#### **Letter from our Board of Education**

Dear Delaware Academy Community Members,

Delaware Academy Central School District at Delhi is a leader in academic excellence, preparing our students to excel in a diverse and dynamic society.

We are proud to advance a school budget that aligns with, and fully supports our District's Vision. Every year the Delaware Academy Board of Education works hard to develop a budget that preserves and prioritizes high quality academic and extracurricular programming for our students while meeting the fiscal realities faced by our district and the taxpayers who support it. This year, Delaware Academy has continued to serve as a model district in our region. Our students are outperforming regional and state averages on statewide academic assessments. Our extracurricular clubs and athletic teams are earning regional and state level recognition and awards. We have made significant strides in our programs that support mental health. We continue to expand on student-centered pathways to graduation through partnerships in our community that support students who are preparing to enter college, workforce or the military.

Thanks to the support of our community, teachers, staff and administrators, we have accomplished a great deal. To successfully navigate the fiscal future, we continue to need your support and partnership. We believe that the proposed budget supports the continuation of high quality programs and services, while respecting the position of our taxpayers. Therefore, the Board of Education is requesting your support of a proposed budget which includes a conservative 1.25% increase to the school tax levy, again representing one of the lowest in our region. Specifically, the budget of \$21,547,548 is responsibly funded by state aid, pandemic relief funds, allocation of district reserves, and to a lesser extent, our tax levy. The annual budget vote will be held on Tuesday, May 16, from 12:00 to 8:00 p.m. in the lobby of the middle school gym, through the entrance across from the transportation garage. In this newsletter, you will also find information on propositions that will appear on the ballot, Board candidate statements, and sources of pride in our district. We are asking for your support in voting on all ballot items.

# In addition to the budget, what are the other propositions?

#### 1. Proposition No. 1 – Establish Capital Equipment Reserve

"Shall the following resolution be adopted, to wit: Shall the Board of Education ("Board") of the Delaware Academy CSD At Delhi, Delaware County, New York (the "District") be authorized to establish a new Capital Equipment Reserve Fund, in accordance with the provisions of Section 3651 of the Education Law, to pay for costs of furnishings, equipment, machinery and apparatus required for the purposes for which such improvements are to be used for STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Math) instruction in an amount not to exceed \$750,000, having a probable term of ten (10) years, and be authorized to raise \$750,000 to fund such reserve fund in the current and/or future years through various sources including, but not limited to, state aid reimbursement and cost saving measures resulting in unexpended funds or an unappropriated fund balance in such amounts as determined annually by the Board of Education?"

What does it mean? NYS allows districts to establish a savings account to purchase equipment and machinery to use for STEAM instruction that would otherwise be challenging to afford since these types of expenditures cannot receive state aid. With voter approval, we can transfer a portion of undesignated fund balance into this account each year, the total of which can never exceed \$750,000 over the course of ten years. This does not increase your taxes.

#### 2. Proposition No. 2 - Purchase a new school van

"Shall the following resolution be adopted, to wit: Shall the Board of Education of the Delaware Academy Central School District at Delhi, Delaware County, New York, be authorized to purchase one (1) van including incidental expenses in connection therewith, for the transportation of students, at a maximum cost not to exceed \$45,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary and shall be paid with available funds from the 2022-2023 budget year?"

What does it mean? We maintain a replacement cycle for our district vans that are used for student transportation. We purchase the vans. They are not a part of our lease program like our buses. This year, we had to remove a van from service and it needs to be replaced based on our current transportation needs. This purchase can be done with unexpended funds from the current school year, so as not to add to the tax burden, but requires voter approval.

# **Delaware Academy Athletics**

The 2022-2023 year has proven to be another successful campaign for our talented student-athletes on the athletic fields, courts, track, and in the classrooms.

We had nine teams recognized by NYSPHSAA as Scholar Athlete Teams, among many individual and team accomplishments. The opportunity to be back out there playing sports with each other has also served as a much-needed emotional and social "boost" to our athletes.

## **Eye on Mental Health**

Our first District Goal reads, "Delaware Academy will support and cultivate an educational environment that prioritizes social emotional well-being of staff and students." This year we partnered with our A.L. Kellogg Committee to host a year-long guest speaker series, focusing on various mental health topics including bullying and cyberbullying prevention and intervention, friendship, suicide awareness, among other topics in a developmentally appropriate way for students in all grade levels. We continued classroom instruction using our Second Step curriculum to address positive relationships, managing emotions, and setting goals. We partnered with Building Better Futures to provide targeted instruction at the middle school level. We hosted keynote speakers, book studies, and professional development opportunities for faculty and staff and evening events for our families.



# **Future Focused Career Exploration Program**

In our inaugural year for this program, we collaborated with the DCMO BOCES Career Explorations program and Delaware County Chamber of Commerce to provide seniors with college preparation and workplace experiences aligned with their future career interests and goals. This unique program is helping us to fulfill our mission to "foster partnerships within our region and beyond, supporting a wide range of career pathways for our students."


# **Absentee Ballots**

All absentee ballot applications must be received by the district clerk no later than seven (7) days before the election (May 10, 2023) if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter, or by the day before the election (May 16, 2023) if the ballot is to be delivered personally to the voter.




