Athletics

• The majority of the athletic budget is allocated for coach salaries, 2021/2022 and the cost of officials as per the state/conference recommendation, yearly dues, rental fees, and entry fees for the numerous athletic programs within the district are also included in the athletic budget. In addition, middle school athletics will now be assessed a fee for each sport.

• Funds are allocated for the following:

Athletics

- South Plainfield Athletic Budget supports 59 athletic programs throughout the district. The budget includes coaches stipends, equipment (purchase, repair) officials and security.
- The district has a total of 1,038 students participating in athletic programs in both the middle school and high school. The total rises to close to 80% when including multi-sport athletes.
- Money is budgeted on an annual basis for basic needs such as:
 - Replacement Uniforms
 - Baseball Caps –recurring cost
 - Game Balls- recurring cost
 - Megaphones- Cheerleading
 - Hurdles- replacement
 - Kneepads replacement recurring
 - Scorebooks recurring

Technology Upgrades

- Expansion of 1:1 Program The purchase of additional Chromebooks to complete the expansion of the 1:1 program to include all grades from Preschool to grade 12.
- **Upgrade of District Firewalls** Replacement of existing firewalls with upgraded next generation firewalls to increase security while offered greater speed of internet resources for all in district.
- Expansion of MFA (Multi Factor Authentication) South Plainfield School District will be expanding our use of multifactor authentication to all district employees to aid in the protection from the ongoing cyber attacks focused on the education sector.

Technology Upgrades

- **Phone line upgrades** Converting the district from traditional phone lines to more versatile and cost effecting SIP trunking. The new service will also provide more reliable, cellular backup line as well as the ability to burst instantly to handle large call volumes.
- **Replacement of building PA systems** We will be migrating from our current PA systems to IP based PA systems that can integrate directly with our existing phone systems as well as our emergency notification system.
- Hardening of Wireless Network Migrating the district wireless networks to utilize certificate based radius authentication for all district equipment to ensure the devices accessing our network are only district owned devices.

Transportation

- Transportation costs have a projected increase of 6% for out-of-district schools - this is the standard annual increase.
- Allocation of funds for the purchase of one 54 passenger school bus. All buses purchased from the 2021-2022 school year budget will be equipped with three point seatbelts.

2021/2022 Budget Highlights

- Total operating budget: \$70,605,543
- 2% General Fund Tax Levy increase: \$1,017,004
 - FY22 General Fund tax levy = \$51,867,203
- Health benefit cost increase of 10%, as recommended by the insurance broker
- \$1,500,000 budgeted withdrawal from capital reserve
 - Used for renovation of the High School Cafeteria, renovation of the High School Weight Room and Art Room
- \$1,000,000 budgeted withdrawal from maintenance reserve:
 - Used for replacement of LED lights district wide, ongoing painting district wid, carpet removal at the High School, flooring and asbestos abatement district wide
- \$4 budgeted withdrawal from emergency reserve:
 - Elimination of the Fund


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2021/2022 Budget Highlights


- State Aid allocation:
 - **\$200,170 INCREASE from the prior budget year**
- Special Services costs continue to increase
- Transportation costs are projected, bids will be received Summer 2021
- Average daily enrollment: 3365.72
- District (full-time) employees: 549
- Estimated Cost per Pupil*: \$17,417

* Per Pupil Cost is defined as current expense exclusive of tuition expenditures, transportation, residential costs, and judgments against the school district.

Tax Levy

- 2021 to 2022 Tax Increase Difference
 - \$735,495 levy increase
 - 2021 average tax increase \$80
 - 2022 average tax increase \$45
- Numbers are based off average assessed home value of \$123,287
- Includes tax relief of \$300,000. year 1 of 4 year tax relief plan
