> BETWPAGE SEMIFINALIST

Bethpage High School senior Harshil Garg has been named a semifinalist in the National Merit Scholarship Program for 2015. His score of 233 (out of 240) is among the highest of scores that the Bethpage School District has ever had. In addition to this latest recognition, Harshil was named to the top 50 in the Nassau County Interscholastic Math League and has worked at Sloan Kettering, Stony Brook and the Cold Spring Harbor cancer research centers. He also plays the violin and is a member of the school's Mathletes and robotics teams.

Semifinalists represent the top one-third, or about 16,000, of approximately 50,000 high scorers who took the PSAT/NMSQT, which has a total of 1.5 million entrants, according to the National Merit Scholarship Program. Students are ranked with a selection index score based on their combined scores in critical reading, writing and math. Semifinalists can compete to be named a finalist and continue in the process to receive corporate and college-sponsored scholarships, as well as the esteemed National Merit Scholarship. Those advancing to the finalist stage will be notified in February of their standing.

The Bethpage School District congratulates Harshil on this impressive achievement and wishes his continued academic success in the future.

Exemplary ASSESS

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Third through eighth-graders across New York State took assessment exams in the spring. Scores for these exams were released in early September. Bethpage was among the highest performing districts in the county and the state on these exams this year.

- Third-grade students were No. 1 in Nassau County on the ELA exam scores.
- Fourth-grade students were No. 2 in Nassau County on the ELA exam scores.
- Sixth- and eighth-grade students averaged No. 6 overall in Nassau County on the ELA exam scores.
- For grades 3-8, Bethpage students were in the top 15 of the county on all 12 exams for both ELA and math scores.
- All five Bethpage schools are categorized as "in good standing" by the New York State Education Department – in fact, Bethpage High School was recognized as a "High Performing School."

The State Education Department was so impressed with the district's results that administration was asked to conference with them to explain how our district has outperformed so many others. Here are some of the reasons Superintendent Terrence Clark shared with them:

- Teachers stressing literacy in all disciplines
- Personalization of instruction through data analysis and technology

"We have so much to be proud of this year. Student performance on the state assessments was phenomenal and that is testament to the education they get day in and day out from their classroom teachers and administrators. The students worked hard and the parents supported us in every way," said Mr. Clark. "We are in a great place as a district- academically very strong, fiscally solid and technologically advanced...And while we have great scores, I always say it is about so much more which is why we have so much support for the fine and performing arts, athletics, extracurriculars and programs like the 21st Century Scholars."

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Bethpage High School has been ranked No. 385 out of the 26,000 high schools in America. A designation by Newsweek magazine, schools are distinguished based on college readiness and graduation rate. Bethpage High School has also been named a Reward School.



Historically SIGNED

Formerly the Bethpage School, John F. Kennedy Middle School was the first school in the nation to be renamed after the former president, just four days after his assassination. Tied as the first with JFK Elementary School in Butte, Mont., JFK Middle School held remembrance events and a ceremony on Nov. 22, 2013 to mark the 50th anniversary of Kennedy's death. This fall, Principal Kevin Fullerton held another, smaller ceremony to commemorate the official designation of the school as a historical site.

"I've been here for 30 years and it was one of the great days in history for Bethpage schools," Superintendent Terrence Clark recalled of the remembrance ceremony last year. "The historical society was so instrumental that day and we wanted to memorialize it."

The actual historical marker was unveiled in a quaint ceremony on Oct. 8, on the grass surrounding the new sign and included several student performances. Lenny Mulqueen, president of the Bethpage Historical Society, was on site to pull the cover off of the official sign.

"[The Bethpage Historical Society] has these markers up around Bethpage," Mr. Clark said. "It's important for us and our community to know where we came from."





ROCKET Science

Each year, as part of the seventh-grade technology curriculum, students launch a rocket that they build themselves in the prior weeks. The task asks students to apply Newton's third law of motion and build an aerodynamic rocket by reading plans, utilizing shop equipment and



applying what they know about flight. Once the rockets are launched, the students are

asked to calculate their speed and height.

"I liked this project," student Joseph Foley said. "It's so much better than learning from a textbook."

Teachers Pete Michels and Dave Wettengel said the students have been doing this project in tech class since 1990. In the past, students paid for the engine that served as the source of power for the rocket (since rockets can't fly), but this year the Bethpage Educational Foundation offered to pick up the tab on not only the rockets, but the engines as well. The donation totaled \$3,500.

Tickle Your Senses

Ball pits, a swing and bean bags...oh my! New this year, Charles Campagne Elementary School launched the use of a sensory gym for students in the Applied Behavior Analysis program. Previously housed at CBS, the program provides support for approximately 13 district students in grades K-5. The sensory gym helps students hone their gross, sensory and fine motor skills in a stimulating and safe environment. The room contains fully cushioned walls and floors with a variety of tactile items, surface types and colors, as well as calming music and dim lighting.

Marvullo said. "It helps them focus at certain times and keeps them moving."

Sensory items were always used with students in the program, but it was done in the classroom setting where it was not always as calm, and the classroom could not house the larger equipment that the gym can hold. The gym also houses a room for occupational therapy and physical therapy students' needs. The sensory gym is a trial this year, with students' responses and needs assessed on a regular basis.



AP SCHOLARS

The College Board has recognized 116 current and former Bethpage High School students as AP Scholars due to their outstanding success on Advanced Placement exams. Approximately 338 students took 728 AP exams in May 2014 after completing challenging, college-level courses in the district in a variety of subjects. In total, Bethpage had 50 AP Scholars, 24 AP Scholars with Honor, 42 AP Scholars with Distinction and seven National AP Scholars; this represents approximately one-third of the total student population who took AP exams receiving commendation.
