

Umbrellas, Backpacks, and School Supplies: *Bethpage Schools Welcome Students to the 2011-2012 School Year*

Rainy weather did not hinder a smooth opening or dampen anyone's spirits at the beginning of the 2011-2012 school year.

On Tuesday, September 6, the District's newest students – kindergarteners – were greeted as they arrived at school each armed with a backpack brimming with school supplies.

The incoming middle school students attended an orientation in late August in order to familiarize themselves with their new surroundings prior to the first day of class. JFK guidance counselors and eighth-grade National Junior Honor Society students led the sixth graders on a tour of the school. They were then escorted into their respective homerooms where they received their schedules and agenda books. While the sixth graders were getting "oriented," their parents had an opportunity to meet with the JFK administration and a sixthgrade guidance counselor to become more familiar with the middle school curriculum.

Similarly, incoming freshmen attended their orientation, which was conducted by the high school administration, guidance counselors, and senior members of Student Council. The upperclassmen spoke to the ninth graders about the importance of involvement in clubs, athletics, Student Civic, 21st Century Scholars' Program, and Student Council. The new students were then divided into groups and escorted to classrooms to discuss school policies. Later in the day, they attended a workshop entitled "How to Be a Great Peer Mentor."

FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

There is a great deal of change occurring in education these days. New York State has adopted a new curriculum framework called the Common Core Standards in Math and English Language Arts. Teachers are being evaluated under a new plan adopted by the state. New assessments are being introduced at all levels. Many of those assessments are designed to pinpoint student strengths and weaknesses and allow teachers and parents to focus on what students need to practice. Finally, new technologies are being deployed to further engage students in the learning process.

So you can imagine the stress for teachers these days! Teaching has definitely gotten harder, yet many people are blaming teachers for problems these days. In fact, if education is to change dramatically, it will be teachers who lead the way. Let me point out some of the positive contributions of the Bethpage teaching staff:

Teachers volunteered all summer long with no pay to work on the new evaluation program. Bethpage was one of the first districts in Nassau County to fulfill the state's evaluation requirement. Our program included a new set of rigorous assessments to be administered locally three times a year that will measure student academic growth. The growth measure will now factor into a teacher's evaluation. In addition, teachers will be evaluated on a new, more rigorous observation system, their ongoing communication with parents, a professional portfolio, and the establishment of teaching goals. It is quite a change that impacts every teacher in the District, whether they have tenure or not.

Dozens of teachers worked this summer on curriculum projects that incorporate the new Common Core strategies into daily practice.

Teachers continue to dream of ways to engage students in our 21st Century Scholars' Program and are doing activities after school, at night, on weekends and on vacations. These activities range from literature circles to visits to Manhattan.

Several teachers came forward to facilitate workshops in the Parent Academy, intended to provide parents with a better understanding of the new expectations for students. The teacher workshops included strategies for reading at home, reducing stress, the 21st Century program, and the use of technology in the classroom. The teachers' union paid much of the cost for the evening.

The teachers' union has donated significant funds to support District programs for students like TGIF, student mentoring and Challenge Day. They understand the importance of students having positive experiences in school. For that reason, many teachers volunteer to serve on our District's successful Character Education Committee which is responsible for the many anti-bullying programs in our schools.

The teachers' union has done all this and agreed to a zero percent contractual increase for the next school year.

I have said publicly many times that I am a big fan of the Bethpage faculty. I think they work very hard and have the best interests of your children as their highest priority. When I talk to colleagues in other districts, I do not get the same sense of teachers as partners in the community. Teachers know that Bethpage is a special place and are doing everything they can to assist us in preserving that strong sense of community that sets us apart. I appreciate all they do.




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National Merit Scholarship Program Recognitions


Congratulations to all four students on their academic achievements that have resulted in recognition from this competitive academic scholarship program.

Last spring, over 6,500 sophomores and juniors from across New York State spent countless hours preparing for All-State evaluations in the hopes of being selected as an All-State musician. The selection process begins with the student's solo receiving evaluation from a NYSSMA-certified All-State adjudicator at one of 43 All-State audition sites throughout New York State. Adjudicators are responsible for evaluating every solo of the same instrument or voice part. At the conclusion of the festival, the adjudicators create a rank-ordered proficiency list of all students being recommended. Every student who earns a score of 98-100 must be recommended.

The story of Gander, Newfoundland began ten years ago on September 11, 2001. Nearly 7,000 air travelers were stranded as a result of the tragic events that occurred on that day. Gander residents opened their homes to the rerouted travelers and provided food, clothing, entertainment, and a place to sleep.

