



With a supply of yarn that never runs out, Annabelle knits for everyone and everything in town until an evil archduke decides he wants the yarn for himself.



A young boy rides the bus across town with his grandmother and learns to appreciate the beauty in everyday things.



Whether at home getting ready for the day, enjoying the beach, or at bedtime, Olivia is a feisty pig who has too much energy for her own good.



When Kitten mistakes the full moon for a bowl of milk, she ends up tired, wet, and hungry trying to reach it.



A little girl tells about the special kitchen window at her beloved Nanny and Poppy's house from which a person can see anyone or anything coming and going.



A tiny fish wearing a blue hat hopes not to wake up the trouble that might be following close behind.



A young girl who loves fancy things helps her family to be fancy for one special night.



Pairs of rhyming words are introduced and used in simple sentences, such as "Day, Play. We play all day. Night, Fight. We fight all night."



Trixie becomes very unhappy when she accompanies her daddy to the laundromat and realizes she has lost her stuffed bunny.


