#### Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Salvaging Teens at Risk, Inc. dba North Texas Collegiate Academy (a non-profit organization), which comprise the statement of financial position as of August 31, 2020 and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

### Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

#### Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. #### 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### A. Organization and Nature of Activities -

Salvaging Teens at Risk, Inc. dba North Texas Collegiate Academy provides an alternative learning environment for students. The School operates under an open enrollment charter granted by the State of Texas Board of Education. This charter was issued for a period of five years starting December 11, 2000 and is subject to review and renewal periodically. The school is currently operating under a charter renewal until July 31, 2025. The School is part of the public-school system of the State of Texas and is therefore entitled to distribution from the State's available school fund. The School does not have the authority to impose ad valorem taxes or to charge tuition. The organization does business as Texas Education Centers and there is not currently any additional financial activity outside of the charter school. The School was incorporated in 1997 and has been recognized as an organization exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

#### B. Accounting Policies -

The financial statements have been prepared in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. The Financial Accounting Standards Board is the accepted standard setting body for establishing not-for-profit accounting and financial reporting principles. The accounting system is organized under the Special Supplement to Financial Accounting and Reporting – Nonprofit Charter School Chart of Accounts, a module of the Texas Education Agency Financial Accountability Resource Guide. The significant accounting policies are as follows:

To ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the School, the accounts are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting during the year. Resources for various purposes are classified into funds according to their nature and purposes. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, the accompanying statements of financial position and of activities focus on the organization as a whole and reports the amounts of its total assets, liabilities, net assets and changes in net assets in accordance with Financial Accounting Standards Board Statement No. 117.

#### Net Assets

Net assets, revenues, gains, and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor-or grantor-imposed restrictions. Accordingly, net assets and changes therein are classified as either without donor restrictions or with donor restrictions.

Net Assets Without Donor Restrictions - Net assets available for use in general operations and not subject to donor (or certain grantor) restrictions.

Net Assets with Donor Restrictions - Net assets subject to donor- (or certain grantor-) imposed restrictions. Some donor-imposed restrictions are temporary in nature, such as those that will be met by the passage of time or other events specified by the donor. Donor-imposed restrictions are released when a restriction expires, that is, when the stipulated time has elapsed, when the stipulated purpose for which the resource was restricted has been fulfilled, or both.

In accordance with state law, a charter holder is entitled to receive state aid for the charter school based on student attendance; however, before the charter holder may reclassify state aid from net assets with donor restrictions to net assets without donor restrictions, it must expend state aid for the benefit of its students consistent with TEC, §45.105(c).

#### C. Cash and Cash Equivalents -

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents are comprised of cash on hand and in banks and includes highly liquid investments with an original maturity of three months or less.

#### D. Fixed Assets and Depreciation -

All assets acquired with a value of \$5,000.00 or greater and an estimated useful life of three years or more are recorded as fixed assets and are valued at cost or estimated cost. Donated assets are reported at the fair market value at the time of acquisition. Depreciation of building improvements and equipment is provided over the estimated useful lives of the assets on a straight-line basis. Expenditures for additions, major renewals and betterments are capitalized, and maintenance and repairs are charged to expense as incurred. Donations of assets are recorded as direct additions to net assets at fair value at the date of donation, which is then treated as cost.

#### E. Revenues -

Revenues from the State of Texas available school fund are earned based on reported attendance. Contributions received are recognized as revenue in the period received and are reported as support either with or without donor-imposed restrictions, in accordance with FASB ASU 2016-14. Government grant contracts that are entered into by the School are recognized as revenue when services are rendered or when expenses in connection with those services are incurred in accordance with the accrual method.

#### F. Donated Goods and Services -

Donated goods and services that can be measured and meet certain other requirements are recorded in the financial statements as in-kind contributions and expenses of a like amount.

#### G. Personal Leave -

All employees earn five days of paid personal leave per year. However, unused balances do not accumulate; therefore, there is no liability accrued on the financial statements.

#### H. Estimates -

In preparation of the financial statements and in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles, management's estimated useful lives of asset classes were used in the calculation of depreciation.

#### I. Functional Allocation of Expenses -

The expense of the various programs and other activities has been presented on a functional basis in the statement of activities. Accordingly, certain expenses and supporting service costs have been allocated among the various programs.

#### J. Pension -

The fiduciary net position of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas (TRS) has been determined using the flow of economic resources measurement focus and full accrual basis of accounting. This includes for purposes of measuring the net pension liability, deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions, pension expense, and information about assets, liabilities, and additions to/deductions from TRS's fiduciary net position. Benefit payments (including refunds of employee contributions) are recognized when due and payable in accordance with the benefit terms. Investments are reported at fair value.

