# <u>Principal's Message</u> Important Middle School Program

We have an important and timely program being offered for students in grades 6-8 this month. During the last week in May we will be having Sexual Assault Support Services of Midcoast Maine (SASSMM) coming to speak with students in grades 6-8 about a variety of topics that are pertinent in their lives. SASSMM provides educational support professionals who deliver classroom-based, age-appropriate primary prevention education that is aligned with the Maine Department of Education Learning Results, Child Sexual Abuse Prevention Education and Response Model Policy, and Key Concepts for Prevention of Sexual Assault. Their educational model will consist of four sessions delivered over four days for all students in grades 6-8. Students will be with their grade level in breakout sessions to discuss the following content areas:

**Session One: Personal Boundaries**: In this session students are introduced to the concept of sexual harassment through the lenses of consensual flirting and personal boundaries. Students will investigate: their own personal boundaries; respect for personal boundaries; the consequences of crossing another individual's personal boundaries, and understanding empathy and accountability.

**Session Two:** Gender Norms: In this session students engage with typical definitions of femininity and masculinity, and how these social norms are limiting and harmful to people who do not fit the "gender boxes". Students develop media literacy skills by discussing unrealistic representations of men and women. The educator also introduces the ideas of gender identity and sexual orientation.

**Session Three: Tolerance and Empathy**: This session will continue their discussion of LGBTQ+identities and gender norms by watching PBS clips featuring gender non-conforming students around America. The educator will ask students to engage with their own reactions or discomfort to gender non-conforming behavior. The activity "Cross the Line" gives students a chance to connect safely with other students and build empathy.

**Session Four: Sexual Harassment:** Student will understand the definition of sexual harassment, some examples of what behaviors it can include, and debunk some common myths. Through the clip of the incident on American Idol, students will see televised example of sexual harassment, exploring how this is normalized in our culture and often takes the form of jokes. Finally students will test their knowledge by engaging with scenarios.

You may choose to opt your child out of participating in any or all of these sessions by providing a letter stating this to me or Meagan Soule, WHES Student Support Specialist. I would encourage any/all parents to contact either of us if you have any questions concerning the curriculum and/or content being delivered. I believe this is very important subject matter which our students need to gain a greater awareness and knowledge base of. Our school is fortunate to have available to us the services SASSMM for this vital task.
