Academic Parent Teacher Teams (APTT) Model of Family Engagement

I am so happy to announce that the Oroville School Board has approved Stanford Avenue to pilot a very successful program that develops the school to home relationship around student achievement. Academic Parent Teacher Teams is a model of family engagement that is grounded in the notion that schools can thrive when families and teachers work together, as genuine partners, to maximize student learning inside and outside of school. The model is researchbased and aligns grade-level learning concepts, student performance data, and family-teacher communication and collaboration. This format elevates traditional parent conferences by creating a systematic pathway for teachers to share grade-level information, tools, and strategies that families can apply at home. Message from: Angie Merino **Stanford Educational Therapist**

Hello Families! This is your friendly neighborhood therapist, Angie Merino, popping over to talk to you about shame -vs- guilt talk! When we talk to our children we often use words like good or bad to describe their behavior. This makes sense because we are entrusted with the very important and difficult job of teaching them how to interact with and in the world. When you speak to your child, be sure to make it clear that it is their CHOICES that are bad or good-not them! They are good! Their choices may be bad. When we distinguish between them and their choices, this gives them hope that they can make a better choice next time. It also does not place their worth on their choices and avoids shame. Guilt is about choices. Shame is about the person. If we feel like we are "bad" people, we are destined to make bad choices. If we feel like we are good, but make mistakes sometimes, that means we have a choice on how we behave. Keep up the great and hard work of being a parent!
