Proof of Residency

Can a school require proof of residency (rent receipt, lease agreement, utility receipt) that prevents or delays enrollment?

NO-Homeless students, by definition, lack a fixed residence and cannot be required to provide traditional proof of residency if doing so is not possible or would delay enrollment.