After learning about their wonderful hospitality, Bethpage High School physical education teacher Mike Fenster contacted town constable Oswald (Os) Fudge to say thank you. That friendship motivated Mr. Fenster to obtain two pieces of World Trade Center steel as a gift to the people of Gander as well as the surrounding communities of Appleton, Glenwood, Grand Falls-Windsor, and Lewisporte. One piece of steel is from the Bethpage Fire Department, and the other from the New York Port Authority. The steel is now displayed in the town's aviation museum.

"It was a good experience to meet Constable Fudge and the people of Gander," said BHS senior Danielle Brusca. "It was definitely a memorable week."

"The six students represented our school district and community really well," stated Mr. Fenster. "Thank you to Mr. Clark for allowing us to take this trip."





Honoring Our Troops Overseas

Eighth-grade students in Tom Scarola's and Theresa Schneider's Family and Consumer Science classes at John F. Kennedy Middle School embarked on a Service Learning Project in conjunction with Northrop Grumman and the United Service Organizations (USO).

The students wrote thank you letters and letters of inspiration to military personnel stationed overseas, honoring them for all that they do for our country. On the face of each letter were the following words: "Thank you for your courage and dedication. Thank you for my freedom."

"As we begin our walk to honor the memory of the 3,030 victims, the heroes, and all those affected by 9/11, we also want to remember all of the survivors, brave first responders, veterans, and all of the men and women who continue to serve and protect our country today," continued Principal Cintado.

The students and faculty walked 3,030 steps through the school and into the schoolyard, then silently made their way back to their classrooms.

The Power of One

Students in all grades at Charles Campagne Elementary School attended an anti-bullying assembly presented by Soren Bennick Productions entitled "The Power of One." Actors Molly Roberson and Jimmy D'Amico presented a series of skits utilizing different colored boxes and masks that represented the different roles in the bullying process. The creative skits vividly portrayed what bullying is, what can be done about it, and how every child has the power of one — the power to report bullying whenever he or she

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sees it. "The Power of One" explored three roles in bullying: the bully, the target, and the bystander. It also gave dramatic examples of different types of bullying techniques: physical, verbal, exclusion, and, for the older students, cyber bullying. The show warned students that targets need help and intervention, and it encouraged them to not be bystanders, emphasizing the need for individual action to make their school and community a safer, better place. Whenever the audience was asked what they should do when they saw

He cautioned the students about the use of extension cords, to avoid downed wires, and created "what if" scenarios and solutions for electrical emergencies. With the use of a model, Mr. Coyle brought many of the "what ifs" to life. "Electricity does a lot of damage if you touch it. Stay away from it," he cautioned.

GLOBAL DAYS OF LISTENING

Twenty students ranging from freshmen to seniors in the 21st Century Scholars' Program at Bethpage High School made a connection by conference call with the Afghan Youth Peace Volunteers in Bamiyan Province, Afghanistan.

This was not an easy task for either group, given the language barrier and lack of technology in Afghanistan. As part of the program, the two groups have been conversing for one year now with the

Dr. Young, who arrived in Afghanistan ten years ago to aid refugees, is known to the Afghan yolunteers as Hakim.

A photo of the participating Afghan youth was projected on a SMARTBoard because an actual

videoconference is not possible in

Afghanistan. Hakim responded, "We appreciate the opportunity to talk with your American students."

A question-and-answer session with the Bethpage students and the Afghan youth followed. The first question, asked by Michelle Mason, president of Student Civic, was, "What does peace actually mean to you?" After translating back and forth between Hakim


and the Afghan youth, the response was, "All things good."

A second question was posed by Julia Musetich: "If you could change one thing about where you live, what would it be?" They answered, "Change for the people of Afghanistan means bringing them together."

Thanks to the District's cutting-edge technology and the students' willingness to participate in the program, the two groups managed to convey their mutual messages of peace.

Promoting Positive Behaviors and Building Good Character

JFK Middle School kicked off the Second Step Program for the 2011-2012 school year. This researchbased classroom activity program is designed to teach students how to positively navigate their way through a number of different risky behaviors, such as bullying, aggression, and substance abuse, and how to improve academic success through skills emphasized in the classroom. All students were exposed to a Character Education lesson on empathy and communication. The entire middle school staff delivered this important lesson to all of the students in the building prior to their regular scheduled classes. Each lesson included audio and visual components with video clips, group discussions, and worksheets that prompted students to apply their skills as they examined various situations.

