#### **FAMILY AND CONSUMER SCIENCE**

## **Independent Living 9-10**

1 credit

Independent Living 9-10 introduces the skills students need to cope with the realities of life in a changing society. This course focuses on helping the students become more self-sufficient by giving them the tools for intelligent decision making. Topics of discussion include the effect of values, needs and goals on the decision making process, getting your first job, successful relationships, basic personal care needs, and staying safe in a virtual world. This course will include a long-term inventory of on-line behavior for each student.

#### **Independent Living 11-12**

1 credit

Independent Living 11-12 introduces the skills students need to cope with the realities of life in a changing society. This course focuses on helping students move towards independence by studying various areas of everyday adult life. Topics of discussion include investing in yourself, your future career, money management (including but not limited to budgets, buying a car, renting vs. buying a home, credit and fraud), coping with stress and relationships. This course will include a long-term budgeting project.

#### **Independent Living 9-10**

.5 credit

Independent Living 9-10 introduces the skills students need to cope with the realities of life in a changing society. This course focuses on helping the students become more self-sufficient by giving them the tools for intelligent decision making. Topics of discussion include the effect of values, needs and goals on the decision making process, getting your first job, successful relationships, basic personal care needs, and staying safe in a virtual world.

## **Independent Living 11-12**

.5 credit

Independent Living 11-12 introduces the skills students need to cope with the realities of life in a changing society. This course focuses on helping students move towards independence by studying various areas of everyday adult life. Topics of discussion include investing in yourself, your future career, money management (including but not limited to budgets, buying a car, renting vs. buying a home, credit and fraud), coping with stress and relationships.

#### **BUSINESS**

# Microsoft Office-Keyboarding/Word 9-12 .5 Credit

Proper keyboard techniques and the "Touch-Keying" method will be taught and reinforced throughout this course. Mastery of the keyboard along with improvement in Words per Minute is the goal. In addition, this course covers the fundamentals of Microsoft Office Word. Students will learn how to manage all written communication.

## Microsoft Office-Power Point/Excel 9-12 .5 Credit

This course covers the fundamentals of the Microsoft Office Excel and PowerPoint. Students will learn how to use formulas and functions to build worksheets to complete calculations, and to create professional multimedia presentations which include graphics and tables.

#### **PHYSICAL EDUCATION & HEALTH**

### PE 10

This course is required for all 10<sup>th</sup> grade students. The class will focus on improving fitness-related components as well as three main units:

- Lifetime Activities (which include net games, floor games and field games)
- Fitness
- Team and cooperative activities

The emphasis within these three units will be on physical activity while learning concepts, principles, and strategies of movement.

#### **Outdoor Education (Grade 11 or 12)**

This course will focus on relationships involving people and the natural world. It will include elements of environmental education, adventure education, group and team building strategies, conservation, outdoor recreation, and fitness-related components. This course will expose students to physical, mental, and emotional challenges. Students taking this course must dress appropriately for outdoor elements and have a genuine interest in the outdoors. Any field trips taken during the semester will be paid for by the student.

#### Team Sports: (Grade 11 or 12)

In addition to improving fitness-related components, this course is designed for students who want to learn game and team strategies in sport. This course will provide basic knowledge, game strategies/concepts, and advanced game participation. Activities may include but are not limited to softball, flag football, soccer, basketball, floor hockey, and volleyball. Students will be expected to engage in game and team related strategies to meet participation requirements.

#### Lifetime Fitness (Grade 11 or 12)

In addition to improving fitness-related components, this course is designed for students to perform a variety of individual and group fitness activities. Activities may include but are not limited to tennis, walking, golf, strength training, group fitness, disc golf, archery, and table tennis. This course will provide instruction that will guide students in the development of their own lifetime fitness plans.

## **Group Fitness (Grade 11 or 12)**

In addition to improving fitness-related components, this course is designed for students that want to focus specifically on group/aerobic fitness activities. Activities may include but are not limited to kickboxing, yoga, body pump, step aerobics, circuit training, strength training, and dance. This course will progress from basic instruction into more vigorous variations.

#### **SOCIAL STUDIES**

## Western Civilization (Grades 11 and 12); Weighted 1.1 1.00 Credit

This course is an elective designed to understand the development of Western Civilization, from its origins to modern Western society. Foundations in Greek and Roman empires will stretch through to the feudal Europe and the Middle Ages, the Renaissance and Reformation, exploration and Enlightenment, nationalism and imperialism, to the new Western world. Both a thematic and chronological approach will be taken to discuss the major periods of development, as well as individual country case studies. Political, economic,

philosophical and social approaches to history will be employed as well to gain a better perspective into the influences of Western society on the world. Social studies teacher signature required for admittance.

#### **GIFTED EDUCATION**

Innovations (10 through 12) .5 credit/1.00 credit Innovations is a course intended for students with gifted GIEPS's in 10-12 grade. The course will be project based with an emphasis on thinking critically and creatively to construct meaning or gain understanding, planning and conducting a study or investigation, proposing solutions to real-world problems, planning and producing communication in various forms, collaborating to solve a problem, and integrating, synthesizing, and making cross-curricular connections.

## Biomedical Science Research (weighted)- Grades 11 and 12 1.00 credit

(Prerequisite – Anatomy and Physiology I)
This course is an introduction to the principles of biomedical and clinical science research with an emphasis on critical analysis of the current literature. The course provides an overview of experimental design, laboratory technology, statistical analysis, and publication preparation. The course is specifically designed to improve student presentation skills and potential for collaborative work in biomedical science. Students will learn how to design and write a realistic research proposal and will gain a general understanding of how different techniques can be used to address a wide range of scientific research questions. This STEM experience provides students with an inquiry-based learning opportunity and engages them as active learners in a research setting.
