This past summer, construction took place across the district as more capital improvement bond projects were completed. Aside from installing smartboards in each of our elementary schools to enhance classroom learning, our crews were hard at work on several big projects at John F. Kennedy Middle School.


The middle school's gymnasium floor was replaced, and the library media center was fully renovated. Students returned to school to find the library transformed with different flexible seating options, new tables and flooring, ample storage, bookcases filled with different genres of literature and a full makerspace which was previously one of the school's computer labs. The makerspace will serve as a dedicated area for arts and crafts, STEM activities, board games and more. The circulation desk was also relocated to face the library media center's entrance.

Outside of the middle school, construction for the much-anticipated new athletic facility took place. The John F. Kennedy Middle School Athletic Complex features a new six-lane running track and synthetic turf field. A larger parking lot, new and reconstructed basketball courts and a new comfort station building will be completed in the near future. The baseball and softball fields were also relocated and reconstructed. We look forward to having our current and future Bethpage Eagles utilize the new complex.





Elementary Students Get ROOTED IN ROBOTICS



Fourth and fifth grade students from Central Boulevard School, Charles Campagne School and Kramer Lane School have been invited to participate in the FIRST Lego League, a global robotics program that is geared towards students in grades 4-8.

There are two robotics teams, one for fourth graders and one for fifth graders, at each of the elementary schools. Although the program is new to the district, students are already jumping in by researching, problem-solving and

coding to program a Lego robot. The program also follows real-life situations which students are challenged to solve through STEM. One teacher from each school serves as that school's robotics adviser and is there to support the students as they follow the highly engaging STEM program.

"With the success of our robotics teams at John F. Kennedy Middle School (JFK RoboEagles) and six-time world championship participants at Bethpage High School (Regal Eagles), we felt the time was right to start an after-school robotics program at our elementary schools in grades 4-5," Director of Technology Andrew Choi said.

"We want to provide students the opportunity to learn the competencies that will make them successful for robotics at the next level, but also to hone their communication skills, critical thinking, logic, problemsolving and sequencing – all skills that will serve our students well outside of robotics."

The sky is the limit for our young students, and we cannot wait to see all that they achieve during their first year in the FIRST Lego League.

CULTURES CONNECT THROUGH SCHOOL CLUBS
