- Students will complete applications online.

- All program applications will close December 17th. Students accepted into the program will be notified by the end of January. Students will be given 1 week to accept their spot into the designated program.
- Acceptance into any program will be contingent on the final outcomes of Second Semester.
- Transportation is provided to all programs.
- Students accepted into Early College,
 Pre-Collegiate, or IB will become a student at
 the assigned school. If you leave the program
 during your high school tenure then you will
 return to your zoned school.

ABSS Early College at ACC



What exactly is ABEC?

ABEC is a high school located on ACC's campus.

Students are dual enrolled as an ABSS student and an ACC student.

Students take honors level courses during their freshman and sophomore year with ABEC staff.

During their junior and senior year students are enrolled in ACC classes tuition free to work towards earning an Associate degree.

The goal of ABEC is for students to graduate in 4 years with a high school diploma and an Associate degree.

Students will have the opportunity to meet once a semester or more with ABEC's college liaison (advisor) to ensure they are on track.

Books and transportation are provided.

What is PCA?

- Designed to meet the growing interest in students who want to earn college credits in high school
- Personalized course of study in freshman and sophomore years that provides more rigorous coursework through Honors and/or Advanced Placement core classes
- Create focused courses of study for heightened post secondary options
- Students will engage in college courses at ACC in junior and senior years of high school tuition free with books provided; transportation is also provided
- Students will engage in seminar work designed to promote success at the postsecondary level, along with community service opportunities
- Goal is to earn high school diploma and Associate's Degree simultaneously

What Does a PCA Student Look Like?

- Motivated
- Does not need to be AIG; but should do very well in school
- Enjoys traditional high school setting
- Wants the option to take fine arts classes
- Embraces new people
- College-bound



Community Service, Volunteering, Athletics, and Activities

- → Community Service and Volunteering/Job Shadowing
 - Students are provided the opportunity to volunteer within the community
 - Students have the opportunity to job shadow a particular career choice
 - PCA students are expected to represent their school and community
- → Athletics and Activities
 - PCA students become GHS students
 - If you play sports, you will play sports at GHS
 - If you are involved in activities, you will be in activities at GHS

What is IB?



- Internationally recognized curriculum
- Williams is one of 33 high schools in NC to offer this program
- It is a cohesive and comprehensive 2 year program beginning in 11th grade
- IB and AP receive the same grade weight
- The UNC system awards college credit for IB classes and the IB Diploma
- The Core of IB is
 - Community Service
 - Theory of Knowledge how do you know what you know?
 - Extended Essay Independent research in an area of interest

- Self-motivation
- Self- management/organizational skills
- A willingness to embrace new challenges
- Openness to, and tolerance of, different perspectives, beliefs and ideas
- Stress management skills
- Must be able to handle HONORS level work in all classes
- Should be able to go into Math 1 Honors (at a minimum)
- Does not have to be designated as AIG
- Does not have to have straight A's in middle school
- They can play sports and do extra-curricular activities in and outside of school

Differences Between IB and AP

- The educational objectives differ: AP courses tend to focus intensively on a particular subject, while IB aims to create a more well-rounded student who is equipped with some fundamental skills needed for university
- Students can earn college credit with either: Both IB and AP classes culminate in an exam, and depending on the score, students may be able to earn college credit.