#### K. Recent Accounting Pronouncements -

The FASB has issued ASU 2014-09, Revenue from Contracts with Customers (Topic 606) to be effective for fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2019. Under this new standard, revenue will be recognized in the amount expected to be entitled to receive for the transfer of promised goods and services to customers. The standard will represent a major change in the methods that most generally accepted accounting principles' previous guidance has accounted for revenue.

The FASB has issued ASU No. 2016-02, Leases (Topic 842) to be effective for fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2021. Under this new standard, lessees are required to recognize on the balance sheet a lease asset and a lease liability for all leases with terms exceeding 12 months. In the case of operating leases previously only disclosed in the footnotes, this will represent a major change in presentation in the financial statements.

The Organization is currently evaluating the effect these new accounting pronouncements will have on the financial statements.

Depreciation expense for the year ended August 31, 2020 was \$273,195.00.

#### 3. PENSION PLAN

#### Plan Description

The Organization participates in a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension that has a special funding situation. The plan is administered by the Teacher Retirement System of Texas (TRS). TRS's defined benefit pension plan is established and administered in accordance with the Texas Constitution, Article XVI, Section 67 and Texas Government Code, Title 8, Subtitle C. The pension trust fund is a qualified pension trust under Section 401(a) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Texas Legislature establishes benefits and contribution rates within the guidelines of the Texas Constitution. The pension's Board of Trustees does not have the authority to establish or amend benefit terms. No part of the plan is subject to a collective bargaining agreement.

All employees of public, state-supported educational institutions in Texas who are employed for one-half or more of the standard work load and who are not exempted from membership under Texas Government Code, Title 8, Section 822.002 are covered by the system. Charter Schools are legally separate entities from the State and each other. Funds contributed by any one Charter School or ISD may be used to satisfy the

obligations of all the Charter Schools and ISDs in the System. The unfunded obligations are shared by the other Charter Schools and ISDs. There are no withdrawal penalties for leaving the TRS System.

Detailed information about the Teacher Retirement System is available in a separately-issued Comprehensive Annual Financial Report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information. That report may be obtained on the Internet at http://www.trs.state.tx.us/about/documents/cafr.pdf#CAFR; by writing to TRS at 1000 Red River Street, Austin, TX, 78701-2698; or by calling (512) 542-6592.

#### **Benefits Provided**

TRS provides service and disability retirement, as well as death and survivor benefits, to eligible employees (and their beneficiaries) of public and higher education in Texas. The pension formula is calculated using 2.3 percent (multiplier) times the average of the five highest annual creditable salaries times years of credited service to arrive at the annual standard annuity except for members who are grandfathered, the three highest annual salaries are used. The normal service retirement is at age 65 with 5 years of credited service or when the sum of the member's age and years of credited service equals 80 or more years. Early retirement is at age 55 with 5 years of service credit or earlier than 55 with 30 years of service credit. There are additional provisions for early retirement if the sum of the member's age and years of service credit total at least 80, but the member is less than age 60 or 62 depending on date of employment, or if the member was grandfathered in under a previous rule. There are no automatic post-employment benefit changes; including automatic COLAs. Ad hoc post-employment benefit changes, including ad hoc COLAs can be granted by the Texas Legislature as noted in the Plan description in (A) above.

#### **Contributions**

Contribution requirements are established or amended pursuant to Article 16, section 67 of the Texas Constitution which requires the Texas legislature to establish a member contribution rate of not less than 6% of the member's annual compensation and a state contribution rate of not less than 6% and not more than 10% of the aggregate annual compensation paid to members of the system during the fiscal year. Texas Government Code section 821.006 prohibits benefit improvements, if as a result of the particular action, the time required to amortize TRS' unfunded actuarial liabilities would be increased to a period that exceeds 31 years, or, if the amortization period already exceeds 31 years, the period would be increased by such action.

Employee contribution rates are set in state statute, Texas Government Code 825.402. Senate Bill 12 of the 86th Texas Legislature amended Texas Government Code 825.402 for member contributions and established employee contribution rates for fiscal years 2020 thru 2025. It also added a 1.5% contribution for employers not paying Old Age Survivor and Disability Insurance (OASDI) on certain employees effective for fiscal year 2016 as discussed in Note 1 of the TRS 2014 CAFR. The 85<sup>th</sup> Texas Legislature, General Appropriations Act (GAA) confirmed the contribution rates would remain the same for 2019 and 2020.

