JOHN F. KENNEDY MIDDLE SCHOOL: First School in Nation to Rename 50 Years Ago

Formerly the Bethpage School, John F. Kennedy Middle School was the first school in the nation to be renamed after the former president, just four days after his assassination. Tied as the first with JFK Elementary School in Butte, Mont., JFK Middle School held remembrance events and a ceremony on Nov. 22 to mark the 50th anniversary of Kennedy's death. The school assembled a museum in Kennedy's honor, hosted a ceremony that included a video conference with the school in Montana, and created and wore T-shirts in memory of the 35th president.

The six-week project leading up to Nov. 22 was made possible through the use of the students' Google Chromebooks. Each class was assigned a specific area of study on Kennedy and was asked to research that subject and time. The material was garnered with the assistance of the Chromebooks and displayed patriotically on poster boards in the gymnasium. Also on display were relics

and artifacts from the time period, including newspapers, plaques and documents, borrowed from venues such as the Bethpage Public Library and the Central Park Historical Society.

"I believe it's very important to learn about our history and who helped make our country what it is now," said sixth-grader Bryan Hanley. "JFK really helped our nation during hard times. It was very sad that he was assassinated, and it's really important that we honor this day. His legacy will live forever."

A ceremony concluding the daylong event featured performances from the sixth-grade orchestra, the Eagles' Voice chorus and the eighth-grade band, as well as the presentation of essay contest winners who answered the question, "How is President John F. Kennedy's legacy still alive at JFK Middle School today?" Contest winners were eighth-grader Nicole El Chami, seventh-grader Sean Brass, and sixth-grader Patrick Kerrigan, with an

honorable mention for Adam Hadhoud. District administrators, Board of Education members and local dignitaries were also on hand for the

"We are proud of our heritage and history, and proud to pick up the torch that President Kennedy left for us and the rest of the world," said Principal Kevin Fullerton in his address. "It is a wonderful tribute that our school bears his name and honors his legacy each day."

Ron Ricketts, principal of JFK Elementary School in Montana, personally joined Bethpage for its ceremony and presented the school with a special plaque, whose replica will hang at his school in Butte. "The students at JFK Elementary and you here at JFK Middle School are not much different from each other," he said. "In being here today, I want to tie our schools together with the understanding that we will all live out the dream that JFK had for us...from New York to Montana and beyond, the death of John F. Kennedy affected the entire world. Yet today, 50 years later, we are here as proof that his legacy continues."

A Message from • the Superintendent

Dear Residents,

My last message focused on the many changes occurring in education, with Common Core, state assessments and teacher evaluations all taking place in a short window of time and creating anxiety for students, parents, teachers and administrators.

One of the things on which we pride ourselves here in Bethpage is our concern with all aspects of a child's well-being; the social, emotional, physical and academic aspects are all important to us as educators and as a community. Our academic statistics are well-known and often publicized. Our students, K-12, demonstrate outstanding performance by all academic measures – state assessments, formative assessments and, most importantly, the percentage going to college and the high caliber of the schools accepting Bethpage students.

I want to share with you a new initiative we are undertaking with several community groups, one that centers on the health and wellness of our children. In collaboration with the PTA, Bethpage Educational Foundation, Bethpage Public Library and others, students and staff are formulating plans for a wellness project that will be centered on a calendar of activities to make students, parents and community members more conscious of health and nutrition. Students from all five of our schools have been meeting and will soon be unveiling their plans.

The impetus for this initiative is well-documented, as we have all read about the rise in childhood obesity and juvenile diabetes. In a reversal of the past 50 years, the bigger problem today is not malnourishment, but overeating. And when our committee of students met to discuss the issues, they volunteered that they spend far too much time playing video games or absorbed by the apps on their phones.

The general plan for this initiative is to have free, open sessions where students, parents and community members can come together to try new activities and have fun getting healthy. One name proposed by the students for the program is "Fun and Fit." A calendar of events, sponsored locally by schools or private enterprises, would be published, and people could elect to attend open classes in Zumba, Pilates, yoga, basketball, swimming, martial arts, and healthy cooking and nutrition, among many others. We envision an evening where the entire community comes out to walk the track, or one where a community Zumba class takes place on the front lawn of Bethpage High School. It has been fascinating to see the students putting this plan together.





In early January, Ms. Tollen visited with art classes at the school for a week to help students create the piece depicting an eagle carrying a blue ribbon. All students in kindergarten through fifth grade helped with the project, and all staff members had a chance to lay a few pieces as well. Following her week with the students, Ms. Tollen returned to her studio to fire and grout the ceramic tiles together. The sign was hung in the main lobby of the school in the end of January.

Getting Creative with Character Ed

Students at Charles Campagne will be assisting in a portion of the school's character education program this year by helping to create signs for the hallways. In February, each hallway in the school will be named after a positive character trait, including Courage Court, Respect Drive, Responsibility Road, Perseverance Place, Compassion Circle and Honesty Highway.

All students in grades K-5 helped with

the project. Following her week with the students, Ms. Tollen returned to her studio to fire the ceramic tiles into one piece. She will work with her metalsmith to attach the signs to metal before they are hung throughout the school.

Completed signs will be unveiled in February as part of the districtwide Anti-Bullying Week festivities.



6 Author's Celebration

Reading specialist Sandi Saltzman has been working hard to develop readers and writers at Charles Campagne Elementary School. As part of a collaboration with the first-grade teachers, first-graders were asked to become experts in a specific skill and then explain to others how to perform that skill. Using steps to guide their audience, the authors wrote detailed steps on how to replicate their specific skill, including a list of items needed and the reasons the skill is important. Students put their thoughts together in a book format, complete with illustrations to guide the reader through each step.

After the books were bound, the first-grade classes came together in a special Author's Celebration to share their creations. The event offered an opportunity for the authors to share their books and skills with their peers, and for their peers to perhaps learn some new skills.

"We want you to know how very proud we are of all your hard work," Mrs. Saltzman told the students. "You are all now accomplished authors and illustrators."

Some of the skills included: how to make a peanut butter and jelly sandwich, how to make a snowman, how to use a camera, how to fish, how to sit like a five-star listener, and how to make a Rainbow Loom bracelet.

At the conclusion of the Author's Celebration, students shared what they learned through the process in front of the group.





Project Astro

The **Project** program, facilitated by the Cradle of Aviation Museum, matches teachers with local astronomers from the Amateur Observers' Society Long Island to help astronomy bring the classroom. Bethpage is lucky enough to have several teachers at the high



school, middle school and Central Boulevard School who volunteered to train and collaborate on lesson plans for the program, which is being incorporated into the school day, as well as part of an after-school 21st Century program or Astronomy Club lesson.

Fifth-grade students in Erika Lemaire's and Tim Regan's classes at Central Boulevard were among the first to have an astronomy session in November. The session was co-taught by Jean Wilkstrom from the Amateur Observers' Society of Long Island, and together students completed a short, interactive quiz and researched the names and specifics of stars within various constellations. Each participating class will have a total of three sessions, including one where they will be able to handle meteorites.

Other participating teachers include Elizabeth Raia and Chris Pollatos, who are the advisers to the Astronomy Club at the high school, and Gabriella Siminerio and Susan Sciglibaglio, who teach eighth grade at JFK.



Academically, she is a Commended Student, an AP Scholar with Distinction and a member of the National Honor Society.

Both students were chosen as News 12 Scholar-Athlete Award recipients for their outstanding dedication and achievement in both sports and academics. They were considered for the award after being nominated by their coaches, submitting an application and essay, and being chosen from a long list of applicants from across Long Island.
