Board of Education Appoints David Schneider AS NEXT SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

At its Oct. 24 business meeting, the Bethpage Board of Education unanimously appointed David Schneider as the district's next superintendent of schools, effective July 1, 2018. He will replace current Superintendent Terrence Clark, who is retiring after 32 years

of service to the district. Mr. Schneider currently serves as the district's assistant superintendent for instruction and technology, a position he has held for the past four years.

Mr. Schneider brings a wealth of knowledge to the position of superintendent, with more than

16 years of experience in the education field. During his tenure as assistant superintendent for instruction and technology, he has overseen the implementation of the district's 1:1 Chromebook initiative, which included providing the necessary professional development for staff. He also spearheaded the district's partnership with Google to add the Google G Suite for students and staff, as well as facilitated the district's hosting of Google ExploreEDU, an event designed to introduce school technology professionals to different technology solutions in the classroom.

In addition, Mr. Schneider has overseen the implementation of new programs within the Bethpage schools, including Go Math, Writer's Workshop, Be an Expert and Frontier, as well as the expansion of Achieve 3000 into grades 3-5. At the high school level, he has overseen expanded course offerings to include a number of Advanced Placement and college-level classes. Mr. Schneider has also helped to expand offerings to staff members within the district's Professional Development Academy, including the district's first blended courses (classes in which a portion of the instruction is web-based, online learning).

Prior to his current role, Mr. Schneider served as principal of John F. Kennedy Middle School in the district and as an assistant principal at Merrick Avenue Middle School in the Bellmore-Merrick Central High School District. He also serves

as a national staff instructor for the National Soccer Coaches Association of America.

Mr. Schneider holds a Bachelor of Arts in geology from Binghamton University and a Master of Arts in education/special education from Touro College. He earned his Professional Diploma in Administration from LIU Post and merited the distinction of receiving the Walter Seuss Award in recognition of being the "outstanding student in the program." Mr. Schneider has also completed his doctoral coursework in teaching and learning at Hofstra University.

"I am honored to be appointed as Bethpage's next superintendent of schools," said Mr. Schneider. "I look forward to continuing the district's tradition of excellence and maintaining the high standards that have made our schools so successful. I am excited to work with the Board of Education, the entire Bethpage staff and the greater community to continue to evolve our educational program to ensure the success of all students."

"We are pleased to announce Mr. Schneider as our next superintendent," said Board of Education President Michael Kelly. "He is a proven educational leader within the Bethpage community and has already established positive relationships with all constituencies. We are confident that Mr. Schneider will be a positive asset for years to come and will continue our district's trajectory of success."



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
Chromebooks Take

During the 2013-14 school year, the Bethpage School District launched a Chromebook initiative at JFK Middle School to enhance students' educational experience with the inclusion of this technology.

Over the course of four years, Chromebook distribution has expanded to all students in grades 3-12. In addition, students in grades K-2 have access to Chromebooks in their schools' computer labs and libraries and use them in the classroom from time to time. Third-

through fifth-graders have their own Chromebooks that remain in the classroom for everyday use, and those in grades 6-12 are given laptops that they can use both in school and at home.

The Chromebooks are furnished with G Suite for Education, a web-based learning management tool that allows teachers to provide seamless instruction with a variety of applications. These include Google Classroom, Docs (word processing), Sheets (spreadsheets), Slides (presentations) and email, as well as a



plethora of other educational tools for achieving mastery of major subject areas such as STEM, world languages and geography.

"The integration of Chromebooks into the curriculum allows us to bring the world closer together because of the information, connectivity and communication that is readily accessible to us," said David Schneider, assistant superintendent for instruction and technology. "The addition of this technology to the classroom equips our students with the four C's of 21st-century learning - communication, collaboration, creativity and critical thinking - which are skills needed to solve current and future world issues."

With Chromebook implementation now in full swing, educators and students alike are using the devices to their fullest potential.