Contributors to the plan include members, employers and the State of Texas as the only non-employer contributing entity. The State is the employer for senior colleges, medical schools and state agencies including TRS. In each respective role, the State contributes to the plan in accordance with state statutes and the General Appropriations Act (GAA).

As the non-employer contributing entity for public education and junior colleges, the State of Texas contributes to the retirement system an amount equal to the current employer contribution rate times the

aggregate annual compensation of all participating members of the pension trust fund during that fiscal year reduced by the amounts described below which are paid by the employers. Employers (public school, junior college, other entities or the State of Texas as the employer for senior universities and medical schools) are required to pay the employer contribution rate in the following instances:

- On the portion of the member's salary that exceeds the statutory minimum for members entitled to the statutory minimum under Section 21.402 of the Texas Education Code.
- During a new member's first 90 days of employment.
- When any part or all of an employee's salary is paid by federal funding sources, a privately sponsored source, from non-educational and general, or local funds.
- When the employing district is a public junior college or junior college district, the employer shall
  contribute to the retirement system an amount equal to 50% of the state contribution rate for certain
  instructional or administrative employees; and 100% of the state contribution rate for all other
  employees.

In addition to the employer contributions listed above, there are two additional surcharges an employer is subject to:

- When employing a retiree of the Teacher Retirement System the employer shall pay both the member contribution and the state contribution as an employment after retirement surcharge.
- When a school district or charter school does not contribute to the Federal Old-Age, Survivors, and Disability Insurance (OASDI) Program for certain employees, they must contribute 1.5 percent of the applicable salary.

#### **Additional Plans**

Certain employees of the organization are covered under Federal Social Security and Medicare. Under the provisions of that law, covered employees contribute 6.2% for Social Security and 1.45% for Medicare of their covered annual earnings and the Organization pays the matching Social Security and Medicare amounts.

#### 4. OTHER POST EMPLOYMENT BENEFIT PLAN

#### **Plan Description**

The Organization participates in the Texas Public School Retired Employees Group Insurance Program (TRS-Care). TRS-Care is a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined Other Post Employment Benefit (OPEB) plan that has a special funding situation. The plan is administered through a trust by the Teacher Retirement System of Texas (TRS) Board of Trustees. TRS-Care is established and administered in accordance with the Texas Insurance Code, Chapter 1575.

Detailed information about the TRS-Care plan is available in the TRS Comprehensive Annual Financial Report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information. That report may be obtained on the Internet at http://www.trs.state.tx.us/about/documents/cafr.pdf#CAFR; by writing to TRS at 1000 Red River Street, Austin, TX, 78701-2698; or by calling (512) 542-6592.

#### **Benefits Provided**

TRS-Care provides a basic health insurance coverage at low cost to all retirees from public schools, charter schools, regional education service centers, and other educational districts who are members of the TRS pension plan. Optional dependent coverage is available for an additional premium.

#### 5. HEALTH CARE COVERAGE

Employees of the School are covered by a group insurance plan. The School pays \$400.00 towards the employee's premium and the employee pays the balance due plus premiums for dependent coverage through payroll deductions. All premiums were paid to licensed insurers.

#### 6. DUE FROM FEDERAL GOVERNMENT

At August 31, 2020, the Organization was due \$32,425.01 in Title I funds, \$41,275.14 in IDEA-B funds, \$831.94 in Title II funds, \$2,631.16 in Title III funds, \$5,323.27 in ESSER Grant funds, \$10,500.00 in Instructional Continuity funds, and \$25,000.00 in School Safety and Security funds. These amounts will be received from the Federal Government during the 2020-2021 school year.

#### 7. DUE FROM STATE

At August 31, 2020, the Organization had been underpaid \$9,183.00 in State Foundation Program funds. This amount will be received from the Texas Education Agency during the 2020-2021 school year.

#### 8. CASH DEPOSIT RISK

At August 31, 2020 and throughout the school year, the School's cash in bank accounts was not entirely covered by Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) insurance but has been fully covered all year by pledged collateral held by the School's agent bank.

#### 9. ECONOMIC DEPENDENCY

During the year the School received the majority of its revenues from the Texas Education Agency through a Charter Agreement and through federal grants available to charter schools. The loss of this Charter Agreement would have a material effect on the ability of the School to continue to provide the current level of services to its students.

