Teachers:
 Employ explicit instruction strategies (gradual release of instruction, modeling, think-alouds). Provide opportunities for student choice. Provide scaffolding and interventions to students as needed. Leaders: Provide professional learning opportunities and modeling for teachers to develop common instructional goals and consistency in schools. Provide ongoing coaching and support to teachers. Provide and protect PLC time for educators to meet and plan, and align lessons to grade-level standards. Actively involved in PLC's with teachers
Students:
 Gain understanding through being active meaning makers Apply and transfer knowledge and skills across content/subjects and to real-world problems. Teachers: Create vibrant learning experiences for all students. Encourage innovation in our schools-especially when it comes to assessment. Leaders:
 Lead/seek out professional learning experiences around Deeper Learning for their schools. Provide resources for all teachers that help support Deeper Learning ("Teaching for Deeper Learning", "Tools for Thoughtful Assessment", "Tools for a Successful School Year"). Ensure teachers provide Deeper Learning opportunities for their students.
Students:
 Give best effort on all of their assessments. Use teacher or peer feedback to improve their answers on assessments when applicable. Teachers: Deliberately check for student understanding throughout class/unit. Provide immediate, actionable feedback to students in order to improve work. Use assessment data to make instructional decisions for both whole class as well as for individual students. Leaders: Examine interim assessment data to make instructional decisions for their school. Create a school culture in which doing your best on assessments is the expectation.
Students:
 Self-reflect on their progress toward content mastery with goal setting. Teachers:

continually reflect on their work and focus on improvement.	 Reflect consistently on the effectiveness of their work. Seek professional learning opportunities to improve their educational practices. Leaders: Provide targeted feedback to teachers to identify strengths and areas of growth. Seek and attend professional learning opportunities to enhance their role as their school's/district's primary instructional leader.
