### About the Book

- Name the title of your book.
- Name the author.
- Name the illustrator.
- •Find a picture that shows your favorite part of the book. Tell about it.
- •Tell a fact and an opinion about your book.
- Compare the information you read to what you know.
- Contrast the information you read to what you know.

#### Genre

Genre refers to stories, informational books, or poems.

- Is this fantasy or reality? Tell why.
- •Is this fiction or non-fiction? Tell why.
- •If your book is fiction, who is telling the story?
- •What parts of the fiction story could happen in real life?

  If you choose a poem, does it rhyme?

A fiction book is fantasy or make believe. A non-fiction book is real or gives facts.

## Characters

- Name the characters.
- •What did the characters look like?
- •What did they do?
- •If this character were real, what kinds of traits would he or she have?
- Choose a character. Compare him or her to another character.
- Contrast two characters. Tell how they are different.





## setting man

- Name the setting. Describe it.
- •Does your book have more than one setting?
- Have you been to a place like this? Tell about it.
- •Can you tell if the story took place a long time ago or on a day like today? Give reasons.
- •Compare the setting in this book to another book's setting.
- •Contrast the setting in this book to another book's setting.

#### Connections



Connections are your experiences and how they relate to books or the world.

- •What does this book remind you of?
- •What other books does this book remind you of?
- Do the characters remind you of someone else? Tell who and why.

## Main Idea (Main Idea)

- •Tell about your book. Use the names of the characters.
- •What could be another title to this book?
- •If you drew a picture of the main idea, what would you put in your picture?
- •Summarize the main idea.



Beginning Middle End

Don't forget to use the characters' names.

- •Use the pictures. Retell the story.
- •What happened at the beginning? What happened in the middle? What happened at the end?
- Retell the story in order. Use some details.



#### Cause and Effect

- •How did your book end? Tell the reasons why it ended this way.
- •Tell one thing that happened. Why did it happen. What else could have caused this to happen? What do you think the character said or did after this happened?
- •What would you do if something like this happened to you? Why?

# Questions

- •Before you read, did you have questions about this book? What were they?
- •As you read, did you stop and ask yourself questions? What were they? Did you find the answers? Where did you find them or how were you able to find them?
- •Do you still have questions? What are they?
