in Atlanta, where he met the other scholarship winners.

Although he is keeping his options open, he may major in either chemistry or cybersecurity. Daniel decided to attend the Naval

Academy after attending their Summer Seminar last year. "I like working out and I like service," he said of the decision. "And I like being around motivated, like-minded individuals who are looking to pursue a naval career."

He has also been named an AP Scholar with Distinction and is captain of the track and field, cross-country and marine fitness teams. Last year, Daniel was ranked #6 in the nation for marine fitness.



The district is proud to announce its high rankings that were included in the 2017 listing on Niche.com. Not only was Charles Campagne ranked No. 98 in New York with an overall A+ rating for public elementary schools, but JFK Middle School ranked No. 43 and Bethpage High School ranked No. 74 in the list of Best Public High Schools.


The 2017 Best Public High Schools ranking is based on rigorous analysis of key statistics and millions of reviews from students and parents using data from the

U.S. Department of Education. Ranking factors include state test scores, college readiness, graduation rates, SAT/ACT scores, teacher quality and high school ratings.

In addition, among the more than 8,000 school districts Niche.com ranks each year, the district as a whole ranked No. 48 in the entire state. Bethpage was ranked at No. 8 of 582 school districts for safety and No. 38 as one of the best places to teach in New York. "These distinctions reflect the work of our



entire school community- students, parents, teachers, staff and Board of Education," said Superintendent of Schools Terrence Clark. "We are proud of the high quality education provided in Bethpage and appreciate that independent organizations like this recognize that our schools are great places for kids."



Under the guidance of District Director of English Language Arts and Reading Dr. Mary Hannon, grade K-2 teachers have been putting a stronger emphasis on students' writing skills. Based on teacher feedback of the need for more consistency across grade levels, a team of teachers spent last summer researching and creating a new writing curriculum.

To assist with the task, the district recruited Sarah Cordova, a writer's workshop consultant whose focus is training teachers in a specific protocol for the teaching of the writing process. Sarah met often with the teachers, demonstrated lessons, and incorporated teachers' own curriculum ideas within the writer's workshop framework.

The new curriculum focuses on the process of writing for the various forms – narrative, opinion and informational - and celebrates a finished, published work. The process is based on the

writer's workshop that came out of the Teachers College of Columbia University, but has been adapted to meet the specific needs of Bethpage students. It is designed to provide a seamless alignment in vocabulary and process across all schools, and eventually grade levels.

"This really shifted our focus from giving students a 'prompt' by which to write, to giving them a process," said Dr. Hannon, "The more students understand the process of writing, the more they will internalize it and become better writers across all areas."

The teachers are using Google drive to house all of the student work through the stages, which enables it to be viewed and shared by others for feedback.

This summer, grade 3-5 teachers will be creating curriculum for the continued implementation of the program to be K-5 next year and into the middle school in the future.

"We are being very thoughtful about its implementation," said Dr. Hannon. "The Board has been incredibly supportive, and teachers have embraced the initiative, bringing impressive creativity and collaboration to every stage of the process."





THE STATE FAIR

Second-grade students at CBS hosted the annual State Fair performance and project showcase. For the project, students research a state at home and create a presentation board with interesting facts. Boards are then displayed in the gym for families to view. Although it is only the team's first year, they were one of 40 that qualified for the championships and won the Robot Design Award for Strategy and Innovation. The demonstration served to garner interest from students who may want to be part of the team next year.



TRIVIA CHALLENGE

Students at Kramer participated in the Cerebral Palsy of Nassau County's Trivia Challenge, an academic fundraising event that combines education, philanthropy and fun. In teams of four, participating students took a 100-question trivia written test, which covered a wide variety of subjects from academics to popular culture.

Students raised money for CPNassau by asking family members and friends to sponsor them to take the test. A team of Kramer Lane fourthgraders placed 6th and a team of fifth-graders placed 4th overall.



Kindergarten through eighth-graders in the district have the opportunity to participate in many enrichment programs over the summer. In addition to the Extended School Year program for those who need the consistency of a year-round school structure, the district houses several programs that are run via BOCES.

Approximately 600 students take advantage of the program, which operates one five-week session each summer. The fee for enrollment in the program is typically only a few dollars.

In addition to classes designed to assist students in preparing for the next grade level, the district offers many enrichment programs in art, music, theater, physical education, foreign language, geography and culture.
