Breast cancer: two words no one wants to hear. But 1 in 8 women develop breast cancer by age 85. It's important to talk to your doctor about your personal risk and screening recommendations.

If you receive a breast cancer diagnosis, Cleveland Clinic will assemble a care team for you. A unique treatment plan is created for each patient, to eliminate breast cancer and reduce the chance of it returning.

Diagnosed before age 50?

Breast cancer can be scary at any age. But for women age 50 and younger, there may be additional fears. Cleveland Clinic's Young Women's Breast Cancer Clinic addresses concerns like genetic risk factors and effects of treatment on overall health and quality of life for long-term survival.

"Worries about fertility can also trouble patients," says Alicia Fanning, MD, a breast specialist at Beachwood Family Health and Surgery Center. "When a woman of childbearing age is diagnosed, we collaborate with reproductive specialists to plan the best way to



preserve fertility for patients who wish to have a family."

Fertility disruptions can vary depending on the type of chemotherapy used and may be temporary. Unique treatment options may help preserve fertility, including:

- · Freezing eggs for future use.
- · In vitro fertilization.
- · Medications to protect ovaries.

"When patients are diagnosed early in life, it's our goal for them to have a long, fulfilling life," says Dr. Fanning.

It's generally recommended to wait two years after treatment completion to start family planning. Talk with your doctor about your personal situation.

PARKING BAN

No parking is permitted on City streets between the hours of 2 a.m. and 6 a.m. or if snowfall exceeds 2 inches.



Preparing for Winter



As you prepare for the upcoming Winter Season and the Holidays, the Lyndhurst Fire Department has some important notes about safety.



Before lighting your first fire in your fireplace or wood burning stove, ensure that it is properly maintained and cleaned. Keep other combustible material away from the fireplace or stove. Properly discard ashes in an approved metal container outside and away from any structure.



Holiday Decorations are great to admire. but they do come with inherent hazards. Any live decorations need to be watered and kept a safe distance from any open flames. Be cautious when using extension cords. Only use a UL approved cord in a safe manner and only for temporary power. Be sure not to overload the extension cord.



It's Carbon Monoxide season. Carbon Monoxide is a colorless, odorless and tasteless gas that is produced by fuel burning appliances. Currently, the Ohio Building Code states that you should have a Carbon Monoxide detector inside every bedroom as well as outside of the bedroom area, such as the hallway to your bedrooms.



Space Heaters. It is estimated that 25,000 fires and 300 deaths are caused by using space heaters every year in the United States. When using a space heater, look for one that has a tip over safety switch, a thermostat and some type of protective screen to help prevent burns. Keep combustible items away from the heater and turn the heater off when not in use.







Winter Do's and Don'ts

With winter looming on the horizon, here are some "Winter **Do's** and **Don'ts**" to help you stay safe and in compliance with the law:


- DO clear snow from sidewalks to keep them passable.
- **DO** keep fire hydrants clear of snow.
- **DO NOT** push snow onto your neighbor's property or into the street.
- **DO NOT** pile snow higher than three feet or closer than three feet to the curb so as not to obstruct the view of drivers or pedestrians – especially children – exiting driveways.
- **DO NOT** park on City streets when snow levels exceed two inches; snow ban automatically goes into effect when this happens.
- **DO** allow extra drive time when road conditions are poor.
- **DO** maintain a minimal safe distance and assured clear distance ahead so you can stop safely on slippery roads. Rear-end collisions are very common accidents, especially during the snowy winter months.
- **DO** enjoy the upcoming Holiday season!

Snow Plow Contractors

As winter approaches, many residents will be establishing agreements with private snow plow companies. Because your agreement is a civil matter, the Police Department is limited in how we can address problems that may arise. It has been our experience, based on complaints, that the least expensive companies do not always provide the best service, often because they take on too many

Only use reputable contractors who have good references. Your own neighbors who use a snow plow service may be the best resource. Additionally, you can call the Lyndhurst Police Department Traffic Bureau at 440.473.5116 to confirm that your contractor has a cityissued permit. Your responsibilities include making sure that your snow plow contractor does not block sidewalks with snow, pile snow higher than three feet or closer than ten feet to the curb, or push snow onto your neighbor's property or into the street.

Schools & Education





he South Euclid Lyndhurst Schools continues to share the high-level accomplishments of students and staff throughout our district, along with several important initiatives that are underway to improve safety, security, and overall health and well-being. This edition provides an update of SEL's performance on the most recent report card, more information about safety and security enhancements taking place in the district, and an understanding of how

the Arc QuickMed clinic is making an impact. As always, we express gratitude to Mayor Ward and the City of Lyndhurst for this opportunity to keep the community informed. Our working partnership truly makes the SEL Schools the Destination School Community.

The South Euclid Lyndhurst Schools are excited to share the results of the latest state report card data, and the specific gains made by students in our district over the last school year. Reporting performance metrics for the 2021-2022 school year, the SEL Schools made the most significant improvements in Gap Closing, where the district earned a full 5 stars, and *Progress*, which measured 4 stars out of five. Gap Closing is a criteria component which provides a picture of closing the gap in performance and achievement among subgroups in our student body, while diligently addressing absenteeism among our student population. The *Progress* component looks closely at the growth that all students are making based on their past performance.

The significance of achieving 5 and 4 stars in these two components lays important groundwork for improvement in other areas of the report card, such as graduation, achievement, and early literacy. The district has a three-year plan that will continue our students on a path of progress in growth and achievement. We commend the students, staff, families, and support networks that have helped make these gains a true accomplishment.

Safety and security will always be a top priority of the SEL Schools, and many enhancements and initiatives are underway throughout the district. All elementary buildings will now have the Raptor Visitor Management System to screen all visitors. This easy-to-use system scans each visitor's driver's license and provides a sticker badge featuring their photo. The Raptor system is currently in place at all grades 4-12 buildings. Over 450 indoor and outdoor security cameras provide extensive surveillance capabilities at all buildings. The district has launched a new Safety and Security communications update, so please see the website for this information. The dedication and care of our teachers and staff is valued, and we seek to provide learning spaces that are safe, secure, and promote the well-being of everyone.

Another important initiative is successfully underway at Charles F. Brush High School through the Arc QuickMed clinic. Staffed with a fully licensed and registered nurse practitioner, the Arc QuickMed clinic provides students and staff easy access to health care for sick students or staff to help treat their symptoms and get them back into the classroom. Our nurse practitioner can write prescriptions, and students throughout the district have access to the facility, as elementary students can take a van to the QuickMed clinic, helping to ease the logistics of parents taking off work for traditional doctor's appointments. The intent of the Arc QuickMed clinic is to make health care services more convenient and readily available on a regular basis to students and staff. Some of the services available include sports physicals, childhood vaccinations, treatment for suspected flu, sinus, urinary tract, and other infections. Rapid tests for COVID, flu, strep and mononucleosis are also available. The Arc QuickMed clinic is located in the Arc Fit Health and Wellness Facility in the rear of Charles F. Brush High School on Farnhurst Road, at Door 21, and is open between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. when school is in session. Our long-term intention is to open the facility for our families as well.

Soon as I'm washed and dressed, I can sit down for some eggs and that great smoked ham Poppa got from Mr. Spiegel. I hear he traveled all the way to East Claridon for it. It took him a whole day since the horse team had a such hard time of it thru the mud on Mayfield Road hill, up through Gates Mills.

Out the door to get up with Harry Schaeffer and the Kebrdle boys. Nice sunny day, lots better than those freezing cold days this past winter. On Richmond Road, we walked on the narrow path cut by the neighborhood men who shared the snowplowing duty. Now in fact, the bricks on Richmond Road are so dry, I can kick up some dust. Springtime in Euclidville is great. Too bad we have to go to school.

I see the girls up ahead. Marie Spiegel and Elsie Cain, headin' to Iva Deterings's house on their way to school.

They're beginning the construction on our new school. It's great fun watchin' it grow day by day, while walkin' to the good old red schoolhouse. There's Mrs. Scheuring in the north door. We better get a move on!

Just made it! Hung my coat on my hook and we're all seated. Hard to imagine all 30 of us not bein' in the same

room anymore. The new school will have 4 rooms. I'm really goin' to miss hearing the older kids recitin' their lessons. Sure made it easy to learn those big words. I LOVE spellin' those big words! Oops, better pay attention, time for our mornin' prayer and the pledge of allegiance.

Gee whiz, the mornin' flew by! Mrs. Scheuring told us about the Civil War and how President Lincoln freed the slaves. What a great man he was!

Ooooo.... Momma put a roast beef sandwich and an apple in my lunch pail. My favorite! I hope Harry and I will have a chance to play a quick game of "mumblypeg" before class starts again. We're planning a big game of "red rover" for afternoon recess, too.

The schoolhouse clock says 4 pm. The day's over and it's still sunny and warm out. The new school construction workers are diggin' the basement out. Looks like hard work to me! And holy cow, look at that guy racin' his horse down Mayfield Road. What's the rush on such a fine day?

There's little Benny Harrison's dad, trimmin' the trees around the Ford estate, across the street from our school. Those folks sure are rich! Klaustermeyer's cows are headin' for the barn, full of milk. The smoke curling up from Bruggemyer's chimney tells me that his charcoal business, one of the first in Euclidville, is busy as ever. Richmond Road is so dusty. Poppa thinks it's goin' to be a dry spring and summer.

Well.... home at last and I'm starvin'! Wonder what Momma's cookin' for supper? "Momma, I'm home, what's for supper? Did you say beef stew and corn bread, that's my favorite and I'm starved! I'm goin' out to climb the old sugar maple and see what I can see! Just yell and I'll be down in a jiffy!"



Finance

Dear Residents.

On behalf of my Administration and our City Council I am proud to present this review of your City's financial standing as of year end 2021. As vou will see, your City is in good sound financial condition and the records are maintained in excellent fashion - as indicated by the enclosed Auditor of State Award for Financial Reporting which has been repeatedly earned by our Finance Department.

While the COVID-19 Pandemic delivered many challenges to operations, and has left many unknowns ahead, our City employees have stepped up in every way imaginable to continue providing the services you need and expect. I



could not be more proud of how they have re-sponded these past three-plus years.

None of what we do, whether it is delivering services or carefully funding them, is possible without teamwork at every level. Your City Council strategically budgets your tax dollars into the various lines of expense, our Administration and Departments thoughtfully put those dol-lars to good use, our Finance Department assures all is done legally and reported well; each step critical to assure we can continue to deliver services and maintain our City's infrastructure.

As I mentioned, there remain many unknowns ahead, yet we continue a watchful eye and provide responsive fiscal solutions to Lyndhurst's sound operating and financial condition.

General revenues include both income and property taxes. Income tax is the major source of revenue to the City and accounted for 47.4% of total revenues. Income tax increased 10.7% as a result of the revenues returning to pre-pandemic levels. The state of emergency was lifted in June 2021 and total revenues decreased 2.5% that same year. The most significant change was attributed to programs. Programs include local, state and federal grants. In 2020, the City received more than \$1 million in unearned Covid related federal funded grants.

Revenues at a Glance...

Property Tax

Property Tax in Lyndhurst is administered by Cuyahoga County. The County Fiscal Officer assesses your property on 35% of the appraised market value. This value is updated every three years based on average sale prices of properties sold in the area. Every six years, your property is reappraised by the County. The most recent reappraisal updated values in 2021 and resulted in an 18% increase to be collected in 2022. For each one dollar (\$1.00) in property tax paid the County distributed those funds as follows:

Expenditures to provide all Lyndhurst municipal services, are shown by func-Police, Fire and EMS are the most important and represent the highest cost of services. The Police Department consists of 29 sworn in full-time officers and the Fire Department consists of 25 full-time firefighter / paramedics. In 2021, the Program Expenses for Security of Persons and Property significantly decreased as a result of two factors "net pension liability" and "Covid" related federal funding". Net pension liability represents the City's proportionate share of each pension plan's collective actuarial present value. The City has no control over the terms or manner in which the pensions are financed. Covid related federal funding was used in 2020 to support provisions for Safety Services during the pandemic. General Government represents numerous Municipal Departments and Court. Basic Utility includes the cost of rubbish, recycling, trees and sewers. Transportation is the cost for streets, sidewalks and snow removal. These costs remained stable as capital improvements were completed for street and sidewalk programs in 2020. Community Environment is the cost to assist in preserving neighborhoods comprised of planning, building and housing. Leisure Time Activity are the costs associated with the community and aquatic centers.

Expenditures at a Glance...

Debt Management

Fifteen year bonds were issued for the Fire Building Improvement project. As pledged, the City paid down additional principal totaling \$900,000 to date; thereby reducing interest charges by \$253,506. This is indicative of strong economic and financial character. Annual debt payments for the City include both short and long term principal and interest totaling \$2,041,342 for the year. The City issued \$1,200,000 in short term Street Improvement notes to be paid in full in 2022. State statutes limit the amount of unvoted general obligation debt the City may issue. At December 31, 2021 the City's outstanding debt was well below the legal limit.

Community Partnership on Aging

Just as the buzzards return to Hinckley every year, winter will come to Cleveland, and it is a good idea to plan and prepare now for the inevitable winter storms. Community Partnership on Aging social workers provided some useful information for you to review to make sure you are ready for whatever Mother Nature sends our way. It's a good idea to get everything ready way before the first flurries hit; that way, you can sit back and watch the snow fall instead of scrambling to buy the last jug of water at the store.

- Have enough food and water to last for about three days. Food should be nonperishable and ready to eat without heating. Keep a manual can opener handy in case the electricity goes out. Good examples of food to keep on hand are:
 - Canned fruits, vegetables, meats, and soups
 - Protein or fruit bars
 - Peanut butter
 - Dried fruit, nuts, crackers
 - At least one gallon of water per person per day
 - Ensure or other nonperishable milk product
- Make sure you have at least a one-week supply of your prescriptions and over-the-counter medications
- Keep plenty of hygiene and first aid products on hand
- Create a paper list of important phone numbers, such as your utility providers and emergency contacts (friends, family, neighbors) that you keep in a convenient place
- Have carbon monoxide detectors in your home and change the batteries annually.

