- 3. Accreditation: We are fully accredited by the Arkansas Department of Education. The one citation we had of a special education teacher on an ALP (additional licensure plan) has been completed and all paperwork has been sent into the state department.
- 4. ACSCIP goals: Our educational goals are to increase student achievement in the areas of language arts and math.
- 5. We are a School wide Title I school with funding and personnel assisting every student.
- 6. All Kindergarten-3rd grade students receive progress reports and report cards with grades in language arts, math, and conduct; as well as each grade level's expected proficiency reading level and the student's performance reading level are listed.

- 7. Parental Involvement is wonderful for our Primary students. Agenda books and Nicky Folders serve as daily communications between teachers to parents. Each classroom teacher has various resources for other communication tools: Remind, Facebook, Email, and TAC. Our parents always attend any special event we have to support their children and our school.
- 8. We are very proud to have an active PTO (Parent Teacher Organization). They meet the second Tuesday of each month at 6 PM in the Primary Cafeteria. Their focus is to support our students and staff.
- 9. Our K-3 students are in a self-contained classroom meaning they are assigned to one classroom and one teacher that teaches all the curriculum and common core standards in language arts, math, science, and social students. Those students receive 40 minutes with a specialty teacher each day such as art, guidance counseling, library, music, and physical education. Other areas on a rotating schedule are: computer lab, TAG (talented and gifted), and keyboarding. Daily, we have the Pledge and announcements, SCRAP time (Students Concentrated on Reading at Primary), Interventions, migrant, ELL (English Language Learners), Moby Max, BrainPOP Jr., and Orchard Software with many more educational activities.
- 10. Our new Kindergarten 2^{nd} grade assessment will be with Renaissance. Those students will take computerized interim assessments throughout the school year. 3^{rd} grade students will take the ACT Aspire again this year.

Plan of Action to Increase Test Scores

- 1. Year 1 (3) and Year 2 (3) ELA teachers attending Literacy Lab training at Harding University.
- 2. We will continue to have grade level meetings in order to discuss strategies for meeting the needs of all students. We will implement specific procedures for remediation.
- 3. The 2:10 RTI class period will follow a specific structure that allows time to work with students on low areas and address areas that would normally not be covered before the spring test.
- 4. We have installed wireless printers on ELA laptop carts so that teachers can work with students on writing in a simulated testing environment.
- 5. Teachers have implemented Reading A-Z. It is a levelized reading program.
- 6. Fourth grade teachers have implemented the Reading Masters program by SRA.

New Projects

- Brand new computer lab both labs are less than two years old
- STAR Reader results will be sent home twice per year by law
- Dyslexia interventions will utilize the new "Sonday" program
- We are expanding the garden lab project and we are in the process of finishing our outdoor classroom in the garden bed area.

Handbook Changes

- Removed specific consequences for each gum chewing offense. Classroom teachers, according to their classroom rules, can address this.
- Under student dress and grooming, we added No caps or other items covering the head will be allowed in the building, unless approved by the principal or his designee.
