Students must sign in when they first arrive to school if it is after 8 am According to Ms. Sircey, most 1st period tardies are in the building

Should we worry about the first 5 minutes of class? Ms. Sircey also stated that in general, all buses are at school by 7:30 am Can't count 3 tardies as an absence; will never hold up if challenged We need a strategy that does not punish teachers for the actions of the student Current policy of detentions and reporting is not being followed

should admin talk to teachers who are not following policy?

Past Strategies

Exam exemption - not allowed by county anymore

Take away parking privileges

In the past we had parents drop off students and the parents were supposed to walk the students in, most parents (75%?) did not come in with kids

Mr. Dezio looked at other schools' policies and saw 3 common deterrents

Lunch Detention Parking Privileges

ISS

Student rep. Sierra Kindley is upset by apparent lack of consequences that occur due to chronic tardiness

Suggested Lunch detention discussion

1st tardy free 2nd and more = e-mail to someone in charge of lunch detention Multiple T's in a day = multiple lunch detentions

Note: this does not need to be in the lunchroom with administrators trying to watch that and the other kids – we need a new venue and supervision
