the lists even if they aren't diagnosed but you have reason to believe that your child will have a long-term disability or special health-care needs.
- Learn More: If you are interested in HCS, call 1-855-937-2372 to speak to a trained professional.
- Update Your Information Every Year: At least 1 time a year, call to update your contact information so they know how to reach you. Most parents remember by calling around their child's birthday.
