Title I School-Level Parent and Family Engagement Policy Bonita Elementary School

Involvement of Parents in the Title I Program

To involve parents and family members in the Title I program at Bonita Elementary School, the following practices have been established:

- a) The school convenes an annual meeting, at a convenient time, to which all parents of participating children shall be invited to attend and encouraged to attend, to inform parents and family members of their school's participation in the Title I program and to explain the requirements, and the right of the parents to be involved.  - The annual meeting is held the first week of school. The meeting is held in the cafeteria at 6 PM, in the evening, to accommodate working parents. Childcare is provided.
- b) The school offers a flexible number of meetings, such as meetings in the morning or evening, and may provide, with Title I funds, transportation, child care, or home visits, as such services relate to parent involvement. (20 USC 6318 (c)(2))
 - Second Cup of Coffee is held two times a year in the mornings, School Site Council is held four times a year at 2:00 pm. These varied times offer parents times throughout the day to access Title1 information. Administration is available daily to answer questions or clarify information.
- c) The school involves parents in an organized, ongoing, and timely way, in the planning, review, and improvement of the school's Title I program, including the planning, review, and improvement of the school parent and family engagement policy and the joint development of the school wide program plan.  - The plan, including budget, starts at the ELAC committee level and is designed an aligned for the current school year. It is then sent to School Site Council for review and discussion of any modifications or changes. The SSC approves the plan and it is sent to administration to be added to the Single Plan for Student Achievement. This plan (in its entirety) is reviewed

by SSC, Principal, Superintendent, and finally reviewed and approved by the Governing Board.

- d) The school provides parents of participating students with
 - 1. Timely information about the Title I program. (20 USC 6318 (c)(4)(A)):
 - Information concerning the Title 1 program is distributed via Class Dojo, Phone Dialer, as well as, Second Cup of Coffee, and SSC meetings. Letters are mailed home concerning details of the Title 1 program.
 - 2. A description and explanation of the curriculum in use at the school, the forms of academic assessments used to measure student progress, and the achievement levels of the challenging State academic standards. (20 USC 6318 (c)(4)(B))
 - Bonita uses state adopted curricular materials that are approved by the local LEA. These materials are reviewed each year and updated as required. Students have one to one computer access. Computer programs used include: Lexia, Zearn, Typing training, Ellevation, and Stride Academy. Intermediate Assessment Benchmarks are used throughout the year to gauge progress toward State academic standards. This data is compiled and reviewed by teachers to assess whether re-teaching is needed for optimal student performance.
 - 3. If requested by parents, opportunities for regular meetings to formulate suggestions and to participate, as appropriate, in decisions relating to the education of their children, and respond to any such suggestions as soon as practicably possible. (20 USC 6318 (c)(4)(C))
 - School Site Council meetings held four times a year
 - ELAC meetings held quarterly
 - Second Cup of Coffee meetings held twice a year
 - Monthly LEA Board Meetings
 - Meeting with Administration upon request
- e) If the school wide program plan is not satisfactory to the parents of participating children, submit any parent comments on the plan when the school makes the plan available to the local educational agency. (20 USC 6318 (c)(5))
 - Plan is mailed home to parents
 - Any concerns can be addressed through our SSC, Second Cup of Coffee, or meetings with Administration to formulate ideas or voice concerns.

To ensure effective involvement of parents and to support a partnership among the school involved, parents, and the community to improve student academic achievement, each school and local educational agency assisted with Title I, Part A funds, the school has established the following practices:
