COVID-19 Vaccination	CDC, OHA, and ODE recommend COVID-19 vaccination for all eligible individuals. Symptom Screening	The district provides communication with families and staff regularly about information of communicable disease symptoms, including COVID-19. If symptoms are present families are asked to keep their student home.
COVID-19 Testing	OHA offers both diagnostic and screening testing programs to all public and private K-12 schools in Oregon. The District will be conducting testing of symptomatic students or staff upon request with a signed consent form on file. Students or staff displaying symptoms will be isolated, sent home and advised to consult with their medical professional. Airflow and Circulation	The district complies with all state, federal and manufacturer guidelines for upkeep and maintenance of HVAC systems. Filters meet or exceed current standards.
Cohorting	76 elementary students will maintain cohorts whenever possible. 81 secondary students will not be in stable cohorts, but interactions between grades is limited.
Physical Distancing	At least 3 feet of space or more will separate students and staff. Helix has 29 staff and 157 students.
	Students will be encouraged to wash hands before and after each meal, after using the restroom and recess. Signage will be used to remind students and staff of the importance of good hygiene. Hand sanitizer will be

Isolation	Staff are trained in isolation room protocols, quarantine protocols, and wearing of PPE. Isolation is used when necessary as per the communicable disease plan.
Symptom Screening	When case counts are high, the district will continue communication to families and staff regarding the importance of at-home symptom screening and staying home when sick to lower the risk of spreading infectious disease.
COVID-19 Testing	The District will be conducting testing of symptomatic students or staff upon request with a signed consent form on file. Students or staff displaying symptoms will be isolated, sent home and advised to consult with their medical professional. At this time, the district is not offering screening but will direct requests to local options.
Airflow and Circulation	During times of high case count, the classroom MERV 13 air filters will be left on 24 hours per day instead of only during school hours.
Cohorting ²	Schools should notify their LPHA about unusual respiratory disease activity if the following absence thresholds are met and at least some students are known to have influenza or COVID-like symptoms: 1. At the school level: ≥ 30% absenteeism, with at least 10 students and staff absent 2. At the cohort level: ≥ 20% absenteeism, with at least 3 students and staff absent During times of high case count, additional spacing and classroom seating chart monitoring will be utilized to minimize cross-cohort contamination.
Physical Distancing	During periods of high transmission the district will encourage students and staff to maintain at least 3 feet to the greatest extent possible.

² Cohorting refers to establishing a consistent group of students that stay together for a significant portion of the school day. Examples include stable mealtime cohorts, classrooms, table groups, lunch bunches, and other group situations. Cohorts should be as small as feasible to minimize exposure.

Training and Public Health Education	The school will establish plans in collaboration with Local Public Health Authorities (LPHA) for communicating health and safety protocols to students, families and to our communities within the district.
