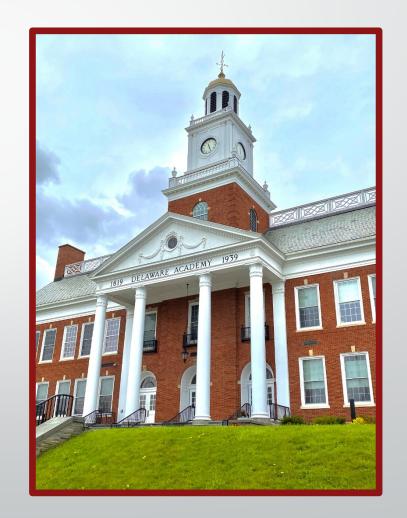

Community Survey

 Remains open to: Parents/Guardians, Students, Faculty/Sta Community Members



- Trends so far:
 - Majority of respondents have been parents/guardians
 - Understanding how capital projects are planned, approved, and financed is critical to deciding approval
 - Long-term sustainability of programs and facilities remains the top priority
 - Creating opportunities for children of all ages is a priority
 - Maintenance of infrastructural items, safety & security upgrades, instruction in technical fields, music & arts, and physical education/athletics all received majority of respondents listing as "extremely important."

What are Capital Projects?

- Improvements to the physical structure of our facilities to support all district activities
- Approved by NYSED Office of Facilities and majority funded through NYS Building Aid
 - Limits expenditures to capital improvements
 - Cannot be used to fund staffing, new or expanded programs, or other areas in our budget

How are projects determined & prioritized?

- NYSED Building Conditions Survey & Annual Visual Inspections
- Condition of other items at time of planning
- Items identified, but not completed in prior project
- Stakeholder input, questions, and feedback
- Ensure District is "future-ready"
- Alignment with District Vision, Mission & Goals

Financial Planning

- Financial considerations when planning Capital Projects:
 - Cycles of projects that maintain stability and predictability in long-term debt
 - Responsible planning for maintenance and use of state building aid and reserves
 - If planned correctly, results in not having to ask taxpayers for tax increases to support capital projects
 - (This is what is meant by "No Additional Impact to Taxpayers")
 - If planned correctly, results in safe and reliable facilities for years to come



Financial Planning

How will this project be funded?

- NYS Building Aid (73.3%)
- Debt Reserve
 - How is the Debt Reserve funded?
 - What happens when we don't continue to fund reserves?
- Capital Reserve
 - What can it be used for?
- No Additional Increase to Taxes for this project



Financial Planning

What Costs Go Into Projects?

Construction Costs - Certain costs for construction work (Section 408 of Education Law), are eligible for building aid. To be eligible for aid, construction costs must exceed \$10,000, and the various elements of the work must have received prior approval and a building permit from NYSED.

Contingency Costs are included to cover potential industry escalations in pricing and costs related to design, construction management, and other escalations that may occur between planning and construction phases of a project.

Incidental Costs - Expenditures related to outdoor site construction or improvement are also eligible for aid but are limited to a cap set by NYSED.

Together, these establish the total project amount

DA Physical Education & Athletics

Why are we asking you to consider updates to athletic fields?

- Long-term viability and condition of Legion fields in question
- Increased student participation in athletic activities
- Youth leagues & community use
- Expanded seasonal use
- Outdoor instructional spaces
- Marching band practice
- Destination district for smaller district needs and collaborations

- What's different this time?
 - Focus on necessity & long-term viability
 - Addressing current needs
 - Smaller scale project
 - This is not about prioritizing football over other sports
 - This is not about prioritizing athletics over instruction







DA Physical Education & Athletics

DK Field – multi-purpose artificial turf with lights, resurfacing of existing track

- Increases daily hours of use due to significantly decreased wear & tear on surface
- Lengthens the time of year it can be used (extends seasons for practices & post season play)
 - Currently 30 practices & 5-6 games are played at Legion in a given week
 - Proposed field would provide Boys & Girls soccer and football games and practices on DK Field (V, JV & Mod)
 - Addition of late games during the week
 - May not completely eliminate all scheduling conflicts
- Used increasingly for instruction and recreation periods during the school day to facilitate outdoor instruction and physical and social/emotional health
- Accessible to all grade levels
- Lower annual maintenance costs
- NYSPHSAA Section IV now requires artificial turf venues to host soccer and football semi-final and championship play
- Updated research studies on long-term health and safety to inform decision-making
- Decreases long-term reliance and fiscal investments on Legion fields
 - No state aid reimbursement
 - No control over other use despite our continued maintenance

DA Physical Education & Athletics



What are we proposing and why?

- Lower Field natural multi-purpose field (softball, soccer practice field)
 - Returns softball to DA campus
 - Improvements are now aidable
 - Clinics for Delhi Little League
 - Growing softball program increasingly competitive
 - Varsity, Junior Varsity & Modified

Delaware Academy Music & Arts

What are we proposing and why?

- MS/HS Auditorium lighting and sound updates
 - Student access to industry standard lighting and sound boards for technical education
 - Improved student theatrical and music instruction and performances
 - New soundboards will enhance streaming capabilities and sound mixing of a live performance
 - Increased energy efficiency









Delaware Academy Music & Arts

What are we proposing and why?

- Band/Music Rooms acoustic and air exchange updates
 - Improves climate and air flow in music instructional spaces for students and instruments
 - Improves sound quality, energy & pressure levels for music rehearsals and instructional lessons
 - Improves the ability for musicians to hear one another and provide a greater sense of ensemble
 - Increased student skill development and confidence
