## Curriculum, Instruction, and Assessment Highlights

- Most of our state "testing season" concluded at the April student vacation week. Our staff did a great job as always; I know staff worked very hard this year to help students engage with their assessments, which should help us see accurate scores. Throughout the winter and spring these assessments included the WIDA/ACCESS, eMPowerME, school-day SAT, the high school science augmentation, and specialized testing for some students with IEPs. Underway in the near future are the final staterequired assessments: 5<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> grade MEA-Science, and the makeup day for school-day SAT.
- One of the larger behind-the-scenes reports required on alternating years is underway between my office, the Central Office, and school offices. The federal government estimates this report takes 14.2 hours per school plus an additional 4.2 hours for the district-wide elements (total: 75.2 hours). On April 11<sup>th</sup> I had the opportunity to visit Ms. Bedard's 8<sup>th</sup> grade class to • work with the students on our student-led microlending initiative. Some years ago we raised funds so students could make loans through Kiva.org. After an introduction (link) teams of students dug into profiles of those seeking loans, and chose a recipient. Before we made the loans, each team made a "pitch" to their class regarding why they chose the recipient, how the loan would be used to further a business, and what region of the world would be impacted. It's amazing what we got done in an



hour, and a great way to teach about business, geography, and more!
