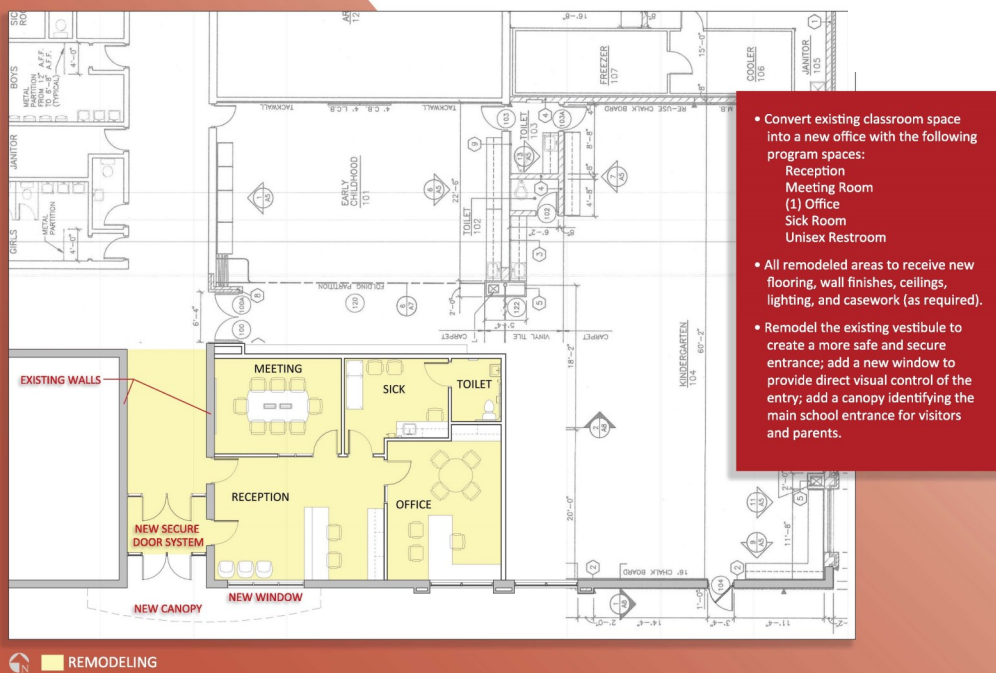
Initiative grant applications to the Wisconsin Department of Justice. The District received over \$60,000 in grant money. Among the safety improvements planned and/or completed include: increasing security camera coverage/resolution inside and outside of both schools, improved exterior safety lighting, installation of door sensors on all exterior doors at both schools, security film on main entrance door glass, District-wide Safety & Security assessment conducted by retired law enforcement professionals, staff professional development targeting school safety topics.

One of the most important

recommendations from the Safety and Security Assessment was to improve the level of security at the main entrances of both schools. The School Board and administration began the process of addressing this concern by having an architect produce concept drawings. The Board felt the better project to consider at this time was the elementary school plan. A public meeting was held on March 5, 2019, to review a draft proposal to address the main entrance at the elementary school. On March 11, 2019, the Greenwood School Board approved this plan. The plan will relocate the school office and create a secure receiving area for visitors. This project will provide the elementary school with a main

Clark County AODA and Mental Health Services

Clark County Community Services has entered into an agreement with the Greenwood School District to provide outpatient mental health services to students enrolled there. School branch services are located at the school for the benefit and convenience of the student and family. Referral for services originates from the parent/guardian or the school after informed consent is obtained from the parent/guardian. An intake appointment will be set up as soon as possible at the Community Services Courthouse location, where additional information is obtained, a financial assessment is completed, informed consent is obtained and a preliminary treatment plan is developed. Payment for services will be through insurance, medical assistance or uniform fee scale to be determined by income and family size. Clark County Community Services therapist, Gia Hepfler will come to our schools and offer professional counseling to students in the elementary and middle/high school buildings. The therapist comes to the school two days per week and will meet with their client/students at school. entrance that meets the recommendations of school safety professionals. The timeline for completion of the project is currently being developed. It is our hope that work can be completed ahead of the start of school in the fall.

