
Winter is here, and it brings ice, sleet, and snow. As we all navigate the roads, here are some items of interest at Western Reserve Local Schools.

Letter of Intent Not Just for Sports

Students in grades 7-12 are eligible to participate in the College Credit Plus program. This dual enrollment program allows students to earn high school credit while taking college courses. There are certain requirements, including attendance at an informational meeting and submitting a Letter of Intent to participate.

Western Reserve held their mandatory meeting on Wednesday, February 1. During this session, all aspects of the CCP program were discussed. Parents and scholars in attendance then determine if they wish to continue the application process. The admittance requirements vary from each college/university, so it is important, students follow that particular institution's guidelines.

Western Reserve does offer CCP courses at the high school. Regardless of where the student takes the courses, attending the informational meeting, submitting required forms, applying and being accepted are necessary components. An outcome of COVID is the offering of courses offered in an online format, but this may not be the best option for the student. These are all factors to consider. Meeting in a classroom, face-toface, causes challenges as well: transportation, scheduling with high school courses.

There are advantages to taking CCP courses, but it is not for everyone. It is recommended to consider prospective majors and look at the courses required to enroll in courses that will be of benefit and so credits transfer easily.

Most importantly, have discussions at home and with teachers and counselors to determine if CCP is the best option. Also, be sure to fill out your Letter of Intent whether you are taking courses on campus at WR or through a college/university. The document is due to the guidance office by April 1, 2023.

Sign Up for Youth Baseball



Students Represented at Scholastic Art Show

Congratulations to the six students who placed in the Lorain County region of the Scholastic Art Show exhibiting 12 artworks. This is a three-county art show where students from high schools within Huron, Erie and Lorain counties compete and exhibit their artwork.

Artwork was judged on originality, technical skill and the emergence of personal vision. Grade 7-8 students compete in one division with all categories mixed. Fossils are Clues of Earth's History



On Thursday, December 8, eighth grade students participated in an activity entitled "Giant Geologic Time Scale". This activity wrapped up a several day investigation of major events in Earth's history that scientists depict that have occurred in the Earth's past. Students to this point had been viewing the vast time representing Earth's history on a single sheet of paper or on a computer screen.

On this particular day, students viewed this time as a giant time scale that measured 25 meters (approximately 75 feet). Groups of students were given cards representing the various time periods and their task was to place the cards appropriately on the time scale. The students then viewed the cards placed

and started to discuss mistakes the class may have made. The groups then made corrections by rearranging the card placements appropriately.

The students were then asked about the evidence of life pertaining to fossil records that scientists indicate are clues to the long time when those organisms lived and certain extinction events. While participating in the activity, students were able to first hand construct a time scale and decipher a vast load of information in terms of long time and the divisions that have been made according to the clues of fossils and other key Earth structures.

This activity reinforced the concepts of abiotic and biotic factors that were discussed in class in note form.

Students began this concept of depicting time and appropriately placing major events on a timeline when they created two timelines: their major life events and that of a family member. Two photos show those timelines. That assignment was completed prior to the introduction of Earth's history and how scientists use the Geologic Time Scale to describe events of the Earth's past.

Mrs. Klimczak included a page with a blurb telling the organization the cards were created by WR students and then headed to the post office, mailed them second day mail to ensure they made it for the January 25 deadline. Klimczak stated, "We mailed over 150 cards to our overseas military members! Great job Western!!!"




Senior Chris Buchanan takes a jump shot against St. Paul in the second half of a varsity Firelands Conference basketball contest.