#### 10. COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

The School receives funds through state and federal programs which are governed by various rules and regulations of the grantor. Expenses charged to the grant program are subject to audit and adjustment by the grantor agency. In the opinion of management, aside from the temporary restrictions on net assets as explained below, there are no contingent liabilities relating to compliance with rules and regulations governing the grants; therefore, no provision has been made in the accompanying financial statements for such contingencies.

#### 12. LONG-TERM DEBT

At August 31, 2020 the Schools long-term debt consisted of the following:

The Organization obtained a construction loan with Independent Bank to purchase land and construct a school and administration facilities at 4601 North I-35, Denton, TX. The loan was originally for \$1,380,000.00 at an interest rate of prime, but not lower than 3.25%. The Organization refinanced the loan at an interest rate of 4.25% with monthly payments of \$8,395.28 and a balloon payoff May 18<sup>th</sup> 2019 of approximately \$1,054,049.09. This loan was refinanced May 18, 2019 at an amount of \$1,056,489.00 for an amortizing period of 60 months with payments of \$8,536.94 including interest at 5.25% and a balloon payment of approximately \$792,003.47.

#### 12. LONG-TERM DEBT (continued)

The Organization obtained a construction loan with Independent Bank to purchase land and construct a school and administration facilities at Crestwood Place, Little Elm, TX. The loan was originally for \$1,764,541.58 at an interest rate of 4.5% with monthly payments of \$11,452.23 and a balloon payoff April 7th 2019 of approximately \$1,437,022.91. This loan was refinanced April 7, 2019 at an amount of \$1,515,505.00 for an amortizing period of 59 months with payments of \$12,245.22 including interest at 5.25% and a balloon payment at an estimated amount of \$1,136,667.00.

On May 7, 2020, the Organization received loan proceeds in the amount of \$586,600.00 under the Paycheck Protection Program ("PPP"). Established as part of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security Act ("CARES Act"), the PPP provides for loans to qualifying businesses in amounts up to 2.5 times the business's average monthly payroll expenses. PPP loans and accrued interest are forgivable after a "covered period" (eight or 24 weeks) as long as the borrower maintains its payroll levels and uses the loan proceeds for eligible purposes, including payroll, benefits, rent, and utilities. The forgiveness amount will be reduced if the borrower terminates employees or reduces salaries during the covered period. Any unforgiven portion of a PPP loan is payable over two years at an interest rate of 1%, with a deferral of payments for 10 months after then end of the covered period. The Organization used the PPP loan proceeds for purposes consistent with the PPP and applied for and are expecting to receive full forgiveness. The Organization has recorded a note payable and will record forgiveness upon being legally released from the loan obligation in the next fiscal period.

#### 14. SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Management has reviewed subsequent events through January 18, 2021 for the purpose of evaluating the need for their inclusion in these notes. There have been no material subsequent events to note herein.

#### 15. LIQUIDITY AND AVAILABILITY

Financial assets available for general expenditure, that is, without donor or other restrictions limiting their use, within one year of the date of the statement of financial position, comprise the following:

Except for the financial assets listed above, the State and Federal Program assets and revenues are classified as with donor restrictions and must be used for education purposes in accordance with State law and Grant restrictions. As such, there are cash and receivables that are due from the State and Federal Agencies and are available for use for educational purposes and are released from restrictions at the time they are spent for those purposes.

#### 16. FEDERAL INCOME TAXES

The Organization is a non-profit organization exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code except to the extent it has business income unrelated to its tax exempt purpose. The Organization has no unrelated business income and is not expecting to have any in the future, accordingly, there is no provision for federal income taxes in the financial statements. Generally Accepted Accounting Principles requires the evaluation of tax positions taken in the preparation of the tax returns and the recording of a tax liability if an uncertain tax position has been taken that is more likely than not sustainable upon audit by the Internal Revenue Service. Management has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Organization and there have been no uncertain tax positions taken that would require the recognition or disclosure in the financial statements. The tax returns for the years ended 8/31/2017, 8/31/2018 and 8/31/2019 are still subject to possible IRS audit but management has not been notified of any pending examinations.

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered Salvaging Teens at Risk, Inc. dba North Texas Collegiate Academy's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of Salvaging Teens at Risk, Inc. dba North Texas Collegiate Academy's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of Salvaging Teens at Risk, Inc. dba North Texas Collegiate Academy's internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any

deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified.

#### **Compliance and Other Matters**

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether Salvaging Teens at Risk, Inc. dba North Texas Collegiate Academy's financial statements are free from material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

#### Purpose of this Report

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control or on compliance. This report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the entity's internal control and compliance. Accordingly, this communication is not suitable for any other purpose.