At Charles Campagne Elementary School, fifth-graders in Cheryl Kelly's class are using G Suite's "Periodic Table" app to learn about the elements in depth, from their atomic number and electron configuration to their chemical properties and everyday use. The app provides a credible source for research and study, and Google Classroom allows Mrs. Kelly to view student progress in real time.

"I really enjoy using Google Classroom because of its versatility," Mrs. Kelly said. "One of the major benefits is that it allows me to see when students have completed an assignment."

Mrs. Kelly also uses the online service to make announcements about upcoming assignments, tests and projects, and utilizes its variety of resources for other subjects such as English, geography and math.

Starting in the sixth grade, students begin to bring their Chromebooks home with them. During sixth-grade orientation, parents and students are invited to learn about the technology from educators and honor society students,

and they gather in small groups to review the laptop's tools and programs.

As one example of Chromebook use at the middle school, eighth-graders had to research Native American tribes to learn about their origins, cultures and customs. Over the course of five weeks, the students used their Chromebooks to conduct extensive research and create presentations with Google Slides. A key benefit to this app is that students can work virtually on a presentation, and multiple users can access the project to make edits and upload images and text to it, which the other users can see. This multi-user accessibility allowed students to work on the presentation in a collaborative fashion, yet at the convenience of their own schedules.

"One of the biggest factors in selecting a Google-based laptop was the ability for students to work remotely, anywhere," explained Mr. Schneider. "Multiple students can access the same document and see who is making changes to the project. Groups can meet virtually and still collaborate effectively to complete assignments."

It is because of this accessibility and collaborative environment that teacher Danielle Molé has the juniors and seniors in her Virtual Enterprise class use the Chromebooks on a regular basis. The VE class mimics the operations of a real business, complete with accounting, marketing, human resource and web departments. The company is entirely student-run, with Ms. Molé acting as consultant. In addition to managing its daily operations on a multi-departmental level, the students also evaluate employee growth and receive a virtual salary that can be spent on products and services offered by other schools' VE firms, both local and international.

To remain organized and ensure business runs smoothly, the VE students use a variety of G Suite apps to document inventory, track sales, generate invoices, pay bills and manage payroll. They also use G Suite to create presentations to pitch




their product, design advertisements and communicate with one another outside of school. The ability to edit and work simultaneously helps alleviate the weighty task of writing a 25-page business plan by having firm members access the document, make changes, leave suggestions and offer positive feedback.

"I personally like using the Chromebooks," said BHS senior Lorenzo Martinez. "From last year, I learned that when we share our projects on Google

Classroom, we can leave suggestions for improvement. Instead of waiting for feedback, we can help our classmates through peer editing."

With the integration of Chromebooks, the district is proving itself to be a leader in classroom technology innovation. Bethpage students are expanding their 21st-century skill sets and attaining a higher understanding of subject matter by having accessibility, interconnectivity and a multitude of resources at their fingertips.



Outstanding Accolades for Eagles

National Merit Commended Student

Bethpage High School senior Smiti Shah has been named a Commended Student in the 63rd annual National Merit Scholarship Program.

Approximately 34,000 students across the country were recognized for their outstanding academic performance with this designation. Smiti placed among the top 5 percent of 1.6 million students who entered the competition by completing the 2016 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test.

Smiti is an AP Scholar with Distinction and captain of the robotics team, which for the first time in more than 10 years competed in the national-level FIRST Robotics Competition after winning top prize at the regional contest. She also conducted research on water filtration and nanotechnology at Hofstra University with Dr. Roche DeGuzman and is a member of the National and Spanish honor societies. She interned last summer at the New York Academy of Sciences and is currently president of its Junior Academy, where she oversees more than 700 international students. While interning, she was invited to the Gates Notes event, where she spoke with Bill Gates, Melinda Gates and author John Green.

In addition, Smiti was recently invited to speak at the World Summit on Innovation and Entrepreneurship to Fortune 500 leaders in the field of artificial intelligence and machine learning about the generational divide between conversations regarding humans and machines.

The district congratulates Smiti on her distinguished academic performance and wishes her continued success in her senior year.



Golden Eagles Soar at HOMECOMING