While we may have many security measures in place to respond to a situation, it is far better if we can prevent one from happening in the first place. I ask all members of the Greenwood

Students are often the first to see signs of a threat and are encouraged to notify a trusted adult about those concerns. Parents, as you talk with your students about school safety, encourage them to report any time they see unsafe behavior or hear troubling comments, even if they think it might just be a prank or a joke. 4-YEAR OLD KINDERGARTEN NEWS

The 4-Year-Old Kindergarteners have been very busy. January was filled with many snow projects and lots of book reading. During the month of February, we focused on love and made different Valentine's Day crafts. We also took advantage of all of the snow and had a family sledding event at the high school. In March, we are focusing on Dr. Seuss, rhyming words and celebrating St. Patrick's Day. During April, we will discuss and explore spring and all of the wonderful changes it brings! We continue to share several special items from home using our "Alphabet Stew" bucket. Each child has a turn to take the bucket home and fill it with several items that start with a specific letter. This activity continues to be the highlight of our morning meeting time. The 4K students are continuing to practice their letters and numbers but have also moved onto identifying the letter sounds. Simple sight words have been introduced and we will be practicing them in the upcoming months. It continues to be a very exciting time in the 4K classroom as we observe, explore, and practice our skills to prepare us for kindergarten next year.

We are (finally) 100 days smarter! The students have learned so much in school so

far. Our reading skills have improved so significantly that we are more confident in reading leveled books. Practice helps us learn, so we make sure to read the same book a couple of times to improve our reading skills. We now know 69 sight words. Those words are also helping us to read and write. Speaking of writing, we learned how to write a personal narrative and how-to books. In math, we are working on number partners from 2-10, which helps us add and subtract. We can find 5 groups in numbers and ten groups in teen numbers. We have a lot to learn to get ready for 1st grade.

2ND GRADE NEWS

The second graders are learning new math concepts and skills. In the past month, they have learned how to regroup or carry 2-digit and 3-digit numbers in addition. They are becoming very skilled at it. Now they have a new challenge. During the past few weeks, the second graders have been learning how to ungroup (borrow) in subtraction. They started out with the tough job of subtracting numbers from 200. YIKES!! Then from 100. Finally they worked on subtracting 2-digit number from 2-digit numbers. The second graders have been working vigorously and they are starting to make ungrouping (borrowing) look easy.

During our Writing Workshop, the second graders have been writing nonfiction books. They have written how-to books, nonfiction chapter books, question-and-

answer books, and stories that teach. The students have found that they are experts on a lot of things and have been writing about it. They have written interesting stories about cheetahs, how to make pancakes, how to make a chocolate shake, how to do wrestling moves, books about video games, trucks, snakes, and more.

The second graders have been reading a variety of genres. Of course they like to read realistic fiction and graphic novels. They also really enjoy nonfiction books about animals and sharing fun facts with each other. They also like reading biographies about people, authors, baseball players, and presidents they know.

4TH GRADE NEWS

It is hard to believe we are almost finished with the third quarter of 4th grade! We are working hard to improve our reading comprehension this year and are learning different strategies to help us understand what we have read. Most recently, we have been working on predicting and inferring, visualization and finding the theme. Our grammar is improving while we learn about comparative adjectives, prefixes and suffixes, and using quotation marks. Our writing is focused on writing opinion essays - five whole paragraphs! In Math, we have been working with fractions and how they relate to decimal numbers and will spend the rest of the year on our geometry unit. In Science, we are just finishing up our ecosystems unit. When we finish our Social Studies unit on how Wisconsin became a state, we will be taking a field trip to the capitol building in Madison!

idea and key details, strategies for understanding technical vocabulary, and identifying the text structure of written texts. We know all of these tools help us comprehend grade level texts in a better way! In Math, we have spent many weeks working with strategies for multiplying and dividing whole numbers, decimals, and fractions. Having good number sense has helped us understand when our products and quotients make sense. In preparation for literacy night in February, we studied examples of argumentative essays, looking at how authors craft thesis statements and supporting reasons, and then how they back up those reasons with evidence. We used our nonfiction reading skills to study articles looking for evidence to support our claims. We even learned how to quote from experts as we researched and wrote our opinion position papers about whether chocolate milk should be served in schools. Finally, our content area focus was the universe. We learned a lot about gravity, inertia, and the phases of the moon. A trip to Starlab completed the moon study and sent us researching constellations for our literacy night informational writing. We learned a lot about what lies beyond our planet. We have grown so much as learners and are looking forward to where the final quarter of 5th grade takes us!

