


Honor Society Goes to Monticello

With the support of the Peterstown Elementary School PTO, Dave Simmons and Rod Farley (both Veterans) brought the West Virginia State Council Vietnam Veterans of America's Mobile Wall to Peterstown Elementary on Wednesday, November 9, 2016. The wall has the 732 names of Vest Virginians who were killed in action, held as Prisoners of War and those still Missing in Action on the soils of South Vietnam, North Vietnam, its seaways and theater of operation.

The Council transports the Mobile Wall throughout West Virginia with the message the fallen will not be forgotten. Mr. Simmons and Mr. Farley spoke with the students about the history of the Vietnam Conflict, what the wall symbolizes and the need to honor our veterans and active duty members.

After the two men spoke, the students had the opportunity to walk around the wall and look at the service personnel that gave their life for our freedom. The students learned that their freedom is not free. We are very appreciative of the message and the opportunity to interact with these two great men.

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

MCTC Students Give Back to the Community

Students at Monroe County Technical Center are giving back in a big way. In integral part of Career and Technical Education (CTE) is service learning. There are those folks we meet who just simply seem to be tireless in their efforts. If you have met Mark Blevins of MCTC, you have met one such person. He often arrives at work early, stays late, and is a go-to person throughout the day.

Mr. Blevins joined Monroe County Technical Center in the summer of 2014 as a Career Technical Education English Instructor, but he has been a fixture there for much longer.

Blevins began his work with 106.7 FM WHFI, housed at MCTC, as a senior in high school. In 2005, Blevins began his teaching career with Monroe County Schools and took on a more official capacity with the station. He has managed the station's playlists, emergency broadcasts, student and adult volunteers, sponsorships, and sports broadcasts. His work for WHFI is certainly not thankless, but thanks and fulfilling a desire for service to school and community are basically his pay for that position. What keeps Blevins volunteering after school at least twice weekly for radio club and for hours during sporting events? Blevins laughs, "Just a love of music and non-commercial radio, I guess. Having been affiliated with the station for about 20 years, now, I feel very much a part of WHFI, and it is a big part of me." This fall, Blevins was instrumental in providing live streaming of Maverick football games at Network-1sports.

As a CTE English Instructor, Mr. Blevins can be found serving many needs of students and instructors. For students, he often works helping them with technical writing, resume writing, research and public speaking skills. Blevins works alongside MCTC instructors to embed English content into their career

and technical studies. For example, students in Mr. Richmond's Law and Public Safety classes study and analyze Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet for crime details. They apply their knowledge of today's legal system, and even prepare court cases charging and defending "clients" from the play, based on the murderous plots and schemes carried out by the characters. Mr. Blevins also blends his role of radio station manager and English instructor through public service announcements written and recorded by students. "The PSAs are a great way to encourage student awareness of community needs and issues, while connecting learning through a real-life project," Blevins explains.

Mark Blevins also shares duties of advising the Monroe County Technical Center's chapter of National Technical Honor Society. Together with CTE Academic teaching partner Hannah Deskins, Blevins is currently planning the 2016 fall induction ceremony. National Technical

Honor Society honors students' accomplishments in academics, CTE concentration work, leadership, citizenship, service and character. It is fitting for Blevins to be an advisor for this organization, as he embodies those qualities himself. Blevins humbly concurs, "I consider it to be 'just doing my job'. It is unique, I guess, to get to work in both core academics (English) and career tech education, simultaneously. It is a job I enjoy, and I just hope I make a difference, for the students and staff."
