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<u>Principal's Message</u> Immunization Questions

I have received several communications from parents recently connected to questions regarding our school district's policies related to student immunizations. It is my belief that these questions have been predicated by news reports related to legislation being proposed in Augusta to require that <u>all</u> students be required to receive a full slate of vaccinations before entering school or being allowed to attend school, with no exemptions or very limited exemptions. Currently the RSU #12 policy titled, "Immunization of Students" (Code: JLCB) is consistent with Maine statues in stating:

" All students who enroll in the school unit schools are required by Maine law to present a certificate of immunization or evidence of immunization or immunity against poliomyelitis, diphtheria, pertussis (whooping cough), tetanus, measles, mumps, rubella and varicella (chicken pox).

Non-immunized students shall not be permitted to attend school unless one of the following conditions are met:

- A. The parents/guardians provide to the school written assurance that the child will be immunized within 90 days of enrolling in school or his/her first attendance in classes, whatever date is earlier. This option is available only once to each student during their school career; or
- B. The parents/guardians provide a physician's written statement each year that immunization against one or more diseases may be medically inadvisable (as defined by law/regulation); or
- C. The parents/guardians state in writing each year that immunization is contrary to their sincere religious or philosophical beliefs.

The Superintendent shall exclude from school any non-immunized student when there is a clear danger to others as provided by law."

As you can see, our policy is very specific as to the expectations of parents in meeting the needs of the immunization of students law. With the proposed legislation, there would be even stricter regulations and the intent seems to be, again, that <u>all</u> students will be required to be immunized. It is important to recognize that this legislation will need to pass through a number of steps before it would even be brought before the Maine House and Senate for consideration so no one needs to overreact at this time. With that being said, it is important to recognize what is being proposed and how it might impact your family. I would also recommend that you share your viewpoint with our local elected representatives as they would need to be informed of your opinions before taking any legislative action.

Office: Please remember to send your child to school with a note if they are going to a different destination on the bus after school. It helps to avoid last minute phone calls to the school, which can make dismissal very chaotic. We appreciate the advance notice and thank you for not calling with these changes after 2:00 p.m.

Grades Pre K-1

Pre K: Thank you to all the families that participated in our classroom during read with me. This was the first week of Unit 4. We have read *Max's Dragons Shirt* and *Dog's Colorful Day*.
