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BETHPAGE Gets Down to Business

Over the past several years, the High School business Bethpage program has steadily grown to include a wider variety of courses for students to learn real-world skills. High school business teachers Nancy Simpson and Anthony Murray noticed there was a large number of students studying business in college, and they felt there was an opportunity to better prepare students for their futures. As veterans of the business world, they applied their skills and wisdom to expand the Bethpage business program, creating a robust list of offerings for students in grades 10-12.

"We found that in the past so many students would major in business in college and now that we're able to grow the business program, we're meeting that demand," Ms. Simpson said. "The students are getting exposure to it here so that they're making informed choices when they go to school."

The business program has grown to include accounting, business management, personal finance and marketing, with college credits available in some courses. The classes focus on having students practice life skills and relating lessons to current events. For example, the Personal Finance class participates in a lifelike stock market game, buying and selling stocks to make a profit.

"The new classes have served as great introductory courses that have helped students progress from a basic understanding of business to a practical, real-world use," Mr. Murray said.

A Student-Run Enterprise

The culmination of the business curriculum is Virtual Enterprise. The


course is available to junior and senior students and allows them to experience every aspect of business in a simulated environment. Bethpage High School boasts three Virtual Enterprise teams and, for the first time, students are able to take the course in both their junior and senior years.

"Virtual Enterprise gives each student accountability for their job," Ms. Simpson said.

Typically, the companies are able to attend large-scale events to market and sell their products and compete with other Virtual Enterprise companies from around the country and world. This year, students will engage virtually with thousands of firms to participate in competitions, trade shows and fairs.

Creating a More Diverse Business World

The business courses at Bethpage have historically been male-dominated, but both Ms. Simpson and Mr. Murray made a concerted effort to put a focus on diversity in their classes by covering a wider range of topics. For example, they transformed Sports Marketing

into Principles of Marketing, which in addition to sports covers topics such as entertainment and fashion. The wider range of options attracted a more diverse group of students.

For Sarah Ali, co-CEO for the Virtual Enterprise company METAkey, the new courses allowed her to delve deeper into the business world and understand where her interests lie. As one of the students who took two of the new business courses, Business

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Management and Principles of Marketing, Sarah began Virtual Enterprise with a solid foundation, leading her to focus on the areas of business that were most engaging to her in an independent and innovative way.

"Virtual Enterprise is an enjoyable way to learn about the business industry," Sarah said. "Having a class that offers the ability to tap into my creative side and collaborate with others is something that is very much appreciated, and it's one of the few classes that can set you up for the real world."

Building Blocks for Success

Aside from preparing students for their future at the high school level, initiatives around the district continue to lay the foundation for students of all ages. In grades 2-5, a new keyboarding skills curriculum has been introduced in accordance with the New York State Next Generation English Language Arts Learning Standards. At the onset of the program, the focus is on technique over speed. As students

progress, they concentrate on their speed and accuracy. Two programs, Typing Pal and Typing Club, are used to present students with keyboarding challenges that get progressively more difficult as they move on to different levels.

"We introduced the keyboarding curriculum to make sure that kids at an early age are getting comfortable with typing on a computer," Mike Spence, assistant superintendent for curriculum and instruction, said. "Keyboarding is an essential skill nowadays and we want students to be well-acquainted by the time they reach fifth grade."

Additionally, the district continues to implement programs such as KidOYO, Making Grammar Stick, ST Math and Writers Workshop.

KidOYO has been expanded from just the middle school level to include ninth grade as well. The district also continues to focus on the Responsive Classroom approach at the elementary level, focusing on social and emotional skills alongside an academic curriculum.