- Keep a flashlight with extra batteries handy in several
- 7. Keep several layers of warm clothing and blankets on hand for warmth should the power go out
- Buy a portable radio with batteries so you can monitor local weather reports
- Have things on hand to keep you occupied, such as books, puzzles, games, etc.

Talk with your neighbors in advance of the winter weather. Is there a young person on your street you can call if you need assistance with snow removal? Do you have a friendly neighbor who can check on you if you become snowed-in? Stay warm and safe this season!

Don't want to drive much this winter? Don't forget that you can sign up for Senior Transportation Connection to travel to medical appointments (including downtown hospitals), shopping, and more. You must be at least 60 years of age and a resident of Mayfield Village. Our social work team can register you for this service-please call 440.442.2628. Once registered, you can make reservations directly with STC.







From our Service Department

Curbside Leaf Collection

he City of Lyndhurst Service Department has resumed leaf vacuuming piles of leaves from tree lawns. All leaves that are collected from tree lawns will be composted and made into leaf humus and other soil amendments. Therefore, it is extremely important that you place all leaves on your treelawn in piles near the curb for vacuum pick up. At the end of the season, if you have small quantities of leaves left over, please bag them in paper yard waste bags or place them in your designated Yard Waste container. Place the bags curbside for pick up on your normal collection day.

Because it is a safety hazard, leaves are not to be piled in the street or gutter. Leaves piled in this area will not be picked up, and the resident will be notified to remove the leaves or be cited (C.O. 660.03).

PILED LEAVES MIXED WITH BRANCHES OR OTHER MATERIAL WILL NOT BE PICKED UP.

We often get the guestion when leaf collection for an individual street will take place, unfortunately this question is difficult to answer. There are many variables over which we have no control, such as weather and the rate of leaf fall to offer a hard day

or date of collection. We collect on a cycle, street by street, and will not return until the entire City has been collected. Amounts of leaves on tree lawns and weather conditions dictate how fast we can cycle through the City; therefore, we do not have set daily route schedules. We typically pick up between 550 to 600 truckloads per season which is about 9,000 yards of packed ground leaves! The entire City is collected six to 12 times per season depending on the many variables.

Our curbside leaf vacuum program will end on or around Dec. 1, please do not place any loose leaves at the curb after Dec. 1 as we cannot guarantee the ability to vacuum loose leaves. Once the weather dictates a switch over to snow and ice control equipment all leaves must be placed into brown paper lawn and leaf bags or designated yard waste containers or consider mulching directly in your lawn. ("Yard Waste Only" stickers for containers can be picked up at the Service Department office during working hours).

We respectfully request your assistance and cooperation to ensure a successful program that, hopefully, will satisfy all our residents.

City Street Parking

now is on the way! We would like to remind you that it is prohibited to park on the street when snow accumulations exceed 2 inches. In order to properly clear the roadway from snow and ice all parked vehicles must be off the roadway. Placing snow into the roadway or across sidewalks is also prohibited, please remind your contracted snowplow drivers! We receive a high volume of calls during the winter because sidewalks are covered putting pedestrians at risk. Your continued cooperation is needed and much appreciated!

All elementary buildings will now have the Raptor Visitor Management System to screen visitors. SEL Schools Awarded Approximately \$200,000 in Safety and Security Grant Funding from Ohio Facilities Construction Commission

The South Euclid Lyndhurst Schools is proud to announce that the district has become the recipient of approximately \$200,000 in grant funding from the Ohio Facilities Construction Commission's School Safety Grant for safety and security purposes. The funding has been earmarked by the SEL Schools to provide physical security upgrades in classrooms and the buildings, in the form of interior and exterior locks for all doors throughout the district's campus. In a stroke of innovation blended with this security enhancement, police officers will have immediate access to all doors once locked, if needed during the event of a lockdown scenario.

Already, South Euclid Lyndhurst Schools safety officials are applying to one such additional outside source, in the form of Ohio Governor Mike DeWine's Ohio K-12 School Safety Grant Program. Through this grant, in partnership with the Ohio School Safety Center, and with

funding from Senate Bill 133, which passed as part of the 133rd General Assembly, Ohio schools have access to funding for prevention, planning and protection. The South Euclid Lyndhurst Schools will keep the community apprised of future grants awarded for safety and security purposes, and thanks the Ohio Facilities Construction Commission for their dedication to student and staff welfare.
