This has been an historic winter! From over 100 inches of snow to four consecutive days with wind chills of 40 degrees or more below zero to sleet, ice and rain, we have seen it all.

Presently, the school district meets the required number of hours of instruction mandated by the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction. Despite the two days canceled in mid-April, the District will not need to add any additional minutes to the remaining school days or to extend the school year into the second week of June.

How is this possible? There are a couple of reasons for this: our school day is longer than many other districts and we schedule more school days than some districts. The result of this is



that we exceed the minimum number of instructional hours by over 70 hours at the high school and 80 hours at the elementary school.

In addition, the decision to add back the 4.5 days earlier in the year ensured that we would meet the required hours of instruction.

The School District of Greenwood strongly believes in maximizing quality instructional time with our students. While the extreme weather conditions have challenged our ability to maintain consistency this winter, we look forward to a strong finish to the school year. As we move forward, we will continue to put the safety of our students

and staff first while providing quality instructional time.

Even though spring has been slow to arrive, this remains a busy time for students. Please check the District calendar for the many events and activities our students will be participating in during these final weeks of the school year.

As is the case every summer, the district will be addressing many projects in both schools. However, this summer the Elementary School office will be relocated and a more secure entry system will be installed. This project should be completed by the start of classes this fall.

The District will continue to proactively plan for the future and advance our standing as an educational leader among rural public 4K-12 school districts. On behalf of the entire school district, I would like to personally thank all of you for your on-going support. The School District of Greenwood is a great place to live, work and learn!



BADGER BOYS' STATE

Badger Boys' State will be held at Ripon College, June 8-15, 2019. Approximately 800 young men from every part of Wisconsin will come to Badger Boys' State this year. Upon arrival at the Ripon College campus, young men will be grouped into cities and counties forming a "51st State." For eight days, the citizens of the "new state" will carry out all the main functions of city, county, and state government using basic laws and fundamental procedures of the State of Wisconsin as their guide. This program is designed to teach young men that the American form of government is stronger and more vital in today's world of struggle and change than ever before, and the American people have no more precious possession than the great document, the Constitution, which at once safeguards and transmits to posterity those principles of the great American heritage justice, freedom and democracy under God.

The young men themselves will elect their own municipal, county, and state officials. As aldermen and county supervisors, they will frame, present, and pass their own ordinances and laws, their own police and sheriffs will enforce them. As attorneys, they will prosecute or defend; or as judges, hear cases in their own courts. Through this

THANK YOU TO ALL OUR LOCAL & AREA SCHOLARSHIP DONORS & SUPPORTERS!

It seems hard to believe - although it is true - Senior Awards Banquet and Graduation will be here before we know it as another school year comes to a close. This is an opportune time to consider and express gratitude to all our local and area scholarships donors. These families, individuals, groups and organizations provide financial support to our graduating high school seniors as they begin again - commence - the next chapter in their lives: college. On average about 90% of our graduating either attend programs, technical college programs, or university. The other 10% enter an apprenticeship program, military or the workforce. Scholarships help with the high cost associated with college. Scholarship funds and awards at times will be the catalyst a student needs to make the commitment of time and money to a college degree program. College costs continue to increase almost annually although many still believe it is one of the best investments an individual can make.

The scholarship program at Greenwood High School and most other high schools will include the following categories of scholarships: local, area, state and national. Local scholarships are available only to students who attend and graduate from their local school. Some of our local scholarships are provided from individuals, families, clubs, groups, institutions and businesses who have memorial scholarships in the name of their who graduated Greenwood High School, families who have been in Greenwood for many years who provide educational scholarships due to tradition and family values, organizations who raise money through fundraisers such as the Fire Department, Chamber of Commerce, Homemakers, Lions, and others. Area scholarships are available to graduating high school seniors who attend and will graduate from a high school in an area; an example would be the Clark County area or the Marshfield area; these scholarships consist of Clark County Community Foundation, Marshfield Area Community Foundation, 4H, American Legion, Banks, Performing Arts groups, Farm Bureau and others. There are some scholarships (available through the state of Wisconsin) which can be found at the HEAB website, and competition is statewide for these scholarships. Some state scholarships are awarded annually to all schools in the state of Wisconsin: The Kohl Foundation provides competitive scholarships every year to graduating seniors in the state of Wisconsin. National scholarships are available to anyone who wants to look for them and apply; these scholarships are funded through companies and can be found by searching the internet or possibly a company website. At times some national scholarship programs send mailings to Greenwood High School; if that information is received, those scholarships are shared through the scholarship list.

I prepare a scholarship list annually for seniors and their parents. This scholarship list is usually started in October and updated throughout the school year. This scholarship list is posted on the school website and sent by email attachment to all seniors, their advisors, the high school office, and the library when it is first published, usually October of every year, and when updates are made throughout the school year. Copies are distributed in the high school office, library and outside my office throughout the school year as updates are made. Parents of seniors are sent the updated scholarship list through Skyward Message Center.

We appreciate your continued financial support through the scholarships you provide to Greenwood High School seniors. Many of you have attended Senior Award Banquets and Graduations in years past with your own son or daughter and since that time have experienced great loss in the amazing person your graduate from Greenwood High School became. We are truly saddened by your loss and appreciate the opportunity to remember and honor the memory of your loved one.

Last year the GHS 2018 graduating class applied for many scholarships, and in the end, were awarded a total of almost 200K dollars for their efforts. This year again many scholarship awards are coming in to my office for our upcoming banquet. We once again will have the opportunity to spend time with our beloved community members who love and support their school, students and applaud graduating high school seniors who are making the choice to further their education at all costs. 

thinking. We will end the year with a trip to a farm, hosted by our high school FFA. It has been a great year in 5th grade!


6TH GRADE NEWS

Several students found life lessons that

occur as adults when they needed to downsize their homes, purchase the vehicles they wanted or gave up other luxuries to make their money balance.