6TH GRADE NEWS

MR. SCOTT MOSELEY

The sixth graders have been very busy during the third quarter writing five paragraph essays in Language Arts class. The first essay focused on writing persuasive speeches on a topic of choice. The students presented their essays to the entire class. They learned the importance of eye contact, speaking clearly, and presenting with enthusiasm. The second five paragraph essay concentrated on organization and using a thesis statement and topic sentences. The students were also required to use transition words and three details in each paragraph. In Math class the students finished a unit on ratios and percents and learned how to figure out tip amounts when eating at a restaurant. In Science class, the sixth graders studied invertebrates and learned how scientists categorize or group invertebrates into different families based on their characteristics. In Social Studies, the students finished a unit on Ancient Egypt and learned about their culture including the monuments and how the Egyptians cared for the dead. The students discussed the importance on not judging other cultures because they are different than ours.

The Marshfield Area Chamber of Commerce & Industry kicked off their 2019 Crystal Apple Program in September, when area business leaders visited classrooms, invited students to fill out nominations, and distributed gifts of appreciation to every teacher in the participating school districts.

Partners in Educational Excellence and Workforce Development received 760 nominations this year for 310 different teachers. From these names, a ballot was created for teachers to vote on their top selections - a minimum of one teacher was selected to represent each school.

As the selection process moved forward, recommendations from school principals were provided and the Teachers of Distinction submitted a personal statement describing their educational philosophy. The written materials identified ways these teachers inspire and motivate students, their use of innovative projects or programs, as well as their involvement in the community and their pursuit of professional development.

The final step occurred at the end of February when the Teachers of

Distinction met with a selection panel comprised of leaders from area businesses who place a high value on an educated workforce. The final selection was based on expertise (professionalism, knowledge of subject matter); innovation (advanced classroom techniques, teaching methods); and leadership (student guidance and rapport, reputation among colleagues, community involvement).

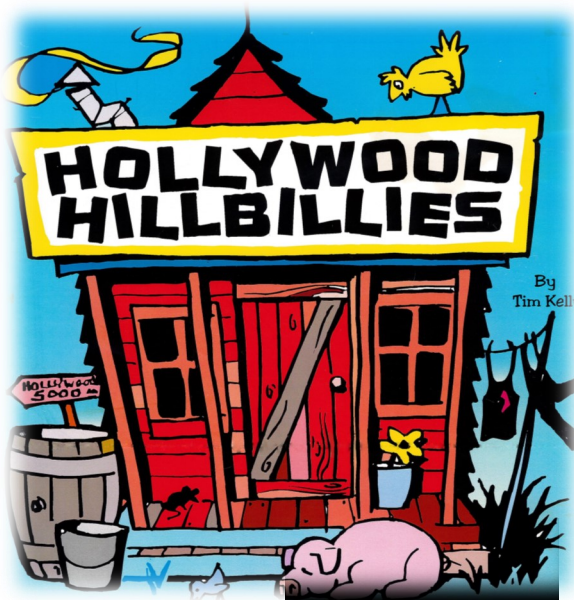

SCIENCE NEWS

We are looking forward to warmer temperatures so that we can get outdoors in the upcoming weather unit covered in the 8th grade Earth Science class. We will be discussing current events in weather like tornadoes, hurricanes, and cloud identification. 7th grade Life Science students have spent time learning about genetics, heredity, and the periodic table. They will use the knowledge base that they gained to learn about different phyla including insects, mollusks, and vertebrates. The students will be performing animal dissections on specimens such as earthworms and lizards. 11th and 12th grade Chemistry and Advanced Chemistry are learning about molecules and reactions. Chemistry class will cover five different reaction types that use combustion and heavy metals. Advanced Chemistry is covering the topic of pH chemistry where they will learn useful skills for college and career advancement.

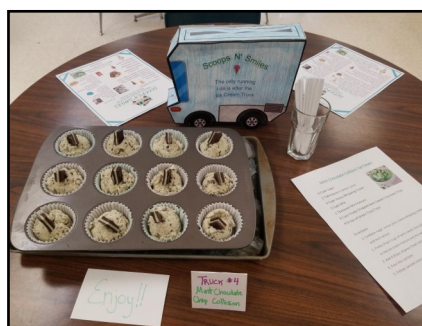
This will be offered during our July Summer School session. Details will become available to all families in the Summer School Packets that will be sent home in the coming weeks.

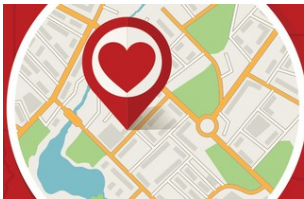
