# A Flying Eagle



SENIOR CONNOR GOLDEN IS ONE BETHPAGE EAGLE THAT HAS TRULY TAKEN FLIGHT.

After completing 70 hours of flight training, accumulated since the age of 13, this September Connor took and passed not only his written test, but also his flight test, and earned his pilot's license for operating a single engine propeller plane under 12,500 pounds.

His journey to flight school began at the age of 3 when his dad mentioned to him that the fighter jets flying around were "protecting his mother," who was a first responder following Sept. 11. Enamored since that very moment, Connor took an interest in planes and received a flight lesson as a gift for his 13th birthday. It was a ninth-grade field trip to Republic Airport, though, that sealed his interest in becoming a pilot.

"I spoke to a pilot at Republic Airport that day and decided I could be a pilot in the military," Connor said. "I have dedicated myself to that goal ever since."

He is currently in the process

of applying to the United States Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, where he wants to be part of the flight team and ultimately become a fighter jet pilot or a member of its Office of Special Investigation.

"It's a very hard academy to get in to," Connor said. "But they offer the most opportunity for what I want to do and I'm willing to commit myself."

Connor currently serves as the class president and captain of the spring track team. He is an AP Scholar with Honor and a member of the National Honor Society. He was one of the students who helped spearhead the district's Fit and Fun campaign two years ago and has coordinated many class ski trips.

Beyond the Air Force Academy, Connor intends to eventually take night courses to earn a law degree so that once his military commitment is completed, he can pursue a career in politics.

## COMMENDED STUDENTS



Bethpage High School seniors Melissa Cao, Kripa Dahal, Megan Hsun, Gabriela M. Iacovano and Joane Kim have been named Commended Students in the National Merit Scholarship Program. 

## Soaring Up the Scales

Three Bethpage High School student-musicians have been selected to perform in the All-State Festival of the 2015 NYSSMA Winter Conference in December. They were chosen for this prestigious honor based on the proficiency they demonstrated at NYSSMA auditions last May. To prepare for the rigorous process, students spent countless hours preparing for the auditions. Only 900 students in the state were selected to participate in the December festival.

## ALL-NATIONAL SELECTION

Senior violinist Melissa Cao was chosen for the National Association for Music Education's 2015 All-National Honor Ensembles. To be considered, Melissa had to submit an online application and video audition. Only 150 students in the country were chosen to perform in the All-National Symphony Orchestra, representing the top-performing student-musicians in the United States.



In addition to this honor, Melissa holds the designations of All-State and All-County musician, and is a six-year participant in the Long Island String Festival Association concerts. She has played the violin since the third grade and is concertmaster of the school orchestra.

"I didn't expect it," she said. "I just sent [my application] in, and I am honored to have been selected."

The performance took place during NAFME's All-National Honor Ensembles event at the Gaylord Opryland Hotel and Conference Center in Nashville, Tennessee, Oct. 25-28.



## Campus Courtyard

In an effort to give the high school more of a college-style campus feeling, the district completed a renovation project to its central courtyard. Renovations included the installation of benches and brickwork, as well as beautification to the landscape.

The high school has already held an outdoor Activities and Club Fair, featuring a jazz ensemble, in the new courtyard and intends to hold many events, as well as picnic lunches, in the new area.



## Chromebook Expansion

As part of an expanding initiative, the district has equipped all students in grades 3-10 with Google Chromebooks. At the elementary level, each student is assigned a personal laptop for use in class, and the technology is incorporated into many instructional lessons.

As an example, fourth-graders in

Sara Dionne's class at Kramer Lane recently used their Chromebooks to sign up for the 21st Century program and began earning credits for volunteer work and participation in clubs. On a daily basis, the laptop is used to facilitate the Achieve 3000 reading program, as well as provide

an outlet for students to conduct research and engage in educational online games.

“It’s a lot of fun to use,” fourth-grader Benjamin Friedrich said. “It’s really light and durable and is helpful to use for schoolwork.”

The district hopes to continue expanding the initiative to all grade levels.

## Space CAMP

Based upon recommendations from teachers and a genuine interest in the subject matter, eighth-graders Vincent Perez and Anthony Verde were chosen to attend Space Camp in Huntsville, Alabama, for five days this summer. Sixth-grade science teacher Vincent Perez Sr., Vincent's father, participated in the teacher training portion of the program.

The student camp had four components: a history of space exploration, astronaut training, technical skills and graduation. Teachers participated in STEM-related activities that could be replicated in the classroom and learned about the unique history of NASA. All three participants

were left with memories that will stay with them for a lifetime.

“For me, working in and learning about where it started, and then meeting astronauts in person, were the highlights of the program,” Perez Sr. said. “We did two simulators, and I have video of my participation in both. I’m planning to show these to my classes so they can see their teacher experiencing zero gravity and better understand what it is like for an astronaut.”

The district's participation was sponsored by local Northrop Grumman Corporation, which seeks to build awareness of space exploration in future generations.

## ENHANCING INSTRUCTION WITH EXPERIENCE

While students were enjoying their summer vacation, Lorraine Marcis, science enrichment and elementary coordinator for the 21st Century program, was on a school field trip of her own. In July, she embarked on a research adventure of a lifetime in which she, three other educators and 22 students from across the United States went on a scientific expedition to the Cape Eleuthera Institute in the Bahamas. While there, she participated in an intensive, hands-on research experience with residents and visiting scientists. In addition to learning about the symbiotic relationship between flounders and plants, encountering a shark and receiving a lesson on the fragility of coral at the beach, the lessons went much deeper for Marcis.

"Interacting with the local Bahamians was a major highlight of the trip," she shared.

With the district's emphasis on STEM-related activities in the classroom, Marcis' experiences will prove invaluable to her students. Bethpage is one of only a few districts that have a science program at the elementary level in which the teachers work cooperatively to enhance the New York State science standards curriculum and provide opportunities for hands-on science exploration. The JASON Project, with which Marcis has a membership, provides the framework for many elementary-appropriate projects and experiments.

"The JASON program makes it easier for educators to bring adventure into the curriculum and for students to explore real-world science and its benefits to a society," Marcis said. "Just as I will never forget my experiences in Cape Eleuthera, these students will always remember the learning that occurred outside the box."

This year, Marcis intends to incorporate a hands-on wetlands curriculum, in which students will build a model of a river system and build and test a dam in a model river valley.




The Class of 2016 presented "The 70's Seniors."



The Golden Eagles Marching Band led the parade down Stewart Avenue, added zest to the game and performed during halftime.





Served as a beloved teacher's aide at John F. Kennedy Middle School for 42 years; her family owned the farm where the JFK school now sits



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


