### **ACES, SEL and Trauma Sensitive Schools**

There has been an increased focus on having a better understanding of the many complicated children we are seeing in schools now. The Adverse Childhood Experiences Study identifies a number of events that may impact students negatively. These adverse experiences are things such as divorce, having a family member die, incarceration of a parent, domestic violence, child abuse or neglect, frequent moves or homelessness. Teachers had the opportunity last spring to attend two presentations on ACES and found the information valid and helpful. This year I have attended three DOE conference days with presenter Cassie Yackley on Trauma Sensitive Schools. She is a gifted speaker and is very knowledgeable and passionate. She has worked extensively with schools in New Hampshire and has started coordinating with the DOE in Maine. She shared a lot of information about how to manage and help these ACEs kids in our schools. Our workshop day last Friday afforded all staff the opportunity to hear Heather Forbes, author of Help For Billy, speak about "A Beyond Consequences Approach to Helping Children in the Classroom" at Bangor High School. She was terrific and provided a lot of insight into the book, which staff has been reading throughout the district. A break out session earlier that day on Social Emotional Learning was very helpful in thinking about a schoolwide approach to all of this. It specifically involves directly teaching the SEL language to empower children to understand and deal with situations that arise. The information that was shared would pull together many things that we have happening already into a more cohesive whole. It also provided resources for more information and for fun books and games with which to approach this learning. This attention to the complicated lives from which some of our children come, is eye opening and compelling. Each of us has the capacity to positively impact all children that are in our care for a good part of every day!

## **AES Parent Group**

Alton Elementary School parents are renewing efforts to raise funds to update the equipment on the playground. They have a plan for each month coming up!
