INTRODUCTION

THREE AND FIVE-YEAR PLANNING REQUIREMENTS

NDCC 15.1-07-26. School district demographics - Long-term planning process.

Between January first and June thirtieth of every even-numbered year, <u>NDCC 15.1-07-26</u> requires that the Board of each school district to invite the public to participate in a planning process that addresses the effects of demographics on the district for the next three and five years. The planning process must specifically address potential effects on: Academic and extracurricular programs; Instructional and administrative staffing; Facility needs and utilization; and District tax levies.





OUTCOME OF THREE AND FIVE-YEAR DEMOGRAPHIC PLANNING

Academic and extracurricular programs:

Student performance data is trending higher a few years of low scores. Administration feels this is greatly due to the interventions that have been put in place and due to adopting curriculum that is used more universally among the grade levels.

Instructional and administrative staffing:

Staffing has increased in the past few years, with several positions covered with federal funds, COVID funds, and other grants. Taking special note that additional funds being used are only available for a few years.

Facility needs and utilization:

With increased enrollment, facility needs at the elementary level are becoming very apparent. Board has requested preliminary numbers be gathered on the cost of replacing the building in Aber. While the Jr/Sr High noted sufficient room for the foreseeable future. The need for additional classrooms at the elementary school is due in part to more commonly splitting classes and needing additional space for intervention type instruction.

Enrollment trending up from a 37 year low in 2019 (244). The 37 year high was in 2005 with a K-12 enrollment of 342. Current projected enrollment for the 22-23 school year is 275.
