Planning for a Balanced Budget with the Goal of Providing Quality Education

Education finance in Minnesota is a complex system. It includes about 70 different funding streams from local, state, and federal sources—each with its own purpose and formula. The largest fund is the base student formula which is determined by the number of students in our schools. To plan the school district budget, we need to estimate our projected enrollment and

what that means for all of the different funding categories for the coming year. We don't know exactly how much funding we will receive until the school year is over! This is why it is so important for us to know how many students will be attending our schools, and why school registrations are done months ahead of the school year.

It is typical for school districts to have professional demographic or enrollment studies done every three to five years. Things can change depending upon the availability of housing, local job markets, commercial or residential expansions, and the number of children born in a given year. Saint Peter Schools recently had a

professional enrollment study completed. They look at many different aspects of our community, historical data, and the data of surrounding districts as well. Our region, not unlike many places in the state, has seen a decrease in the number of elementary age children. Our enrollment is likely to decline a bit further, followed by a period of slow growth. Part of the reason for this is that fewer children were born during the peak of the pandemic. In contrast, the general population of Saint Peter continues to increase, and with this growth, the projections could change. The availability of family housing will be a big factor in that equation.

As we prepare for the com-

ing school year, we will need to make reductions to balance the budget. There are several reasons for this. During the pandemic, the State and Federal government increased funding to meet the many needs of schools and families. This funding is being discontinued. Also, with lower enrollment, our budget needs to reflect those changes. In addition, inflation affects school districts like any other organization—the same dollars don't go as far for the goods and services (supplies, food, gas, etc) we need to operate.

About 75% of the school district budget is provided by the State of Minnesota. This funding has not kept up with inflation for many years. The legislature has the respon-

sibility of making decisions regarding funding for our schools. With the legislative session scheduled to end in May (sometimes June or even July!) school districts cannot wait for the session to be completed because June is the deadline for a budget to be reported to the State. Unfortunately, this puts school districts in a position of having to make decisions about budgets without all of the information. As always, we do our very best to make educated decisions with the information we have. Our goal is to provide students and families with the very best education possible while maintaining our fiduciary responsibilities of doing so within a balanced budget.

Ian Gerstbauer



He has challenged himself in the classroom through a wide range of AP and IB (International Baccalaureate) courses. He also is a three-year member of the SPHS Chapter of the National Honor Society.

"As Marching Band Drum Major, I learned about leadership and how to be commanding, encouraging, and fun," Gerstbauer said on his Triple A Award application. "I like to serve others. During the fall musical, the directors complimented me on how helpful I was and how I was always there when they needed something. As captain for the JV soccer team and the varsity team manager, I took equipment off the bus, picked up anything left on the bus after games, and helped put equipment in the shed."

Gerstbauer has immersed himself into the SPHS fine arts programs through the band program and added choir to the mix his senior year. He has served as a Junior and Senior Drum Major and was part of the MSU-Mankato Honor Band during his junior year. He also played clarinet with the Mankato Youth Symphony Orchestra during his junior year.

The Saints senior is a four-year member of the Saints' boys' soccer team serving as JV captain the past two years and, during the spring, is part of the Saints' boys tennis program.

Ian's future plans include attending a liberal arts college, but he isn't sure yet what his course of study will be. He does hope to participate in theater in college, and he hopes to take part in intramural/club soccer and/or tennis.

Adrianna Bixby, the daughter of Christi and Jim Bixby, maintains a well-balanced schedule during her time at SPHS, all the while earning a 4.27 weighted grade point average (GPA). During her time, she has engaged herself in several AP (Advanced Placement) and College in School courses.

"The biggest impact arts, athletics, and academics have had on me are showing me the importance of having a strong work ethic," Adrianna said on her Triple A application form. "Over the years, I have learned how blessed I am to have the opportunity to be involved in so many different things while getting a quality education. Because of this, I knew I should make the most of those opportunities and give my all towards them."

She has been a member of the National Honor Society for three years and the school's ExCEL winner in her junior year. Bixby also earned the St. Peter Lions Club Student of the Month award for October 2022. She has earned the Academic Letter Award from 2020-22 by achieving the A honor roll throughout her school years.

Bixby, who has participated in choir during high school, also volunteers as a church musician in the Saint Peter Evangelical Lutheran Church's Contemporary Band, where she plays guitar and

South first graders learn about Feeding Tube Awareness Week

Students in Ms. Welter's first grade class at South Elementary participated in an art project that used syringes and a variety of colors of paint. The syringes and paint helped simulate the follow of a feeding tube, much like what Hans' uses in his everyday life.



February 6-11 is Feeding Tube Awareness Week. As part of South Elementary's goal of learning about the uniqueness of others, classrooms will be reading and discussing the book "The Abilities in Me: Tube Feeding." This is a picture book that is dedicated to children who are tube fed and explores the journey of a young girl who tells her story of being tube fed through bright, colorful illustrations and text.

On Monday, February 6, South Elementary parent Allison Ellingson visited her son Hans' first grade classroom to talk about how Hans relies on a feeding tube to provide him with his daily nutrition and hydration. Hans is one of two students in Ms. Welter's first grade classroom and one of five students at South who are

dependent on feeding tubes. To simulate the flow of a feeding tube, students experimented using syringes and a variety of colors of paint.

According to the Feeding Tube Awareness Foundation's website, "About half a million children and adults in the United States alone rely on feeding tubes, a number that is expected to increase. Feeding tubes are not just for those at the end of life; they provide necessary nutritional support for children to live, grow, and thrive. There

are well over 350 conditions and diseases that can require tube feeding in children.

"The mission of Awareness Week is to promote the positive benefits of feeding tubes as a lifesaving medical intervention. The week also serves to educate the broader public about the medical reasons that children and adults are tube fed, the challenges that tube feeding families face, and day-to-day life for an individual who is tube fed."