Superintendent's Conference Day

In September, the District held Superintendent's Conference Day in preparation for the opening of schools. The day began with Superintendent of Schools Terrence Clark welcoming new administrators — Dave Schneider (new principal at JFK Middle School), Carol Leonardi (new guidance chair), and Kerri McCarthy (new principal at Kramer Lane) — and offering hearty congratulations to all newlyweds, new parents, and newly tenured staff. Many of the wonderful summer programs and accomplishments were highlighted.

One such accomplishment was made by the high school students in the CORE program, who, under the assistance of advisor Jon LaRochester, renovated the Pediatric Room at Nassau University Medical Center. These students raised \$20,000 over the past two years and received a \$5,000 donation from Cablevision. They painted the room, assembled furniture they had purchased, and provided high-tech equipment such as computers and iPads.

Among other highlights from the summer, SMARTBoards were installed in all of Bethpage's elementary schools. In addition, high school physical education teacher Mike Fenster helped the Newfoundland town of Gander obtain a 120pound piece of steel from the World Trade Center in gratitude for their hospitality to travelers on September 11, 2001.

Many significant changes that are being faced by the District were reviewed in depth:

The 2% tax levy cap recently passed the Legislature and was signed into law

by Governor Cuomo. This cap will pose some challenges for funding programs as the District moves forward.

Common Core State Standards (CCSS) - 46 states including New York have adopted a unified set of learning standards in mathematics and English Language Arts (ELA), and these

standards are to be fully implemented within the 2012-2013 school year. The Partnership for the Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers (PARCC) assessments are ahead. PARCC has initiated the development of a K-12 assessment system aligned to the Common Core State Standards in English Language Arts and mathematics.

NYSED has mandated the new teacher and principal evaluation process, or Annual Professional Performance Review (APPR).

In November, Superintendent's Conference Day continued with the theme from September. Some of the workshops for the District's teachers included the Common Core State Standards in English Language Arts (ELA), reading, math, and social studies; Northwest Evaluation Assessments (NWEA) training; gap report analysis; and technology.

Working Together for Our Kids This November, the District introduced its fifth Parent Academy at Bethpage High School, providing workshops important to parents in all grades - from kindergarten through grade twelve.

What's New in the School Kitchen?

The District has taken the initiative to be proactive in moving towards the Institute of Medicine (IOM) guidelines, which will soon be implemented as required by New York State Education Department (NYSED) Child Nutrition. During the last school year, the District held nutrition meetings with committee members soliciting changes to improve the school lunch program. Many of their requests, including more fresh food choices, cooking from scratch when possible, and eliminating fried foods have been incorporated into the meal plan. The District has also employed Whitsons School Nutrition as the new food service provider for the 2011-2012 school year.


In an effort to expand the healthier student meal program to parents, the District is now providing an opportunity for parents and guardians to learn ways to prepare quick and nutritious meals.

Bethpage's Continuing Education Program kicked off its new culinary arts cooking series with three new courses this fall. The first, which began on October 5, was an Italian Cooking class taught by Chef Paul Doyle, employed by Whitsons Culinary Group. Chef Doyle also taught the next two courses, Main Course Cooking and Mediterranean Cooking. In addition to the three new cooking classes provided this fall, three culinary arts cooking courses will be offered in the spring of 2012. Participants in the cooking classes will get a "taste" of the offerings and quality of the program.

During the first cooking class, Chef Doyle taught the students the basic skills and techniques of how to prepare a complete and healthy Italian dinner consisting of an appetizer of artichoke and white bean bruschetta, a first course of pasta with Bolognese sauce, and a second course of chicken cutlets in a lemon caper sauce with sautéed spinach. Each component of the menu was broken down into easy-to-understand terminology, with Chef Doyle demonstrating the proper way to hold a knife and chop ingredients. He also shared tips on items that could be prepared the night before and the quality of ingredients.

The focus of the Continuing Education Program's culinary arts cooking series is to help parents and guardians use the knowledge that they gain from the classes to cook healthier at home, thus reinforcing healthy eating at home and at school.

SMARTBOards *Embraced by Elementary Staff*



The District is thrilled with the SMARTBoard initiative at the elementary schools. Just like their colleagues at the secondary level, elementary staff have embraced this important technology as another critical tool to enhance student learning in the classroom. The District's elementary teachers were provided with training last March in preparation for the new boards. They were given more intensive training again in June and late August as the boards were installed, and received even more advanced training in October. The result of the District's commitment to this type of instructional technology and the extensive staff training that occurred bodes quite well for successful learning to take place throughout Bethpage during the 2011-2012 school year and into the future.
