

- National Campaign
- Raises public Awareness
 - Terrorism-related crime
 - Signs of terrorism
 - How to report suspicious activity



Recognize Suspicious Activity

- Suspicious activity observed behavior
 - Indicates pre-operational planning
 - Associated with terrorism or terrorism-related crime
- Some activities could be innocent
- Only trained law enforcement official
 - Determine when the behavior warrant additional action

Remember

These factors are not suspicious behavior:

- Race
- Ethnicity
- Gender
- National origin
- Religion
- Sexual orientation
- Gender identity

Nine Signs of Suspicious Activity

- 1. Expressed or Implied Threat
- 2. Surveillance
- 3. Theft/Loss/Diversion
- 4. Testing or Probing of Security

Nine Signs of Suspicious Activity

- 5. Breach/Attempted Intrusion
- 6. Eliciting Information
- 7. Misrepresentation
- 8. Cyberattack
- 9. Sabotage/Tampering/Vandalism

How to Report Suspicious Activity

- The 5 W's
 - Who
 - What
 - When
 - Where
 - Why
- Emergency Call 911
- Notify local law enforcement
