Does your child feel heard?

If you asked your child, don't be surprised if they say "no." As adults we are always so busy that it is easy to overlook what may seem like trivial details of our child's everyday life. However, just as the simple quote states not giving enough listening time to your child can cost you the opportunity to develop an open trusting relationship with your child.

Here are some simple tips for listening so your child will feel heard.

- Ask for their opinion
- Ask for more details
- If they are sharing about a problem, don't try to solve it for them.
- Look at them when they're talking to you
- Give them one-on-one time
- Model the type of listener you'd like them to be
- Thank them for sharing with you
